An act to enhance the welfare system

## Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: People in Kentucky on welfare receive money to fund the expenses of life that they have. The government spends \$131.9 billion one welfare annually; this is not including food stamps or unemployment. In 2010 the amount of money spent in Kentucky alone on welfare peaked at 3.5 billion. By 2018 the amount of money spent is estimated to reach 3.2 billion. Some of those welfare users take advantage of this system and use the money that they are given for unnecessary items that are not beneficial to one's health. We want to prevent them those users who manipulate the welfare system and do not use it for actual necessities from doing so.

Section 2: We want to implement a system where all welfare users have a specific indication of whether or not they are on welfare on their form of identification (i.e.– driver's license). This indication would show if one is on welfare, and would allow or not allow them to purchase alcohol or tobacco products. Welfare users would also receive a prepaid Visa card each month, instead of a check or cash, with the amount of money they are given and allowed to spend on necessities. This would prevent users from using the money on drugs and alcohol and restrict them to only buying things necessary for good health. This implementation would cost money for getting the Visa cards, but overall it would save paper in terms of not giving the users a check or cash monthly, thus helping the environment and the economy. It would benefit the society and help the person on welfare live a healthy life style. Maintaining a healthy life style not only benefits you physically but mentally as well.

Section 3: The penalties for not accepting these implementations, or continuing to abuse the money given would be to do some sort of manageable job (i.e.-picking up trash on highways), or to decline the offered job and receive no more funds until the person decides to accept the implementations. The mandatory volunteer work will help the community and will create a good work ethic, showing that one can achieve a goal with determination and hard work to receive what they want.

Section 4: This bill will go into effect January 1st the year after it has been passed.
