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Title: An act to assign and modify a national prescription drug tracking system.

BE IT HEREBY ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE UNITED NATIONS

Justification Clause: If one requires pharmaceutical medications, one must follow the correct procedure. One must first obtain a legal prescription from a certified physician by giving them the needed information. The next steps involve a specific amount of medications prescribed, based on condition and an electronic reporting of all prescriptions distributed to the patient.

Section I: This bill, if passed into law, will lower death rates caused by an over dosage of pharmaceutical treatments such as opioid painkillers. It will keep medications out of reach from potential abusers and will distribute the correct amount of drugs to those in serious need. It will also lessen crimes that are correlated with prescription drugs such as pharmacy robberies and breaking and entering within particular

Section II: This bill will be enforced by each country's Department of Public Safety. Provincial and metropolitan law officials as well as health physicians will also enforce this bill. They will put forth effort to educate and raise awareness on prescribing pharmaceuticals for pain related issues.

Section III: The system that is being proposed will do the following:

- 1. Control the dispersing of substances throughout the provinces by using an electronic report to track the buying, selling, and reselling of prescription medications.
- 2. Show all of the medications prescribed to the individual and the time period allotted to be dispensed.
- 3. Allow pharmacists and practitioners to have access to this electronic reporting.
- 4. Secure identity and credentials due to limited and protected access

Section IV: The electronic reporting system will not need any further funding since the system is already in effect in some provinces in Canada. This proposal will begin in Canada, and, if successful, will spread to other countries in need. Funding for countries after Canada will be decided based on financial state.

Section V: This will go into effect January 1, 2014.
