An act to provide for the storage of harmful methamphetamine waste at the Blue Grass Army Depot.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: Dangerous chemicals left behind in former methamphetamine labs may be lurking inside thousands
of homes, in areas innocent bystanders might not expect. This waste is harmful to communities and
responders tasked with cleaning up former labs. Improper cleanup may leave communities filled with danger,
and the problems can linger for years. The Blue Grass Army Depot is a highly sophisticated military storage
facility specially designed to contain dangerous munitions and chemical weapons. It contains 1,153
buildings, 902 igloos, and 3,233,598 square feet of storage space.

Section 2: This bill will direct the Kentucky State Police to establish a partnership with the U.S. Drug
Enforcement Agency to promulgate waste disposal procedures upon the discovery of a meth lab, allowing
such waste to be stored at designated containers at the Blue Grass Army Depot. Specifically, specially
trained agents shall be tasked with packaging and disposing of the lab's toxic waste. The KSP and DEA shall
establish appropriate regulations for containment and transportation in consultation with trained experts.

Section 3: Operational costs would be reduced by using an existing military facility. The personnel and security resources already present at the Blue Grass Army Depot will be sufficient to carry out the promulgations called for in this bill. Existing state funding for meth lab clean up, as well as federal funds available through the Community Oriented Policing Services should cover additional costs.
