Title: An act to replant one tree for every four trees that are cut down in Thailand.

BE IT HEREBY ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE UNITED NATIONS

Justification Clause: Thailand has a population of 64,631,595, with a ratio of 327 people per square mile. To put this in perspective, the United States of America has a ratio of 84 people per square mile. With limited amount of land area in Thailand, trees must be cut down in order to expand living quarters and make things work at an adequate amount of space. Though deforestation may be a necessity, nothing is being done to replenish the trees that are taken away. We propose that for every four trees that are removed, at least one tree (sapling) is replanted somewhere within Thailand.

Section I: The organization that conducts the deforestation will be responsible to replant the appropriate amount of trees in its place. A sapling is an immature tree that can be planted in the ground and grow naturally. A sapling can range from \$25 U.S. dollars to \$45 U.S. dollars which equates to 747 Thai Baht (Thailand currency). Each organization will be held responsible to cover the funding for this proposal. Marketing and sales for tree saplings will all be implemented by the country's market.

Section II: If an organization fails to replenish the sufficient amount of trees, a first offense will result in a warning. A second offense will result in a fine of 15,000 Baht (\$500 US dollars). A third offense will result in confiscation of the company's license for six months and double the previous fine.

Section III: Implementing this proposal would make Thailand a more nature-oriented country and also assist in an improved air quality. This proposal is offering an alternate solution to deforestation. If passed in Thailand, this would be an example to follow for other countries with similar issues. Starting in Thailand, this elucidation would have a global impact.

Section IV: This proposal will go into effect one year upon passage.
