- 1 An act to allow citizens of the state of Kentucky the right to collect an optional local sales tax.
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- 3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**
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- 5 Section 1: Voters will be granted the right to decide what projects the monies collected will be used for, how
- 6 much money will be raised, how long the tax will be collected and what percentage will be collected. The
- 7 affect would be the funds could be used for a new library, community swimming pool, sports arena or
- 8 projects downtown that will help attract new companies to locate in Kentucky. The communities will have the
- 9 power to decide.

- 11 Section 2: This bill requires no funding and actually will create funds for municipalities to use for much
- 12 needed projects throughout Kentucky and in turn create more jobs. The Department of Revenue would be
- 13 responsible for collections of this tax and local authorities would disperse it. The funds will NOT go into the
- 14 General Fund.
- 15
- 16 Section 3: This tax does not apply to automobiles, medicine, food, Real estate, income or utilities, so it does
- 17 NOT pose a burden for the needy.

- 19 Section 4: This bill will go into effect 90 days after passage.
