An act to allow minors to access outpatient mental health services without parental consent.

## Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section I: Minors aged twelve or older and who are deemed mature enough to participate intelligently in their own mental health treatment process by a professional person may consent to outpatient mental health services. A professional person includes licensed therapists, licensed educational psychologists, licensed psychologists, and board certified or board eligible psychiatrists. Outpatient services include psychiatric and biopsychiatric assessment, individual, group, and family therapy sessions, psychotherapy for crisis, and psychological testing.

Section II: This bill allows minors whose parents do not condone mental health services and would refuse to
 consent to service to seek mental health treatment. This bill also would allow homeless minors as well as
 allowing youth who feel embarrassed or ashamed telling their parents of their need for mental health
 services to seek mental health services.

Section III:Parental Involvement will still be encouraged unless the professional treating the patient deems
 that involvement would inappropriate after consulting the minor. The professional would then be required to
 state why parental involvement is inappropriate in patient records.

Section IV: Under this bill the minor's parents or guardians will not held liable for payment if the professional
 treating the minor. However, if the parent or guardian participates in the mental health treatment then the
 parent or guardian will be responsible for only the services they participated in.

Section V: Parental participation does not allow the parents or guardians to access confidential records. The provider of mental health services may share related mental health records with the parents or guardians with the written consent of the minor.

Section VI: Parental consent would still be required for the minor to receive convulsive therapy,
 psychsurgery, or psychotropic drugs.
