| 1 2 | An act to eliminate earmarks on legislative bills in the state of Kentucky. |
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| 2 3 4 | Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky |
| 5 6 7 8 9 10 | Section 1:"Earmarks" are the add-ons to a legislative bill. This is a technique used by lawmakers across the country to get programs passed. When an earmark is added, often more money is spent on legislation than the cost of the act/program which was initially proposed in the title of the bill. Currently in the state of Kentucky, a bill can be passed with multiple earmarks, which would implicate a tremendous amount of excess spending. |
| 11 12 13 14 | Section 2: This bill will require that any bill proposed is limited to only one subject, clearly defined in its title, and thoroughly described in the body of the bill. The bill will be voted on as such without any addition earmarks (``pork''). |
| 15 16 17 18 | Section 3: The purpose of this legislation is to prevent bills with multiple subjects from being passed by the legislators when no single subject could be passed on its own merits. This implies that each bill is allotted one subject, which is defined in the title, and no earmarks added. |
| 19 20 21 22 23 24 | Section 4: This bill will make it more understandable for the civilian in order to comprehend legislative bills and understand the main issue that is at hand. This bill will eliminate funding to other projects, found in earmarks, which have no ties to the actual bill. When bills have earmarks attached, the money that citizens pay in taxes go to cover the cost of the bill itself, and all addition pork. Passing this bill will vanquish the deceitfulness involved in the process of earmarking. |
| 25 26 27 | Section 5: There will be little cost to enact this law. The bill has much potential to save the state of Kentucky money by eliminating earmarks, and minimizing tax money going in to fund unessential programs. |
| 28 | Section 6: If passed, this bill will take effect during the legislative session in 2015 to give the politicians |

enough time to learn the new guidelines for writing bills.
