| 5 6 | Justification Clause: In Ethiopia child prostitution is increasing at an alarming rate. Children as young as 8 are getting lured or forced into child prostitution. This tragic problem also raises STDs and AIDS. The major |
| 7 | reasons identified by the children themselves for engaging in commercial sex work are: poverty (34%), |
| 8 | dispute in family (35%), and death of mother and/or father. 40% joined prostitution either to support |
| 9 10 | themselves or their parents. Quite a large number of girls (35%) have joined prostitution due to violence within the home or an abusive arranged marriage. |
| 11 | This is a very dangerous issue because children are being abused, uneducated, and their lives are being |
| 12 | thrown away. This proposal would also meet the UN goal of lowering HIV and AIDS. |

| 14 | Section I: Although child prostitution is against Ethiopian federal law, the corrupt Ethiopian police usually |
| 15 | look the other way. Our proposal would allow non-governmental agencies such as UNICEF, the United |
| 16 | Nations Children's Fund to gather and publish information on child prostitution and assist children in |
| 17 | breaking out of prostitution as a way of life. The UNODC, the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime |
| 18 | would monitor bars in urban areas in Ethiopia to help enforce the existing law. |

| 20 | Section II: The Ethiopian government would be responsible for prosecuting the illegal trafficking of children, |
| 21 | and the UN will provide officers of the UNODC to patrol the areas where child prostitution is highest. UNICEF |
| 22 | will set up services for children in Ethiopia and gather and publish statistics on child prostitution. |

| 24 | Section III: The Ethiopian government would be responsible for paying the peacekeepers, and the UN must |
| 25 | pay to have the peacekeepers trained. The UN will help Ethiopia pay this with donations. |
