An act to prevent further damage to Kentucky due to mountaintop removal

## Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: Mountaintop coal removal has played a major role as a way to make money in Kentucky since the 1970's. What some Kentuckians consider their "life" others consider murder. This bill will make it illegal for mountaintop removal to be used as a means of mining coal in Kentucky. By doing so, this will preserve the health of citizens, the cleanliness of the water, and one of the most biologically diverse areas in our hemisphere. Statistics show that cancer rates of those exposed to the health hazards of mountaintop removal are up 5%. Water becomes contaminated from breakages of sludge ponds. The Big Sandy River, one of many, is 95% sediment impaired; researchers have reported that mountaintop removal is the cause of the high sediment. Furthermore, around 300 mountains and over one million acres of land have been destroyed due to mountaintop removal.

Section 2: The cost of the changes may seem great for the coal companies. It is cheaper to remove the mountaintops than to send men under the ground, but the safety of humans and animals has become a major concern.

Section 3: This bill will ensure that all mountaintop removal in Kentucky is stopped. Coal needs to be mined in the safest way possible to preserve the health of the land, water, and the people.

Section 4: For any company which has not abandoned any and all attempts at mountaintop removal by the date provided below will be: first offense will be a \$10,000 fine; second offense will result in license to mine being revoked.

Section 5: The terms of this bill will be enforced by the Divisions of Permits in the Energy and Envionmental Department and overseen by the Office of Surface Mining.

Section 6: All laws or parts of laws in conflict with this bill are hereby considered null and void.

Section 7: This bill will go into effect January, 2015.
