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Title: **An act to create shelters capable of producing job skills and job opportunities to get human trafficking victims reintroduced to society**

**BE IT HEREBY ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE UNITED NATIONS**

Justification Clause: Human trafficking is a major problem. There are 1.3 million people that are trafficked in Argentina in a year. 180,000 of that number are kids under 18 years of age. Most of the human trafficking in Argentina is used for sexual exploitation, but some of it is used for forced labor into modern day slavery. Sexual exploitation is a threat to women, adolescents, and kids. Argentina's human trafficking imports people on the border of Paraguay and Brazil. If caught trafficking you could be put in jail for 3 to 15 years.

Section One: In order to fix this problem, we would ask for funding from the United Nations. This money would help initiate a plan called "A Step to a New Life" which would be a housing facility. A facility which would offer support, counseling, and a class of reintroduction into society and training for jobs. This would help people to effectively gain necessary for those who have been released from captivity due to the arrest of those who held them captive.

Section Two: In 200 the percentage of those being trafficked illegally was 66% women, 12% men, and 22% children. Over 160 countries around the world are known to be affected by human trafficking. As of January 2012, over 27 million people are believed to be personal or sexual slaves around the world.

Section Three: The global impact of this could possibly be more awareness of this issue, as well as, a call for creating these facilities in other countries. Also awareness could cause possible reduction of the rates of this issue in Argentina, Paraguay, and Brazil.

Section Four: This program will be funded by the UNODC until rates of human trafficking are decreased majorly in this country.
