1	An act to allow the possession of firearms on school property as designated by school principals or district
2	superintendents.
3	
4	Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky
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6	Section 1: The purpose of this bill is to equip school personal with a firearm necessary to protect the students and
7 8	faculty from an active-shooter and/or hostage situation. Each school will be required to have three certified individuals in charge of the safe keeping and use of a firearm.
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10	Section 2: Procedure, location, security:
11	 There would be one gun per seven-hundred and fifty students/staff
12	• The firearm/s would be evenly distributed around the school (for instance, on opposite sides of the school)
13	 The firearm/s would be locked in a safe located in a closet in the designated location.
14	 All safes would require a thumb-print scanner to access the firearm.
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16	Section 3: All existing gun control laws for Kentucky will apply to this bill. In addition the following requirements
17	will be required for the authorized designated personnel:
18	Concealed carry permit
19	 Background check (couldn't have been in a mental institution or had time in prison/jail)
20	• The designee must submit to the authorizing principal or authorizing superintendent proof of completion of a
21	minimum of 40 hours of a school safety program and annually complete 8 hours of active shooter training and 4
22	hours of firearm proficiency training.
23	 The designee must go through at least 8 hours of restraint training.
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25	Section 4: Circumstances for use of the gun will follow:
26	A person who exhibits any sword, sword cane, firearm, electric weapon or device, destructive device, or other
27	weapon including a razor blade, box cutter, or common pocketknife, except as authorized in support of school-
28	sanctioned activities, in the presence of one or more persons in a rude, careless, angry, or threatening manner
29 30	and not in lawful self-defense, at a school-sponsored event or on the grounds or facilities of any school.
31	Section 5: School districts will be responsible to formulate and prescribe policies and procedures for emergency
32	drills and for actual emergencies, including, active shooters, and hostage situations for schools within the district
33	comprising of grades K-12.
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35	Section 6: This law will go into effect within one year of the bill's passage.
