An act to decriminalize homosexuality within Kenya.

Be it hereby enacted by the General Assembly of the United Nations

Justification Clause: Since 2012, the Central African Republic has been in turmoil with itself as the government battles Séléka, a coalition of rebel groups including the Union of Democratic Forces for Unity (UFDR) and the Convention of Patriots for Justice and Peace (CPJP). This conflict has resulted in the former president fleeing from the country, a struggling interim government, the attack of Christian civilians, and more recently, the mass attack of Muslim civilians by Christian "anti-balaka" militias that the UN has deemed to be guilty of "ethnic-religious cleansing." These attacks have led to the government declaring war on Christian mob groups and have been so violent that even the Taliban and Al Qaeda has condemned the killings. With the deaths of thousands and around a quarter of the country's population fleeing the country, the establishment of a UN Peacekeeping mission will help contain and quell the ongoing violence and create a more stable governmental force.

Section I: Upon the agreement of the General Assembly, the Security Council will authorize a deployment of a UN Peacekeeping operation to the Central African Republic.

Section II: The Secretary General will appoint a Head of Mission, Force Commander, and Police Commissioner as he deems fit. The Department of Peacekeeping Operations (DPKO) and the Department of Field Support (DFS) will staff the civilian components of the Central African Republic peacekeeping operation.

Section III: Mandates of UNMCAR should include human rights and the rule of law with a focus on religious understanding and tolerance, security and protection of civilians, the establishment of a stable and functioning long-term government, the mediation of peace talks between the government of the Central African Republic and Séléka, as well as other provisions which the Secretary General, the Head of Mission deem necessary.

Section IV: The current budget as of July 1, 2013 for peacekeeping is set at \$7.83 billion (A/C.5/68/21) to cover 15 current UN Peacekeeping operations with all member states contributing to this fund under UN Resolution A/67/224. The allocation of funds for a new Peacekeeping force in the Central African Republic will come from these funds based on a budget created by the appointed senior officials as well as considering A/RES/67/239.

Section V: The Central African Republic peacekeeping budget will include the size of the peacekeeping force to be deployed and will be based on the current demonstrated need of the Central African Republic in comparison to current peacekeeping operations.

Section VI: The peacekeeping force will be finalized by the July 1, 2014 in order to appoint officials, establish a budget, and reallocate current funds so that the Central African Republicmay receive an emergency deployment beginning in the July 1, 2014 to June 30, 2015 fiscal year.
