- 1 An act to require fast food restaurants to use recycled paper bags for children's toys instead of plastic bags.  
2
- 3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
4
- 5 Section 1: All children meal toys distributed by commercial fast food restaurants are to be package in  
6 recyclable paper bags instead of plastic bags.  
7
- 8 Section 2: This bill will reduce the suffocation hazards plastic bags pose for small animals and children. It will  
9 also reduce pollution and will require less landfill space.  
10
- 11 Section 3: The cost per ton of recycled paper bags is \$10. The cost per ton of plastic bags is \$240. A  
12 difference of \$230 per ton will be cost effective in addition to providing positive health and environmental  
13 benefits. This will be paid for by the restaurants, as it is now.  
14
- 15 Section 4: Failure to use recycled paper bags will result in a fine of \$500 for the first offense. The second  
16 offense will result in a \$700 fine. Every subsequent infraction will result in a \$1000 fine. It will be enforced  
17 by the Louisville Metro Department of Public Health & Wellness Food Hygiene Program.  
18
- 19 Section 5: This bill will go into effect on June 1, 2015.
