An act to base the organization of all school districts on hard work, achievement, grades, and behavior.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: This bill will require Kentucky students to be placed into schools based on their achievement, hard work, and classroom behavior. This system will prepare students for college and future careers by teaching the importance of working to achieve goals.

Section 2: This will encourage Kentucky's students to put forth more effort in their school work and classroom behavior in order to behavior in order to be accepted to the schools with the best facilities, curriculum, and extracurricular activities. This will help prepare them for real-life scenarios in which the harder they work, the more they, and society, benefit.

Section 3: These schools allow students to learn at their own pace, along with other students who share their same work ethic and type of classroom behavior.

Section 4: Children with special needs will be welcome in every school. There will be no discrimination based on learning ability. Acceptance to the most desirable schools will be based on work ethic, behavior, and hard work.

Section 5: This system will be fluid to guarantee that all students have repeated opportunities to advance to the most desirable schools.

Section 6: All schools will have effective teachers, adequate resources, and clean, safe environments. The schools for the highest achieving students, however, will be housed in the newest buildings, have the most rigorous curriculums, and offer the highest number and most diverse extracurricular activities and enrichment activities.

Section 7: This system is similar to that of the system students use to apply to colleges. Students with the best grades, most accomplishments, and strongest work ethic are able to attend the most prestigious colleges. This system has been developed to help students learn the importance of education, and give the greatest number possible the tools needed to be successful in their futures.

Section 8: This bill will go into effect on January 1, 2014
