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1 2 3	An act to all public venues that serve alconolic beverages to have a breathalyzer test policy for any patron suspected of being intoxicated.
3 4	Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky
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6 7	Section I: This bill would require all public venues (bars, restaurants, night clubs, sports facilities) that
8	serve alcoholic beverages to own, operate and enforce a breathalyzer test for all patrons that
8 9	are in question of being intoxicated or over the legal limit.
10 11	Section II: By enforcing this policy, the owner/manager of such venues will have the right to refuse
12	service to any person that fails or is at risk of being over the limit of alcohol consumption.
13	This policy will help reduce the amount of drunk drivers and the number of accidents related to
14 15	drinking and driving.
16	Section III: While most restaurants enforce a two drink limit on their customers, many patrons
17 18	consume alcohol before they arrive causing them to be inebriated either before or after their first drink on location. Based on this information, all patrons who consume alcohol will be
19	subject to a mandatory breathalyzer test or service will be refused by the venue
20	owner/manager.
22	Section IV: The policies set forth by this bill will be enforced by the local health inspectors of each
23	city/county/state. The owner of the venue will be responsible for purchasing the breathalyzer

26	breathalyzer test to patrons of their business.
27 28	Section V: Penalties for non-compliance will result as follows:

30	2nd Offense: Owner will be fined a minimum of \$1500.00

34	Section VI: This bill will go into effect 3 months after passage.
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
