1 An act to create a sustainability committee focused on the education of agriculture in developing countries.

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**Be it hereby enacted by the General Assembly of the United Nations**

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5 Justification Clause: Guatemala has one of the world’s lowest literacy rates, and their infant mortality rates is  
6 one of the highest in the world. Most of these problems can be solved through education. People should be  
7 educated about efficient agricultural practices in the form of sustainable solutions. Education can help solve  
8 the large poverty rate common among Guatemalans; furthermore, it can save lives by teaching basic sanitary  
9 skills.

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11 Section I: The sustainability committee will receive an annual funding of three million dollars. This money will  
12 be provided by the Economic Commission of Latin America and the Caribbean (ECLAC) and the Economic  
13 Social Council (ECOSOC). The committee will be named the Committee for Sustainable Education and  
14 Agriculture (CSEA). The money will never touch any government hands and will only be used by the  
15 committee.

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17 Section II: The sustainability committee will focus 70% of its funds and resources towards a U.N. member  
18 country selected by a non partial board that assesses need of underdeveloped countries. The non-partial  
19 board will select countries on criteria, such as mortality, education, poverty, and starvation rates. Countries  
20 undergoing violent conflicts won’t be considered until those conflicts are resolved. The other 30% will be  
21 allotted to the selected countries from the previous two years. This money will be used to continue the work  
22 that began when the country was initially selected. After a year has passed, the selection process will occur  
23 again, and the focus will shift to a new country.

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25 Section III: The funds will be provided for the procurement and transportation of educators. The remaining  
26 funds will be utilized for the purchase of necessary agrarian capital. This capital will include, but not be  
27 limited to gardening tools, farm equipment, computers and related technology. The educators will inform  
28 native people about topics such as sustainable farming techniques, basic sanitation advice, and long and  
29 short term benefits of cooperating with this program. To ensure efficiency, the educators will be assigned  
30 regions, and a director will be assigned to manage a large number of regions with educators.

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32 Section IV: A mutually beneficial contract will be established with the organizations of Doctors without  
33 Borders and Farmers without Borders. This will lessen the strain on the committee’s fund, while helping these  
34 organizations achieve their mission statements. The aforementioned organizations will be responsible for  
35 recruiting the doctors and supporting them throughout the cycle.
