Title: A proposal to limit our immigration to 5% of our population.

BE IT HEREBY ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE UNITED NATIONS

Justification Clause: Immigration in Switzerland has been growing and becoming very popular. Switzerland has a very good bank system, meaning that they can put their money in good hands. Our houses are cheap compared to the surrounding countries, limiting the space for existing residents. The higher demand raises the prices on houses, meaning less money for the Swiss. Approximately 23% of the population is immigrants.

Section I: We want to allow only 5% of the immigrants a year to become citizens of Switzerland. This will enable house prices to be lower and will decrease the overall population. This will only slightly raise the population. Since we have no percentage right now the population is making a dramatic increase. This will decrease the population of illegal immigrants.

Section II: Immigrants hold their money in our banks. This makes it harder for new citizens to put their money in accounts. Like other countries, there is only so much space, so with them taking control, it's harder to support the residents of Switzerland. Along with them putting money in our banks, banks have been having many bank robberies committed by immigrants. We are ranked number 1 with people in prison with bank robberies.

Section III: When immigrants come to Switzerland they find the houses that are more affordable, as a result they happen to occasionally buy more than one. Seeing as many immigrants buy houses the prices tend to increase. In other countries the price is very low. Yet the home owners and residents of Switzerland believe the prices are high.

Section IV: Since the immigrants are considered citizens, they go into the number of unemployment count. The number of unemployed went from 129,077 to 130,449 in just November 2012. The rate of unemployed went from 3.30 percent in December 2012 to 3.40 percent in January 2013. Along with this increase the average unemployment rate for Switzerland is 3.36 percent.

Section V: To become a citizen, they need to go through a series of tests and answer questions about Switzerland. If they pass the test, they get to become a citizen. Once the country reaches the 5% maximum limit, any other illegal immigrants will be deported.

Section VI: The Swiss government will cover the costs of deportation.

Section VI: This will go into effect 1 year after passage.
