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Title: An act to increase vocational knowledge in Nigeria by introducing a standard for education.

BE IT HEREBY ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE UNITED NATIONS

Justification Clause: The current education system in Nigeria only requires you to go to six years of primary education. This system doesn't allow for people entering the workforce to have the education required to obtain a specialized profession. This standard will change the education requirement and allow for more specialized classes, thereby allowing for more specialized jobs.

SECTION I: To increase the specialized job workforce in Nigeria, a program will be created under the title: Nigerian Education Standard (NES). This program will require schools in Nigeria to offer classes that give students skills for specific jobs such as plumbing, carpentry, and metalwork. In order to graduate, students will be required to participate in a 6 month special training program, or take an internship for one year.

SECTION II: The NES program will require extra classes, and therefore extra specially trained teachers. These classes will be initially funded for 5 years by the UNESCO (United Nation Education, Scientific, and Cultural Organization). The organization will have the ability to access job and education statistics so they can measure the success of the project and make decisions about continuing to fund the project.

SECTION III: The teachers in this program will be chosen from a pool of volunteers. Alternatively, teachers with knowledge can apply for this position, with the same requirements of a normal teaching position with extra requirements. The teachers will be selected based on previous knowledge and commitment.

SECTION IV: This proposal will be enforced by UNESCO and the Nigerian government. The government will have random checkups on the special classes to see if the school is offering the NES program. If a school is not abiding by this proposal, they will suffer the penalties listed below in Section IV.

SECTION V: If a school does not require or provide the extra classes, they will be fined in increasing amounts. All fines will be refunded to UNESCO.

1st Offense: 790.26 Nigerian Nairas per student (5 USD)

2nd Offense: 1580.52 Nigerian Nairas per student (10 American dollars)

3rd Offense: The Nigerian government will shut down the school and relocate the students.

SECTION VI: This proposal will go into effect once necessary volunteers are in place, not to exceed one year.
