Title. An act to improve the infrastructure in Kuwait.

BE IT HEREBY ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE UNITED NATIONS

Justification Clause:

In 1990, Kuwait was invaded and annexed by neighboring Iraq. The seven month-long Iraqi occupation came to an end after a direct military intervention by United States-led forces. Around 773 Kuwaiti oil wells were set ablaze by the retreating Iragi army, resulting in a major environmental and economic catastrophe. Kuwait's infrastructure; such as roads, bridges, electricity, water, sewer and communications was badly damaged during the war and had to be rebuilt. Twelve years later, Kuwait saw another massive foreign military presence as it served as a springboard for the U.S.-led campaign in 2003 to oust Iraqi leader Saddam Hussein. The destruction of the infrastructure has left many Kuwaitis in poverty and living on the streets without basic services such as running water, electricity and communication. With help from the UN, Kuwait will be able to provide basic services to its people and improve the transportation of goods and services for the hardest hit areas of the country.

Section I:

To help rebuild the transportation infrastructure, we propose that the United Nations Office of Economic and Social Affairs help Kuwait to revitalize the roads and transportation in areas affected by the wars through their small-scale infrastructure investment projects. Kuwait has approved its own 2010-2014 development plan of its own, allocating nearly \$115 billion to develop infrastructure and continue to improve basic services. With help from the UNOESA, Kuwait will be able to not only to ease human suffering and provide basic services, we will be able to improve transportation of goods and services and improve the economic recovery of the most damaged areas.

Section II:

Kuwait will provide \$115 billion to improve basic services. The United Nations Office of Economic and Social Affairs will provide the funds for improving the transportation infrastructure of the most damaged areas through its small-scale infrastructure investment projects.

Section III:

Kuwait will provide 115 billion and the UNOESA will provide funds for transportation infrastructure projects.
