Title: **An act to promote health-care and well-being for the people of Vietnam.**

BE IT HEREBY ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE UNITED NATIONS

Justification Clause: In Vietnam, 75% of the citizens live in rural communities. Currently, there are 11,699 clinics and health stations in these areas. Although this is a large amount, 70% do not have doctors and it can be a two day wait for critical surgeries. In comparison, first-world countries such as the United States or Canada would perform the surgery within hours. Vietnam will send doctors to be educated in medical schools in France and the United States, thus increasing the number of doctors and health-care providers in Vietnam.

Section I: In order to educate Vietnamese students in the medical field, there will be rigorous and competitive application process to select students for a medical school education. They must meet a high standard of academic accomplishments, present a willingness to learn, and be able to fluently speak French or English. Because Vietnam is heavily influenced by its former protectorate, France, students who are fluent in French shall be sent abroad to France to University of New Caledonia in order complete their schooling upon. They shall agree to return to Vietnam and work in a clinic in a rural community for a minimum of eight years. English speaking students can apply to medical schools in the United States.

Section II: Students who are sent abroad to medical school must agree to return to a clinic in need of a doctor. Failure to do so will result in full payment of higher education by the student.

Section III: The student's education will be financed by the Vietnamese Government who has 18 million dollars for healthcare usage. The World Health Organization also offers scholarship opportunities in the field of public health medicine. Students may also qualify for scholarships from their chosen medical school.

Section IV: This proposal will become effective immediately after passage.
