An act to require all elementary, middle, and high schools to have a school resource officer on campus at all times.

## Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: School shootings are huge tragedies that affect families and communities for years afterward. These killers often face no opposition in schools, other than a few unarmed individuals. "The only way to stop a bad guy with a gun is with a good guy with a gun." School resource officers would be a vital asset in stopping and preventing school shootings from occurring. They are also instrumental in stopping fights, bullying, thefts, and other problems at school. More than 90 percent of the officers avert between one and 25 violent acts in an average school year.

Section 2: A study by the state of Illinois has shown that more than half of the school attacks ended before law enforcement arrived. These officers would provide a much faster response method to attacks compared to standard law enforcement interventions. The payment for these officers would come out of the local school district's budget, replacing things such as classroom and building repairs, which could be done less often.

Section 3: These resource officers are former police officers who have to have been an officer for a minimum of five years. These officers remain active law enforcement when school is not in session, so they are experienced and highly trained individuals whose job is to protect and serve their local community. These officers also should organize school-based programs to educate students about their job and law related topics.

Section 4: This bill will take effect on the beginning of the school year in 2014.
