Title: An act to reduce the amount of illegal drugs used among the people in Israel

BE IT HEREBY ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE UNITED NATIONS

Justification Clause: Over 300,000 people in Israel use illegal drugs on a daily basis. We believe that educating the youth, which contribute 70,000 in that statistic, will help to slowly decrease that number. We also plan to introduce random drug testing for the youth, and to increase the punishments on being caught with anything that is defined as an illegal drug.

Section 1: To reduce this among youth, a random drug test will be administered once a month in every Israeli school. The process will take three days at the most. Every student must take one. This will cost 10-30 dollars in American money, and this will be provided for by the Israel Anti-Drug Authority, and each school will decide how the test is given.

Section 2: On the first day of that drug testing, the Anti-Drug Authority will educate the students on the dangers and effects of drugs on the human body. This bit of education shall be given to both teachers and students, and the method of the teaching will be decided by the Drug Authority.

Section 3: The punishment for carrying an illegal drug shall be changed. If a person is caught carrying 15 grams or less of any substance defined as an illegal drug they shall be fined 200 U.S dollars or 746 sheqels. For a second offense this will be raised to 500 U.S dollars (1865 sheqels) and the offender documented for a certain period of time. For a third offense the person will be arrested. It does not matter what type of drug the offender is caught with, all punishments remain the same.

Section 4: The border patrol shall be on a heightened awareness for illegal substances, and those found trafficking these drugs will be arrested immediately, and if from a different country shall be banned from Israel from then on.
