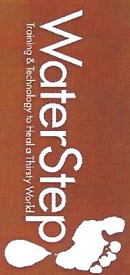

WaterStep ends fighting in Philippines as U of L students fill demand needs

PHILADELPHIA — WaterStep is ending its fighting in the Philippines as University of Louisville students fill demand needs.

Philippines Disaster Response

Water is essential. Responding is Critical.

History of Responding

Proven. Reliable. Sustainable.

During a disaster our most valuable resource, WATER, is contaminated with waste, decay and disease.

COSTA RICA

WaterStep responded to a 6.9 earthquake in Costa Rica in 2009, by setting up water relief stations in the affected area. They were able to provide safe water to seven communities along with relief workers from Red Cross, Salvation Army and the Columbian Army.

HAITI

In response to the catastrophic earthquake in 2010, WaterStep installed 37 purification systems, providing safe water to over 30,000 people.

CONTINUING PROMISE

WaterStep supplied safe water in 2010, 2011, 2012 to 60,000 per year at medical clinics sponsored by USNS Comfort at multiple Central and South American ports.

PAKISTAN

During 2010 and 2011's devastating floods, two Pakistani-Americans took 200 water chlorinators to Pakistan and provided hundreds and thousands people with access to safe water.

INDIA

In 2013, the Uttarakhand areas of northern India was devastated by flooding. WaterStep responded by sending a team to support other non-profits during relief work. Water relief stations were set up for five communities that were isolated by washouts.

PHILIPPINES

Through generous donors, WaterStep responded to Typhoon Haiyan in 2013 by training 47 different non-profit organizations and donating 60 water purifiers. Literally thousands of people are drinking safe water today.

WaterStep has helped bring over **46 million gallons** of safe water to over **30 countries** through our water purification units and mini-water treatment plants.

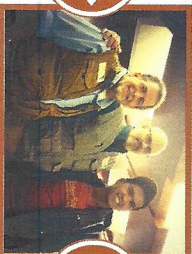
The Process

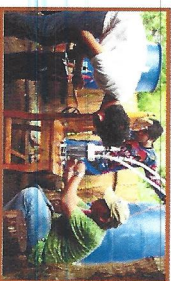
