An act to lower the legal driving age to fifteen, under the appropriate circumstances.

## Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: In the Commonwealth of Kentucky, the current law states that once an individual reaches the age of sixteen, he or she is eligible to apply for their Learner's Permit. In order to get the full license, this individual must carry their Learner's Permit for a minimum of six months and drive a total of sixty hours. After this period of time, they can take a road test and, upon passage, become eligible for the Intermediate License. Six months after the Intermediate License, this person may obtain their full license. This bill would allow teenagers to receive their Learner's Permit at fifteen, and their full driver's license at sixteen and a half.

Section 2: Once an individual reaches the age of fifteen, they can apply for their Learner's Permit. After receiving their Learner's Permit, he or she must attend a mandatory driver's-education class, and they must hold their permit for six months. After these six months have passed and the individual has taken a state-regulated road test, he or she may apply for a waiver that grants permission for them to travel between school, work, and home at fifteen and a half years of age. After another six months have elapsed, and the individual has driven for a minimum of 100 hours, 25 hours of which have been at dark, they may apply for their intermediate license. After another six months, if the driver has a driving record with no more than 6 points, they may apply for their full license.

Section 3: This bill provides the opportunity for teenage drivers to gain more experience behind the wheel at an earlier age. Teenagers would have more time to develop proper driving techniques and skill, against the traditional one year currently required before receiving a full license. Also, teenagers would gain more responsibility and maturity through this process

Section 4: The teenager would only have to drive with a licensed adult over the age of 21 until they are approved over their waver. After this point, they are restricted to only having immediate family members in the car with them while the teenager is driving. After they are granted their intermediate license, this individual will be restricted to the same passenger requirements that are currently implemented in the intermediate license.

Section 5: Receiving a restricted license at 16 aids the stimulation of the economy, with more motor vehicles being purchased, more income readily available for the teenagers to spend on commerce, and more money being spent on insurance and gas. The younger driving age provides an incentive for teenagers to be more responsible, and begin working at a younger age, which further stimulates the economy.

Section 6: This bill would go into effect on August 1, 2015.
