| 1 2 3 | An act to require all public and private high schools in Kentucky to implement a set protocol for students injured with a concussion. |

| 6 7 | Section 1: This act would require each high school to provide students suffering from concussions appropriate recovery time before having to fully return to their studies. |
| 8 9 10 | Section 2: This bill will not have any costs. |
| 11 12 13 14 | Section 3: The protocol will be decided by the high school administrative board. The Kentucky Board of Education will oversee that the act is implemented into the schools regulations. They will also make sure that the schools' protocols cover a set standard of information it should include. |
| 15 16 17 | Section 4: A high school's administrative board will submit their written protocol to the Kentucky Board of Education to review. The board will check for standards and approve the protocol if all requirements are met. |
| 18 19 20 21 | Section 5: The protocols should include information such as: time student is given excused from work, how makeup work will be completed, what will be needed to approve the students' recovery, any extra precautions the Kentucky Board of Education feels necessary. |
| 22 23 24 | Section 6: Students and parents will contact the school's administration if it is observed that the protocol is not being enforced. If the issue is not resolved, they will contact the Kentucky Board of Education. |
| 25 26 27 | Section 7: Penalties for schools failing to enforce the protocol will result in a \$500 fine to the school per month. |
| 28 | Section 8: This bill will go into effect at the beginning of the 2015–2016 school year. |
