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A proposal to strengthen the education of Ireland's police force to better identify trafficked humans and to aid the victims of trafficking.

Be it hereby enacted by the General Assembly of the United Nations

Justification Clause: Ireland is the human trafficking center of the world. Its trafficking industry makes €2,000,000,000 (\$2,736,858,623) a year. Ireland is identified as a source, a destination and a transit center for victims from every continent. Men, women and children are kidnapped or tricked into leaving their families and subjected to forced labor and prostitution. Only 1-2% of trafficking victims are ever recovered. The UNODC says "human trafficking is the fastest growing means by which people are enslaved, the fastest growing international crime, and one of the largest sources of income for organized crime." The problem is international. We need to control the influx of traffickers, identify enslaved victims, offer rehabilitation, and assist their return to safety.

Section I: UNFIP (UN Fund for International Partnerships), UNPOL (UN Police), and UNICR (UN Institute for Crime Research) will provide immigration and crime counselors from countries with low crime and trafficking rates. These counselors will teach a required training class for all police officers to help control the borders and identify trafficking victims.

Section II: UNRRA (UN Relief and Rehabilitation Administration), UNODC (UN Office of Drugs and Crime), IFC (International Finance Corporation), and IDA (International Development Association) will support the creation of an international program called the Trafficked-people Education and Rehabilitation Association, or TERA, a center that offers a variety of programs that will benefit the victims of trafficking. TERA will provide a rehabilitation and education center to offer help to the trafficked victims who are diagnosed with depression, addictions, physical injuries, or other psychological disorders. As an international institution, TERA will help victims either by granting temporary visas or by helping them return to their home countries.

Section III: UNESCO (UN Education, Scientific, and Cultural Organization), and UNICEF (UN Children's Fund) will help TERA establish the education center and recruit teachers who will provide victims with the education and skills needed to transition successfully and safely into a better way of life. Recovering victims will be offered vocational counseling and assistance with finding employment and managing expenses. TERA will provide temporary on campus housing to victims during their rehabilitation period.

Section IV: This proposal will go into effect one year after passage.
