Title: **An act to fairly compensate individuals who are evicted due to construction for the FIFA World Cup and Olympic Games.**

BE IT HEREBY ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE UNITED NATIONS

Justification Clause: Hosting an international sporting competition requires the investment of billions of dollars into construction of stadiums, housing for athletes and spectators, and infrastructure. To provide space for construction, it is usually necessary to evict large numbers of citizens from their homes. This may be acceptable if the evicted citizens are compensated for their property. However, too often the evicted are not adequately compensated for their homes, resulting in poverty, hunger, and exposure. For example, in order to construct the 31 necessary stadiums for the 2008 Summer Olympics in Beijing, the Chinese authorities forced approximately 1.5 million people from their urban homes, failing to compensate thousands of them.

Section I: To insure the full compensation of any evicted persons, the UN, the International Olympic Committee (IOC) and the Federation Internationale de Football Association (FIFA) shall require host nations of the Olympics or the World Cup to either:

- a) reimburse all evicted persons for at least fair market value of the acquired property, or
- b) provide a similar dwelling, of equal or greater value, that is already constructed.

Section II: This law shall be enforced by the IOC or FIFA, aided by the UN Human Rights Council, during inspection 18 months prior to competition.

Section III: This United Nations shall possess jurisdiction over the IOC and FIFA because the UN possesses jurisdiction over all member nations of both organizations, and the IOC and FIFA are collaborations of the global community.

Section IV: If a host nation is found during the 18-month inspection to be in violation of this law, it shall be officially warned and subjected to reinspection 6 months later. If upon second inspection the violation has not been resolved, the violating host shall be fined 500 million euros (US\$660 million) to be distributed to evicted persons. This sum shall not be considered part of the required compensation. The violating host shall be suspended from international competition until all evicted citizens are properly repaid, and the nation in question shall be prohibited from hosting future competitions.

Section 5: This law shall carry no monetary cost because the IOC and FIFA already regularly inspect host nations prior to competitions. The UN shall be in no way responsible for providing compensation to evicted individuals.

Section 6: This law shall take effect for the 2016 Rio de Janeiro Olympic Games.
