1	An act to extend the Debbie Smith Act in Kentucky that pays to reduce the DNA test backlog in rape cases.
2	
3	Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky
4	
5	Section 1: Presently in the Commonwealth of Kentucky, thousands of rape kits are collecting dust in crime
6	labs across the state while many dangerous offenders remain at large. Recently in Detroit over 11,000 rape
7	kits were discovered and since testing over 100 serial rapists have been discovered. In Kentucky there have
8	been rape kits dating back to before 2010. Most counties are not even sure about how many untested kits
9	are in their labs. Currently, the average wait for testing rape kits in Kentucky is more than one year, as
10	victims wait for testing to be complete perpetrators are in our community searching out more victims.
11	
12	Section 2: The 2004 Debbie Smith Act created grants to help law enforcement agencies clear those backlogs,
13	but that bill has expired. This bill is created to extend this bipartisan and important bill. Labs need more
14	technicians to test rape kits and equipment to test it.
15	
16	Section 3: Testing a rape kits usually costs between \$1,000 and \$1,500. To do this the state of Kentucky
17	needs 1.1 million dollars of grant money. This money will be used for equipment, training, and hiring more
18	technicians.
19	
20	Section 4: This bill will go into effect on January 1st 2016 and would last for three years.
