An act to reduce trafficking in persons through education

**Be it hereby enacted by the General Assembly of the United Nations**

Justification Clause: Trafficking in persons is the forceful transfer, harboring, or recruitment of any person. The UN ranks countries based on their fulfillment of their trafficking prevention program, Tier 3 being the worst. Some of these countries, like Cuba, don't have any laws restricting prostitution for children under the age of 16, making children more likely to be trafficked against their will. The governments in many of these countries deny their current problems making reform difficult. Educating students is one step towards stopping trafficking among children in countries with a severe problem.

Section I: The goal of this proposal is to educate students in schools on how to avoid trafficking in persons, be it sex trafficking or forced labor. Students from ages 11 to 18 would be educated on how to detect and avoid viable traffickers and should be educated on how to inform the police. Specialists will be sent in with a new curriculum to train teachers how to thoroughly instruct kids what to do in cases of trafficking.

Section II: The United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC) will fund the program. First, educators who are specialists on trafficking in children and how to prevent it will be sent into Tier 3 countries. Then they will educate the teachers in schools inside of that country. The teachers will instruct the students on how to avoid being trafficked and how to detect and inform the police if they see someone that could be a trafficker.

Section III: The countries that this proposal affects are Tier 3 countries in trafficking in persons. Once this proposal is in effect, any Tier 3 countries that don't comply have 5% of their funding from the United Nations cut off. Each month that these countries do not comply the percent increases by an additional 5% so that the countries will be put under pressure to accept the new program.

Section IV: This proposal, if passed, will be enacted within 4 months.
