Title: **An act to use UNICEF funds to build orphanages, set up a foreign adoption agency, and to publicize the adoption of Mongolian children.**

BE IT HEREBY ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE UNITED NATIONS

Justification Clause: : When the economy crashed in 1989 thousands of Mongolians were put out of work. The swift change from a Chinese Communist government to a 'free' Democracy left the land stricken with poverty, and thousands of children were left on the street by their parents to live a life that goes beyond the definition of unbearable. Over the last twenty years, since the collapse of the Soviet Union and the end of socialism in Mongolia, a steady flow of migrants have left harsh conditions in the countryside to seek better access to jobs, services, and education in the cities. As of 2010, 45% of the country's population lived in the capital city of Ulaanbaatar. The change in economic structure left the government unstable with no means of social services implemented i.e. Orphanages, Foster Care Networks, etc. Children are abandoned and left on the street to fend for themselves.

Section I: The UNICEF Children's Emergency Relief Fund will provide funds to build twenty-five orphanages strategically placed around the country to benefit the maximum number of children possible. UNICEF will also set up an agency to publicize more adoptions from around the world.

Section II: If UNICEF notices that the number of street children has not decreased within two years, more orphanages may be built, depending on the success of the first twenty-five, and if there is a need to build more.

Section III: If the orphanages along with the program to publicize adoptions does not meet up to UNICEF standards, UNICEF will establish branches of the agency in large countries such as the United States and the United Kingdom to better establish adoptions in countries with higher adoption rates.

Section IV: Guidelines, policies, and procedures will be enforced by UNICEF.
