1 An act to require all Kentucky Public School to have a walk through metal detector at one entrance.
2
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**
4
5 Section 1: This bill would enforce metal detectors to be at all public schools' entrances. The purpose of this
6 enforcement is to keep all public schools in Kentucky safe. These metal detectors will prevent dangerous
7 weapons and/or objects.
8
9 Section 2: Walk through metal detector would be at the main entrance that all students must enter through
10 each day. If the student is detected with a dangerous device, their punishment would include family
11 counseling because of the action that has happened, and the fine will be determined by the Board of
12 Education or the Court of Law in that community.

14 Section 3: Any school not following this bill, will be fined for first offense. The fine will be in the amount of
15 \$1000, which is the cost of one detector. This money will then be used to purchase the detector by the
16 state.

18 Section 4: The Department of Education will be responsible for enforcing this bill.
19
20 Section 5: It will not cost the state anything to pass. Individual districts will be responsible for funding the
21 detectors. These funds could come from the state. Schools could write safe school grants to help with the
22 funding.
23
24 Section 6: This bill will take effect in the 2015-2016 school year.
