## Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: This bill would enforce metal detectors to be at all public schools' entrances. The purpose of this
enforcement is to keep all public schools in Kentucky safe. These metal detectors will prevent dangerous
weapons and/or objects.

Section 2: Walk through metal detector would be at the main entrance that all students must enter through
each day. If the student is detected with a dangerous device, their punishment would include family
counseling because of the action that has happened, and the fine will be determined by the Board of
Education or the Court of Law in that community.

Section 3: Any school not following this bill, will be fined for first offense. The fine will be in the amount of \$1000, which is the cost of one detector. This money will then be used to purchase the detector by the state.

18 Section 4: The Department of Education will be responsible for enforcing this bill.

Section 5: It will not cost the state anything to pass. Individual districts will be responsible for funding the
detectors. These funds could come from the state. Schools could write safe school grants to help with the
funding.

24 Section 6: This bill will take effect in the 2015–2016 school year.
