An act compelling all accredited schools (PK-12) to stock un-designated epinephrine auto-injectors for emergency use in treating anaphylactic reactions.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: In April of this year, Kentucky Governor Steve Beshear signed a law encouraging Kentucky schools to stock two epinephrine auto-injectors (commonly called Epi-Pens) for use by students who do not already have Epi-Pens on site at a school. This bill would make this policy mandatory rather than 'encouraged'.

Section 2: This bill will require all accredited schools, public and private, covering grades PK-12 to stock and have available for immediate use not less than three Epi-Pens for emergency use in treating anaphylactic reactions. These Epi-Pens will not be allocated for specific students; such Epi-Pens will be considered 'undesignated'.

Section 3: Schools will still be free to maintain a supply of student-provided Epi-Pens that are intended solely for the use of a specific student.

Section 4: The schools' supply of Epi-Pens will be replenished on a bi-annual basis.

Section 5: Epi-Pens will only be administered by trained school personnel when the person administering the Epi-Pen reasonably believes that the signs and symptoms of an anaphylactic reaction are present.

Section 6: Selected school personnel must undergo bi-annual training in the detection of anaphylactic reactions and the administering of the Epi-Pen.

Section 7: The schools will obtain the Epi-Pens from their local county Health Department.

Section 8: Current state law already provides that school personnel shall not be held liable for civil damages in connection with the use of Epi–Pens if they had a good faith belief that the student was having allergic or anaphylactic reaction. This provision of the current law will also be applicable for this bill.

Section 9: This law will go into effect at the beginning of the year 2015. Schools in Kentucky will have a six month period at the start of the year to begin the process of obtaining the Epi-Pens.
