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Title: **An act to reduce human and sex trafficking throughout Jamaica.**

BE IT HEREBY ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE UNITED NATIONS

Justification Clause: Human and sex trafficking are one of the major issues in Jamaica. This crime can have a permanent effect on the victims, and there is a need for these victims to receive aid and services following such crimes. Drugs are another common problem that is widespread throughout Jamaica. Many houses are seized in drug raids conducted by police and government agencies. We are recommending that these houses be transformed into safe houses which can serve as a temporary residence for victims of human and sex trafficking crimes.

Section I: Homes that are involved in drug raids are immediately turned over to authorities. The Polaris Project will take the homes and transform them into a suitable living residence for human and sex trafficking victims. In addition to shelter, the Polaris Project will provide food, clothing, and other basic necessities for these victims. Furthermore, the Polaris Project will cooperate with local unemployment offices to find jobs and help reinstate these victims into society.

Section II: Many countries struggle with human and sex trafficking. A 2011 U.S. State Department report identifies several countries as being "Tier 3," meaning this trafficking is a worldwide problem and that their governments are not fully complying with worldwide efforts to reduce human and sex trafficking crimes. These countries include Algeria, Cuba, Iran, Kuwait, Lebanon, Madagascar, Papua New Guinea, Saudi Arabia, Sudan, Turkmenistan, Venezuela, Yemen, and Zimbabwe. These countries compare to the United States as it is Tier 1.

Section III: The United Nations will cooperate with the Polaris Project, and other respectable organizations that stand against human and sex trafficking to fund and direct this initiative. The UN will be responsible for funding 50% of this project. The remaining 50% of funding will be provided by the Jamaican government at their discretion.

Section IV: This proposal will be implemented in Jamaica upon approval by the United Nations assembly. Annual research will be conducted to determine if this project is successful in helping human and sex trafficking victims receive necessary services and reenter the productive society. If successful, this project could be introduced and implemented in the countries mentioned earlier. If approved, this mission will go in effect January 1, 2015.
