1	An act to increase the bee population in Kentucky and prevent Colony Collapse Disorder.
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3	Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky
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5	Section 1: One-third of all honey bee colonies in the country have vanished. Healthy bees started abandoning
6	their hives and not returning in 2006. This is called Colony Collapse Disorder (CCD). The current research
7	suggests some very alarming information. It is widely though that one out of every three bites of food we
8	put in our mouths are the direct result of pollinating insects and honey bees account for 80% of that
9	pollination. Experts agree that the disorder comes from many sources including diseases, pesticides, and lack
10	of flowering plants. Bees are needed to pollinate plants so that we can have food.
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12	Section 2: The Kentucky Department of Agriculture (KDA) will help develop a campaign via internet,
13	commercials, and community forums to educate Kentucky citizens on how they can reverse this problem.
14	Solutions range from wildflower seeding, planting flowers and plants, and using organic pesticides.

23	Section 4: Amending the Farmland Assessment Act will make it easier for beekeepers/landowners to obtain a
24	tax break. Under the current system, a landowner with property suitable for a beekeeper will rent that
25	property to a farmer for a hay or corn crop rather than a beekeeper. This is because hay and corn will
