Title: **An act to increase educational opportunities for young women in order to prevent the tragedy of human trafficking.**

BE IT HEREBY ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE UNITED NATIONS

Justification Clause:

Human trafficking continues to plague many Eastern European countries. Our proposal is to provide Internet-based educational access to aid young people in avoiding trafficking as a means of escape from poverty in Bosnia-Herzegovina.

Section I: From 1992-1995, this region, once known as Yugoslavia under Communism, experienced a war which resulted in ethnic cleansing of certain groups. The war destroyed the infrastructure, education system, intellectual community, and economy of Bosnia-Herzegovina.

Section II: As a result of this tragic conflict, one of the dangers young people face is the lure of working in more wealthy countries. One of the means by which they immigrate is by human trafficking. In order to avoid being trafficked and removing the workers from Bosnia, we wish to promote the educational opportunities available to Bosnians, Serbs, and Croats in this country.

Section III: Our proposal is to start an educational access system that would enable the people to take Internet-based educational courses in math, geography, language, and reading from teachers recruited internationally. We are asking the United Nations to support this plan by providing affordable lap tops, Internet access, and stipends for teachers.

Section IV: A non profit entity will be set up to administer and maintain this Internet-based school for the citizens of Bosnia-Herzegovina. This entity will eventually be fully staffed by inhabitants but until the program is well-funded and well-established, it will be staffed by volunteers, interns, and retired teachers from various countries.

Section V: This proposal will go into effect in once an administrative staff is fully hired and a web-based program is designed for the tutoring, no later than December 2014.
