1 An act to appoint a committee to evaluate and approve or reject the Applicants for the Witness Protection  
2 Program for Human Trafficking.  
3

4 **Be it hereby enacted by the General Assembly of the United Nations**

6 Justification Clause: Malaysia is on the Tier Two Watch List for Human Trafficking; Tier two meaning there is  
7 a low to moderate trafficking reported. This, we believe, is just a mere understatement. In 2010 just 51  
8 individuals were pinned with 174 charges. Only 14 were convicted, and only half that the previous year.  
9 There are 141 more trafficking cases reported and floating around the court system. How many victims that  
10 came forward and pressed charges, were protected; out of the entire witness protection, only 26 people  
11 were taken into protective custody. It isn't even a certain fact that any of those people were trafficking  
12 victims, there have only been 26 people since 2009; this is a pressing problem.

14 Section 1: Currently Malaysia has 1 Director General that makes the decisions as to who is permitted in the  
15 program. There are 29,628, 392 people in Malaysia, that means one man, has to deal with hundreds, maybe  
16 even thousands of cases. The man that appoints the Director General in charge may appoint some assistants  
17 as well but only if deemed fit.

19 Section 2: We would like to establish a committee under the Witness Protection Program that is specifically  
20 for Human Trafficking and forced labor. There will be thirteen members of the committee, one member  
21 designated to each state in Malaysia. They will work with the state law enforcement to take applicants and  
22 present them in front of the committee. This will ensure no applicant isn't fully considered. The victims are  
23 usually threatened when they finally come forward and press charges, hopefully this will help prosecute more  
24 human traffickers, and decrease the number of people being trafficked. The committee members will be  
25 chosen by the Minister, who chooses the Director General currently.

27 Section 3: The funding will come from the International Labour Organization (ILO), Coalition Against  
28 Trafficking in Women (CATW), and the Malaysian Anti-Corruption Commission (MACC). This will only cost  
29 about \$250,000 a year.

31 Section 4: This will encourage surrounding countries to enforce stricter rules on Human Trafficking. This is an  
32 international issue, many of the trafficked people in Malaysia are from Indonesia, Nepal, India, China,  
33 Thailand, Burma, the Philippines, Cambodia, Laos, Bangladesh, Pakistan, and Vietnam. Some are even  
34 Trafficked to Japan, China, and Singapore. With this committee we will take more traffickers out of the  
35 business.

37 Section 5: This proposal will go into effect one year after passing.
