6 7 9 10 11 12 13	Section 1:In times of financial stress, it becomes increasingly important to attract industries and corporations to Kentucky in order to stimulate the growth of Kentucky's economy. In order to do this, Kentucky's current uncompetitive corporate income tax rate must be revised so that it becomes more profitable for private industries to operate and therefore flourish in Kentucky. With this growth in Kentucky's industry, Kentucky students will have increased job opportunities that will require the knowledge of science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) content areas. To make both of the two aforementioned goals feasible, the current tax code of Kentucky and boost the economy, as well as increasing the education quality of Kentucky's future labor force.
14 15 16 17 18	Section 2:The Commonwealth of Kentucky's state sales tax shall be increased from six percent to seven percent. Current items that are exempt will remain so. This will raise approximately \$516,666,000 more than the current rate.
19 20	Section 3:A portion of the increased revenue (approximately \$374,000,000, the current revenue brought in by the corporate income tax), shall go towards compensating for the elimination of the Kentucky State Corporate Income Tax. The overall state revenue shall not be compromised in any way.
21 22 23 24 25 26 27 28 29	Section 4:The remaining portion of the increased revenue (approximately \$142,666,000) shall go towards the establishment of a grant program to be named the Henry Clay STEM endowment fund. This fund shall specifically provide monetary support to local high school programs that enrich student's exposure to content concerning the areas of science, technology, engineering, and mathematics as to help prepare them for integration into Kentucky's workforce. Kentucky schools will have the opportunity to apply for funding through the grant program and will be given monetary support based on the state's discretion.
30 31	Section 5: The bill will go into effect upon the commencement of the Commonwealth of Kentucky's next fiscal year, beginning July 1st, 2014.
