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Title: An act to stop the exportation of illegal drugs from India to countries in Europe and Asia.

BE IT HEREBY ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE UNITED NATIONS

Justification Clause:

India is the second largest producer of illicit Opium in the world (after Afghanistan), exporting drugs to Asia and Europe using the well-known route of the Silk Road since the 1800s. Opium is the main ingredient to produce heroine and other drugs, which have addictive properties. Although police in India have tried to destroy the illegal poppy crops (the flower that is used to create Opium), they have been unsuccessful in containing the problem. Tradition in India dictates that poppy in and of itself is not a harmful crop; however, exportation to other countries creates a problem as the poppy is being turned into illegal products. Currently, there is not a national drug enforcement agency (DEA) in India. The creation of a DEA would decrease the exportation of Opium from India.

Section I:

We propose to create a national DEA in India with the help of the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNoDC) to stop the illegal exportation of Opium from India. The DEA will provide undercover agents to infiltrate the drug trafficking rings in India, and the information gained from agents working on the cases will be given to the judicial system in order to prosecute the criminals.

Section II:

The DEA will work with the banking industry in India to track the bank accounts of suspected criminals. The average income of an Indian citizen is \$1,219 US dollars per year. If a person is making large withdrawals or deposits beyond this amount, they will be red flagged as a possible suspect. This will help provide the DEA with evidence against the suspects and aide in the conviction of drug traffickers.

Section III:

The DEA will provide more agents to monitor the Silk Road and other suspected routes that are used by the drug traffickers. This will shrink the access traffickers have to routes for the delivery of the illicit drugs.

Section IV:

This proposal will be enacted upon passage and the receipt of funds from the UNoDC.
