An act to require that children born with Fetal Alcohol Effects (FAE) and/or Fetal Alcohol Syndrome (FAS) will
 be considered a case of second degree criminal abuse.

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## Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: Fetal Alcohol Syndrome is a disease caused by excessive amounts of alcohol consumed by a
mother during pregnancy. This will cause mental retardation and malfunction of physical growth. People with
FAS can have problems with learning, memory, attention span, communication, vision, or hearing. It is very
detrimental to a child's health and well-being, and is a very serious issue as it affects people all around you,
even if you don't realize it.

Section 2: Nearly 40,000 infants are born every year with Fetal Alcohol Effects; and over half of pregnant women between 18–34 years of age confirm they use alcohol within the last month of pregnancy. It is estimated that 1 to 2 babies born in the U.S. per 1000 births have FAS. This is a serious issue, as the effects of the alcohol on the child when born include stunted growth, facial distortion, learning disabilities, and many other physical and mental problems. By making these actions a criminal abuse, pregnant women will be more likely to avoid making these harmful decisions, which can essentially ruin a child's life.

Section 3: In Kentucky, the alcohol endangerment of a child prior to birth is a Class B misdemeanor for a first offense, and a Class A misdemeanor for every offense after. This act would make this crime a case of second degree criminal abuse, which would be considered a Class D felony, which is punishable by one to five years in prison, and a fine of \$1,000 to \$10,000. This is compared to a year or less of jail time and a small fine of \$250 for a Class B misdemeanor.
