TITLE: An act to establish that all restaurants and fast food establishments list nutritional facts beside their items on their menu or menu board for all patrons to see.

ENACTING CLAUSE: Be it hereby enacted by the Youth Legislature of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

Body of the Bill:

Section I: The purpose of our bill is to show what is in the foods that we are putting in our bodies and give the consumer the opportunity to make good health choices. Our goal is to reduce the amount of obesity and other related illnesses such as diabetes in Kentucky which ranks 7th for the percentage of obesity in the United States. This bill will help make Kentucky a healthier state.

Section II: In Kentucky it is optional for restaurants to list nutritional facts and in many cases they are only available upon request. This bill will require that nutritional facts be posted so the consumer can see the facts before purchasing any item. This means nutritional facts should be posted in the restaurant on the menu or on menu boards. Our bill will affect the restaurants and its consumers by providing information about fat, sugar, and salt content which leads to obesity and other health related illnesses in Kentucky.

Section III: Once this bill is enacted all restaurants will have six months to change their menus or menu boards. If the restaurant does not post the necessary information, the first offense will be a written warning and they will have three months to make the correction. The second violation will carry a fine of \$500 that will be paid to the Ky. Dept. of Health. An additional fine of \$1000 will follow every 3 months after the second violation.

Section IV: Restaurants will be responsible for the costs for new menus or menu boards.

Section V: This bill will go into effect on January 1, 2011.

ENACTING CLAUSE: Be it hereby enacted by the Annual Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

Section 1: In order to create and maintain a healthy environment, grocery stores will have to meet four out of seven environmentally friendly requirements.

The requirements are as follows: Reusable grocery bags, locally grown and produced products, skylights/energy saving light bulbs, offer recycling bins, limit store hours (18 maximum), offer "green" products, all refrigerated products must stay behind closed doors.

Section 2: This will help our environment as well as help our local economy.

Section 3: Penalties for non-compliance

First offense: Warning, with one month to correct the problem Second offense: \$1,500 fine, one month to correct the problem

Third offense: \$2,500 fine, officials will come in and correct the problem

Section 4: The EPA (Environmental Protection Agency) will enforce this law. Law goes into effect one year after passing.

Title: An act to require a person to be 18 or older to purchase over the counter cough medicine.

Enacting Clause: Be it hereby enacted by the Annual Youth Legislature of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Justification Clause: There have been increased cases of over the counter sales of cold medicines to minors. This increase is resulting in minors abusing the cold medicines by getting high in classes at school as well as in other places. Another major concern is minors driving while under the influence of the cold medicines. This is basically driving while intoxicated. This bill is designed to stop this abuse by requiring photo I.D. before purchases can be made.

Section I: Over the counter cough medicine should not be sold to persons under the age of 18 without proper identification.

Section II: The identification required will be some form of state issued photo I.D.

Section III: Retailers selling these products will be required to enter information regarding the purchase of over the counter cough medicines entered into a database at the time of each purchase. The database shall consist of the name and social security number of each person purchasing the product.

Section IV: The Office of Drug Control will be responsible for screening the database for any large quantity purchases.

Section V: ODCP turns over any suspected cases of abuse or violations of this legislation to Kentucky State Police for investigation.

Section VI: Funding to establish this will come from state and federal drug abuse prevention grants.

Section VII: Due to significance of this problem this bill will be passed with an emergency clause, and will become effective when when signed by the Governor.

Enacting Clause: Be it here by enacted by the Annual Youth Legislation of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

Section 1: This would affect all students in the state of Kentucky aged 13 years and over. When a student applies for the desired job, he/she must show proof of their legal age along with a social security card. These items must be present at the desired job interview also.

<u>Section 2:</u> The requirements to have a job are that you must maintain grades of A's and B's in school. You must also achieve and maintain outstanding attendance. If you miss or check out early from school you cannot attend work for that day. Also, if you are caught using drugs or alcohol while employed you will immediately be dismissed from the job.

<u>Section 3</u>: This will affect any business near the home of the student, or a business they can reach by reasonable means of transportation. It will also affect students by improving their work ethic and helping them to raise money for their own needs.

<u>Section4</u>: In order to ensure the safety of the employee's money, a banking system through the employer should be set up for the student to access the money when they need. By doing this, students can access the money without the hassle of parents driving them to the bank.

Section5: This bill will go into effect 90 days after it passes.

<u>Section 2:</u> This bill will make mandatory the display of nutritional information in all corporate restaurants. All chain restaurants that make over \$1,000,000.00 annually and have over 5 locations throughout the state of Kentucky, must visibly display nutritional information on the menu, under the menu item in question.
<u>Section 3:</u> The nutritional information required will be number of calories, fat grams, sugars, sodium, and carbohydrates, but the restaurant may post any additional information they see fit.
Section 4: The funds for this bill will be derived from the restaurant companies.
Section 5: This bill will be enforced all throughout the state of Kentucky.
<u>Section 6:</u> If it is reported that a company is not in compliance with this bill, they will have points deducted from their State Health Department Check and will be checked again six months ensuing the initial check. If the score on the second check falls below the local required score, the restaurant may lose their permit.

Title: An act to make motorcyclists wear helmets and leather jackets when riding on roads or highways.	
Enacting Clause: Be it herby enacted by the congressional program of the Kentucky Youth Assembly.	
Section I: The current law in the state of Kentucky about this issue is: "It is unlawful for motorcyclists to wear a helmet and leather jacket while riding a motorcycle." That mean motorcyclists on roads and highways don't have to wear a helmet and leather jack.	
Section II: Without wearing a helmet while riding a motorcycle, you have a 50% chance of getting head injuries or dying in a accident compared to people wearing a helmet. That means if we did a motorcycling test with 100 people not wearing helmets, at least 50% of those people would die or get head injuries. And if you are wearing a leather jacket while riding a motorcycle, you have a 35% less chance of getting cuts or lacerations if you are in a accident.	
Section III: If motorcyclists don't follow the law of wearing a helmet and leather jacket, they will get a warning. Next time there is a violation they will be fined \$100. Next time \$150, then \$200. If it keeps on happening then that fine will go up 50 more dollars each time.	
Section IV: The only addition al funding for this bill is that the motorcyclists have to buy their own helmet and leather jacket.	
Section V: This bill will go into effect 3 months after the passage.

<u>TITLE</u>: An act to have individuals fifty-five (55) years and older retake their driver's test every four years. If the license has been renewed recently it is still mandatory.

ENACTING CLAUSE: Be it hereby enacted by the annual youth legislative of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

BODY OF THE BILL

<u>Section 1:</u> On their fifty-fifth birthday, individuals will take their written test and road efficiency test. They will also be required to pass a vision screening.

Section 2: Upon passing: The citizen's license will stay legal an additional four years.

<u>Section 3:</u> Should a citizen fail: (at any age 55 and older) their license will be suspended. They may retake the exam three months later, after the following requirements are completed:

- 1. Vision Improvement (must get an eye exam and if needed receive contacts/glasses and/or Lasix Surgery)
- 2. Must take a Drivers Ed course (pass the Written and/or Road Efficiency Test)

If an individual fails three consecutive times they will not have the option to take the test over. You will not be allowed to legally operate a vehicle.

The only exception is a medical condition that temporarily impairs their ability to pass the exam (in which the driver will need a medical statement from their doctor).

Section 4: Failure to comply and retest would result in:

1st Offense: \$250 fine (30 days to renew)

2nd Offense: \$500.00 fine and a six month suspension of license (may renew during this period)

3rd Offense: \$1000.00 fine and License will be suspended for one year

Section 5: The cost will be ten dollars (\$10) which is half the normal fee. Extreme financial difficulty will be examined on an individual basis.

<u>Section 6</u>: The government of Kentucky will enforce this bill. Police Officers will monitor drivers as usual. Twice a year there will be check-points around the state. The states current data base will be used to send reminders to retest every four years, once a citizen reaches the age of 55.

Section 7: This bill will go into affect January 1, 2011

TITLE: To build a task force chosen by the KHRA to inspect the four major horse racing tracks biannually.

ENACTING CLAUSE: Be it hereby enacted by the annual youth legislature of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

Body of the Bill

Section 1: The KHRA (Kentucky Horse Racing Authority) will form a special task force that will check the upkeep of the four major horse racing tracks each meet at the beginning of each meet and an unannounced inspection during the meet. These inspections will verify that the tracks are as safe for the horses as possible. It will ensure that the track is kept as a normal dirt surface instead of a synthetic one and that the turf is kept at the correct density to prevent injury to the horses.

<u>Section 2:</u> This will affect the following tracks: Churchill Downs, Ellis Park, Keeneland, and Turfway Park

<u>Section 3:</u> If the inspection is failed and their turf is not well kept or they replace their dirt with synthetic dirt they will be fined. The first offense they will receive a fine of \$10,000. The second offense will be \$50,000, with the third offense being \$100,000 fine. If the inspection is failed for a fourth time the track will be shut down for the season.

Section 4: A new task force will be chosen every four years. Each member of the task force will be required to be approved by the KHRA as a qualified horse trainer and has specialized training in the care of race horses. The task force will consist of two KHRA members, the CEO of each park, a trainer, two park employees, one representative, and one race course manager.

Section 5: This bill will go into effect January, 2011

Section I: For every ticket that is purchased, a \$1.00 surcharge will be added to the purchase price. This will offset the fee for recycling. It costs an average of \$150 per event to recycle at large venues.		
Section II: This bill will be enforced by an oversight committee that consists of a State Representative, one Metro Council Representative, the venue's C.E.O and C.F.O. and a representative from the Mayor's office. The venue will be checked for compliance once every six months. Annually, there will also be one unscheduled site visit. If a venue meets the requirements for two consecutive years, their annual inspection will change to a five-year rotation.		
Section III: Any event, at any venue that citizens are attending must provide recycling opportunities throughout the duration of the event.

Section 1: This proposal will make it mandatory for public schools to provide self-defense classes to students in grades 3-8. This will be a mandatory part of their curriculum.			
Section 2: The classes will first be taught to the schools' Physical Education teachers. After Certification these teachers will train two of the schools' staff before teaching the students. All 3rd-8th grade teachers must attend these classes with their students so that eventually all of these teachers would be able to teach the course if necessary. The students will take part in the classes once a month for the entire school year. The elementary students will start out with videos, guest speakers, and some basic moves. Middle school students will have more hands-on activities, more advanced training, and guest speakers who will focus on drug prevention, violence, and life skills.

TITLE: An act to limit the amount of time that a Kentucky public school student spends on the bus per day within the student's school district.

ENACTING CLAUSE: Be it here by enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

BODY OF THE BILL:

SECTION 1: In many counties, public school students spend more than two hours a day on a school bus. As a result, there are several negative impacts on the students. We propose to limit the amount of time that students can spend on the bus.

SECTION 2: Based on research, the recommended amount of time spent on a one-way trip for an elementary student is 30 minutes; for a middle school student, 45 minutes; for a high school student, 60 minutes. If students choose to attend a school that would require a bus trip exceeding these time limits, they would need to provide their own transportation to fall within the guidelines.

SECTION 3: There is a wide array of negative impacts on students who spend excessive time on a school bus. First, students are exposed to carcinogens from diesel fuel, which cause 71% of the cancer risk from air pollutants. Next, excessively long bus rides promote both mental and physical fatigue. Finally, excessive time on the bus decreases the amount of time that students have available in the evening for homework, extracurricular activities, family time, and mental down time.

SECTION 4: In order to meet the proposed time frames, county school boards will be given the authority to reassign new bus routes, keeping in mind school enrollment and bus stop locations.

SECTION 5: Shortening time on the bus, and consequently the length of the bus route, will reduce both maintenance costs and fuel costs for each county. If counties need to purchase additional buses in order to implement this bill, they will have the funds available from the savings mentioned above.

SECTION 6: This bill will go into effect between one and two school years following its passage.

ENACTING CLAUSE: Be it hereby enacted by the Youth Legislature of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

BODY OF THE BILL:

SECTION 1: In the state of Kentucky felons who have committed C and D class felonies are stripped of their rights if they do not go through the state's process of registration. The state's process is very difficult for the felons, and they should have any easier way to earn back their rights. We are proposing a way for C and D class felons with no high school diploma to earn back their rights through 50 hours of community service.

SECTION 2: If C and D class felons want to earn back their voting rights, they will be subjected to 50 hours of community service because earning your voting rights back is an honor. C and D class felons include DUI forth offense, trafficking cocaine, and trafficking marijuana. This registration process will not be offered to A and B class felons because they have committed serious felonies such as assault of a child under 14, manslaughter, and arson.

SECTION 3: Between 2002 and 2003, 1,266 felons entered a registration form and 1,231 were accepted. That means that 97.2 % of the felons that did this earned back their voting rights. The number of felons that sent in a registration form between 2005 to 2006 was 583; only 164 were accepted. This is because the state registration process has become more difficult, and it is hard for felons without a high school diploma to write this essay.

SECTION 4: This bill will give many felons an opportunity to earn back their privilege of voting. After felons are released from prison and have served their parole, they become hardworking Kentuckians, abiding by the law and paying taxes.

SECTION 5: This bill will go into affect one year after passage.

SECTION V: Teachers who teach the Financial Education course will be required to take an online course to obtain their certification that shall be limited to 3 hours of instruction and a 30 minute exam.

TITLE: An act to ban smoking in indoor public areas of Kentucky.

Enacting Clause: Be it hereby enacted by the Annual Youth Legislature of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Body of the Bill:

Section 1: The state of Kentucky will no longer allow smoking in any indoor, public facility in order to reduce secondhand smoke. This ban would apply to offices, factories, bars, restaurants, clubs, bowling alleys, stores of any kind, and gyms/arenas.

Section 2: This law will be enforced by the management of that public area. They would train their employees to collect information on the smoking person and alert the police to give that person a ticket for smoking next time they are pulled over or near any police officer.

Section 3: If a person is to disobey the law, or a manager allows smoking in that facility, then they will be fined the following amounts:

- First offense -- \$50-\$100
- Second offense -- \$150-\$250
- Third and following offenses -- \$350-\$500

The fines will vary based on the number of warnings the smoker was given, the number of cigarettes smoked, and by the amount of time smoking.

Section 4: This bill will require no federal or state funds. All money collected from smoking tickets will be spent however the state government sees fit.

Section 5: This bill would go into effect 4 months after passage to allow proper time to inform any smokers of the upcoming ban.

Title: An act to cease mountaintop removal and implement alternative energy sources.

Enacting Clause: Be it hereby enacted by the annual youth legislature of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

Body of the Bill:

Section I: This bill would require that mining companies stop mountaintop removal, which is a damaging mining process that destroys habitats of animals living on, in, and around the mountain. This practice also destroys people's drinking water.

Section II: Although jobs will be lost in the process of stopping this mining practice, Kentucky can implement alternative "green" energy sources, such as wind farms and solar plants, that will provide jobs for former miners.

Section III: The Commonwealth of Kentucky would set aside some federal or state money to build these energy sources and train former miners to operate them.

Section IV: If a company is found to be using mountaintop removal to obtain energy resources, a fine of \$250,000 will be charged for the first offense. For a second violation of this law, a fine of \$600,000 and the possibility of prison for top executives will arise. For a third offense, owners and executive decision-makers will go to prison, and the company will be charged \$900,000.

Section V: This bill will go into effect on May 1, 2010.

Title: An act to make straight pipes illegal in all of Kentucky, and replace them with properly functioning septic

Enacting Clause: Be it hereby enacted by the Annual Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

Section 1: Straight pipes are pipes that go from your home plumbing directly to local water sources.

Section 2: Straight pipes cause problems because they are putting human waste directly into the water. By using septic systems instead of straight pipes the local water sources will become cleaner and healthier to drink.

Section 3: Straight pipes are dangerous because the human waste going into the water holds thousands of harmful bacteria that can be fatal to humans if ingested.

Section 4: Water-related diseases are a growing human tragedy, killing over 5 million people a year in the world. We want to decrease the deaths from water born illnesses in Kentucky. This bill will help make all Kentuckians healthier and safe from water born diseases.

Section 5: All counties will be responsible for removing the straight pipes and replacing them with a septic tank for each community. This will be funded by the individual counties, but the counties can apply for grant money from the Environmental Protection Agency or other government agencies.

Section 6: Each county has one year to remove the straight pipes and replace them with septic systems. Any counties that do not follow this law will, within a year, be charged with a fine of 1,000 dollars. If by the end of the year the counties have not removed the straight pipes and replaced them with a septic system they will be fined an additional 1,000 dollars a month until they remove the straight pipes.

Section 7: This bill will go into effect immediately upon signing.

<u>Title:</u> An act that all gun show dealers sell guns to Kentucky residents only.

Enacting Clause: Be it hereby enacting by the Annual Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

Section 1: The gun show dealer must ask customers for some form of identification before the dealer sells the customer the guns. This form of identification shows that the customer is a Kentucky resident. If the customer refuses to show any form of identification, then they will be asked to leave their booth.

Section 2: People from states close to Kentucky are coming here to buy hand guns. This is because Kentucky doesn't have a restriction on where people live. Many of these people that come to buy the guns in Kentucky cannot obtain a gun in their home state.

Section 3: Many of these guns are being sold to out of state felons because Kentucky doesn't have the files they need to search the out of state customer's background. Our bill can prevent some of these guns being sold.

Section 4: In 1997, 32,436 deaths resulted from firearms, including 4,223 deaths in children under 20. In 1997, firearm related deaths accounted for 22.5% of all injury deaths in children and adolescents. The customer and the dealer at gun shows will have a background check to help prevent criminals from out of state from owning guns.

Section 5: This bill does not require funding. If the dealer sells the gun to an out of state resident, the dealer will lose his/ her license to sell guns. The dealer also could have a two year jail sentence and have to pay a fine of \$500 to the state of Kentucky.

Section 6: This bill will go into effect immediately upon signing.

Purpose: To address the issue of obesity in Kentucky through the act of requiring a physical education class and a health/fitness awareness class on alternating weeks. Physical education is enforced in elementary and high school, so it should be in middle school too.

Section 1: Obesity is a major issue in the U.S., but especially in Kentucky; being the 13th highest in the nation, and while at least one semester of physical education is required in high school, it usually isn't in most middle schools. Therefore, the rate of overweight adolescents is increasing.

Section 2: This course will only be required for one semester in middle school, but can be offered every year. The class consists of two parts: physical education and fitness awareness. Students will need to have a passing grade in this course to pass overall.

Section 3: Adding an alternating physical education-health/fitness awareness class to the middle school class schedule must include the following: rigorous physical activity and sports, an enriching, educational class which teaches students how to maintain a healthy, nutritional diet and exercise plan, and give students the opportunity to learn how to exercise safely and preserve a healthy lifestyle.

Section 4: By having this course added, it will cover the content needed for practical living. Rigorous physical activity and sports as mentioned in Section 3 can also cover the content needed for arts and humanities through dance.

Section 5: With the economy's current decrease, adding this course to all middle schools will provide more teaching jobs. The money that is to be used for equipment and payment to the teachers will be funded by taxing unhealthy foods and drinks such as candy, energy drinks, and any other item in the junk food category.

Section 6: All laws or parts of laws in conflict with this act are hereby repealed.

Section 7: This bill goes into effect in the beginning of the 2011-2012 school year.

Title: An act to protect the animals of Kentucky by making it illegal to test a product on an animal.

Enacting Clause: Be it hereby enacted by the Youth Legislature of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

Body of the Bill

Section I: This bill would help protect the rights of animals and also give them more rights. It would make testing on an animal illegal.

Section II: This bill would exclude products such as pet food, pet shampoos, and other products that are a necessity for household animals.

Section III: This bill would also exclude any human product testing, such as make-up on animals.

Section IV: For the first offense the offender would loose his/her position to work with the animals. He or she would also be required to complete 100 hours of community service along with a \$100,000 fine. The service hours must be completed within nine months of the offence.

Section V: For the second offence the offender would serve five to twenty years in prison depending on the severity of the case. Once they have competed their term he/she would have to complete the requirements for the first offence.

Section VI: To pay for enacting this bill would come from the \$100,000 received from every offence.

Section VII: This bill will go into effect on July 1, 2011.

An act to prevent the spread of bed bugs among motels and throughout Kentucky.

Be it hereby enacted by the annual youth legislature of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

SECTION 1: All owner/operators of a motel shall develop and provide training, in accordance with Section 5 of this act, to all staff and maintenance personnel in:

- a. the identification of bed bugs at all stages of the life cycle;
- b. an ongoing inspection procedure for all units on the premises;
- c. reporting and referral procedures to be taken upon finding any evidence of bed bugs; and
- d. housekeeping and maintenance procedures for the disposal of infested garments, bedding, or furniture.

SECTION 2: As used in section 1(b), an ongoing inspection procedure shall include:

- a. daily visual inspection by housekeeping as part of routine duties;
- b. a semi-annual inspection of all units and the premises by maintenance personnel, including all furniture, fixtures, outlets, and base boards; and
- c. an annual inspection of all units and the premises by a licensed pest control company.

SECTION 3: Each owner/operator of a motel shall, annually, have a licensed pest control company inspect the premises for bedbugs.

SECTION 4: When bedbugs are discovered, the owner/operator shall employ the services of a licensed pest control company to:

- a. eradicate the infestation;
- b. inspect all adjacent units for bed bugs; and
- c. put in place a system of monitoring for further bed bug activity in all treated units and adjacent units for not less than 2 months.

SECTION 5: The Commissioner of the Department of Agriculture shall promulgate regulations defining an acceptable curriculum for the training of hotel staff and maintenance personnel under section 1 of this Act.

SECTION 6: There are authorized to be appropriated to the Department of Agriculture such funds as are necessary to carry out the purposes of this Act.

SECTION 7: This Act shall take effect one (1) year from the date of passage of this Act.

TITLE: An act to lower expenses needed to run prisons and jails.

ENACTING CLAUSE: Be it hereby enacted by the youth assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

BODY- SECTION 1: For this bill, we will require inmates in the state- run prisons and jails of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, to pay for personal meal fees on their second or more sentences in jail/prison. If they cannot pay for their meals, then they will work it off. If the inmate is in prison for long sentences, then they will do jobs within the prison such as laundry, cooking, or cleaning. If the inmate is in jail for petty crimes, then they will do community service such as highway clean up, mowing public lawns, or gardening around the community. This will help our state by saving money, reducing the number of inmates, and improving job opportunities. It will also provide inmates with life skills and help community with community service.

BODY – SECTION 2: The jail/prisons will be responsible for making sure that everything in the bill happens and runs smoothly, and assigning jobs. Each prison/jail may have their own system as long as it complies with the requirements in the bill. The bill will be enforced by having checks every six weeks, where the state sends a representative to the jail/prisons, to make sure that they are following the bill. If the jail/prison is not doing what the bill proposes, then they get one warning before the warden in charge of the jail will be fined.

BODY- SECTION 3: There will be immediate funds, such as advertising, which will be provided by the jail/prison funds, but, overall, the jail/prison will make profit because they will now be getting some income from inmates' food. If the inmates refuse to work/pay for their food, then two weeks will be added to their sentence per refusal, and they will not get any "extras" in their meal, such as chips or soda. This will give them nutrients they need, without giving any extras. After three refusals, they will add a longer time to the sentence, what it is depends on the jail/prison.

Title: An act to require mandatory drug testing as a prerequisite to receive unemployment benefits in the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

Enacting Clause: Be it hereby enacted by the annual Youth Legislature of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

Body of Bill:

Section I: In Kentucky, the weekly benefit rate is 1.3078% of the unemployed person's total base period wages. This means if someone who is unemployed earned twenty dollars a week before they lost their job the government would provide 1.3078% of twenty dollars to them weekly. Including a drug test in the requirements to receive benefits would ensure that people who are more qualified to maintain a job would receive a higher percent of total base period wages.

Section II: As of 2009, Kentucky has an unemployment rate of about 8.5%. This is the highest it's been since the Great Depression. By eliminating those people who fail a drug test, our bill will distribute a larger sum of money to those who have been put out of jobs for reasons they may not be able to control.

Section III: In order to receive unemployment benefits, one must be physically and mentally able to work. When starting the application process one must obtain the following criteria; Social Security number, address, phone number, personal identification number, and the exact dates of your first and last days of work. If not an American citizen then one must supply the Alien Registration number. Those whose bodies are affected by drugs cannot maintain a job adequately.

Section IV: The cost for the tests would be \$25-\$65. The mandatory drug tests will eliminate people who are receiving monthly benefits. This money that is not being spent by the government will be used to purchase the drug tests. After the drug tests have been purchased, there will still be money left over to increase the amount of money qualified people receive each month.

SECTION I: Building a light rail transit system in Louisville will increase the use of public transportation.
SECTION II: A light rail system is rapid transit that uses electrical rail car. The train's speeds range from 19-38 m.p.h. On average, 12,000 passengers per day use the system.
SECTION III: A single ride on a light rail train will cost \$1.75.
SECTION IV: Citizens who lived in an area with a light rail system pay on average \$100 annually to ride the light rail train, but they save \$500 a year in total transportation costs. Light rail trains run on electricity so no gas is consumed and no fumes are emitted.
SECTION V: The light rail system will cost \$575.3 million. This bill will be funded by President Obama's stimulus plan and transportation funds funded by state taxes.

Section 1- This bill will enforce stricter tests for the purchase of firearms and will make buying and selling firearms on streets, in flea markets, and in yard/garage sales illegal unless both buyer and seller have obtained a gun license to do so. This bill will help prevent shootings, unintended and intended deaths, by making the test

harder and more efficient to acquire a firearm.

Section 2- Seeing as 68% of the 810 violent deaths occurring in 2007 were gun related and intentional, we find it very necessary to create a stricter gun law. Guns were identified as the most common mechanism for death in homicides. They were used in 74% of the murders recorded.

Section 3- This bill will be enforced by the Division of Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms who will create harder tests by making the requirement of hit shots out of twenty, fifteen instead of eleven on a full sized silhouette and a shorter more reasonable time span to do so. Gun owners will have to retake tests every four years.

Section 4- this bill will have no cost because paying for the tests will cover the expenses for extra man power.

Section 5- If you are found with a concealed firearm and are not properly licensed to have one, you are sentenced to up to six months in jail. If you are found with a concealed firearm and it is apparent that you are making threats then the sentence can be increased freely by jury. If there are illegal sales of firearms both buyer and seller are sentenced to one to three years of imprisonment depending on the degrees of their sales. Seller must always send a copy of buyer's information to state within 7 days of sale. If it is not sent in on time seller may be fined up to 1,000 dollars per transaction.

Section 6- this bill will go into effect one year after passage to allow men and women with firearms to get a license before the bill goes into effect.

Enacting Clause: Be it hereby enacted by the Youth Legislature of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

Body of the Bill:

Section I: This bill will end a 25-year moratorium on nuclear power plant construction. Kentucky is ranked seventh in the United States for oil consumption per household with over 31 barrels per household per year. The Nuclear Power Plants will help cut down on this harmful number.

Section Π : This bill will positively affect the energy consumers of the Commonwealth of Kentucky by decreasing the amount of fossil fuels used. This bill will also potentially create new jobs, therefore giving a boost to Kentucky's economy.

Section III: This bill will cost the population of the Commonwealth nothing because it will merely lift the ban on new Nuclear Power Plants and make construction possible.

Section IV: The tightened regulations will make Nuclear energy safer by performing inspections of the facility and the staff twice a year. More than three repeated offenses twice will cause ownership of the facilities to be given to the government or in severe cases the plant to be shut down. If staff members are found off task or labeled concerning in the inspection report, they will be fined \$300 for careless mistakes and \$500 for deliberate disobedience. Any act or fine repeated three times will result in the staff member being fired.

Section V: This bill will come into effect one year after passage.

Restriction of Mobile Communication Devices in Automotive Vehicles
Be it hereby enacted by the Annual Youth Legislature of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.
Section I. This bill prohibits the use of mobile communication devices including but not limited to cell phones, laptops, and in car phones for the driver in automobiles while the automobile is in drive.
Section II. In Kentucky a police officer will be allowed to pull over a car if the driver is using a mobile communication device while the automobile is in drive.
Section III. According to the University of Utah "Distraction from cell phone use while driving (hand held or hands free) extends a driver's reaction as much as having a blood alcohol concentration at the legal limit of .08 percent." Driving Drunk is illegal and killed 41,059 people in 2007 (www.alcoholalert.com). This bill could save lives.
Section IV. The first time a driver is caught using a mobile communication device while his/her car is in drive they must pay a \$100 fine. Second warning is \$150 and third is \$200. If the driver continues this behavior for a forth time he/she will have a week suspension of their license.

TITLE: An act to require a system of solar panels to create energy in factories that emit high levels of pollution in Kentucky.

ENACTING CAUSE: Be it hereby enacted by the Annual Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

BODY OF THE BILL:

SECTION 1: We will require that for every fifty-two atmospheric pounds of pollution that a factory puts into the environment, two solar panels will be installed. Solar panels do not create any air or water pollution and will be used to power the factories with solar electricity and heat.

SECTION 2: On average, a factory emits over 104 atmospheric pounds of pollution per year. These pollutants have all already gone into bodies of water and the atmosphere throughout Kentucky. These pollutants also cause large amounts of acid rain.

SECTION 3: A 1000 watt solar panel costs approximately \$10,000 and a 3000 watt solar panel costs approximately \$25,000. However, with the amount of money a factory will be saving in energy costs, a solar panel will pay itself off. Solar panels will also lower each factory's emissions, allowing the factory to avoid pollution fines from the government.

SECTION 4: This bill will be enforced by the Kentucky Department for Environmental Protection, Division for Air Quality. The number of solar panels required for each factory will be based on the results of ambient air quality tests and calculated per the ratio stated in Section 2.

SECTION 5: The factories where solar panels are installed will pay 100% of the cost for the solar panels. These factories will recoup this investment in lower energy bills and lower pollution fines.

SECTION 6: This bill will go into effect approximately two years after passage, and should be totally implemented in all factories within four years, resulting in all factories running on solar energy.
