Convention on Offering Incentives for the Elimination of Soil Based Pesticides

 The General Assembly,

Alarmed by the substantial impact of soil pollution on many countries, specifically 95% of our food is produced on the Earth's soil and at least 22 million hectares are polluted,

Immensely concerned that poisoned soil can lead to unsafe food and drink, which can lead to mass famine,

Deeply disturbed that current measures to reduce soil pollution are not sufficient to sustain a livable Earth,

1. Calls upon the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations to offer a monetary incentive of anywhere between \$1 million and \$15 million (US) to the government of any and all countries who decrease their soil pollution through elimination of chemical pesticides and fertilizers,

Suggests that countries who wish to participate in this incentive program determine what
 action to take to decrease their soil pollution by looking to the extensive research of the United
 Nations, particularly their Food and Agriculture Organization;

b. Encourages countries to seek assistance in developing a plan to decrease soil pollution through the adaptive management of representatives from the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations;

2. Notes that the maximum cost of one country to participate in this program is merely 0.05% of the UN Food and Agriculture Organization's yearly budget.

A Resolution to Investigate the Impact of Personalized Psychiatric Care

The General Assembly,

Alarmed by the fact that mental disorders are the leading cause of disability in Europe, with nearly 40% of Europeans suffer from mental illness and only around one third of cases receive adequate therapy or medication,

Observing the depravity faced by many patients in psychiatric hospitals as well the inconsistent results of hospitalization and medication,

Deeply concerned that forced hospitalization is both a prevalent human rights violation in Belgium as well as an immense financial toll on the Belgian economy, Recognizing that Belgium's number of psychiatric beds per capita is 136 beds per 100,000 people, a figure much higher than the European average of 69 beds per 100,000 people, which indicates that Belgian mental health care is grounded in hospitalization,

Emphasizing the World Health Organization's 2019-2023 mission to Promote health, keep the world safe, serve the vulnerable, within which mental health has been flagged as a priority area for accelerated advancement,

Bearing in mind that TANDEMplus, a community-based mental health service in Brussels, Belgium, provides promising, personalized psychiatric care in the comfort of the patient's home while prioritizing the rights of the patient,

Recalling that the non-governmental organization Human Rights Watch has specified TANDEMplus as an example of a Good Practice, featuring a report of TANDEMplus at the Good Practice Services convention in Trieste, Italy,

1. Calls upon the World Health Organization to emphasize the importance of mental health services that prioritize the rights of the patient,

2. Requests that member nations of the United Nations pay attention to the efforts of TANDEMplus and work towards incorporating personalized mobile crisis teams,

3. Urges the World Health Organization branch of Mental Health in Development to conduct a report of good practice services around the world to assess mental health services similar to TANDEMplus and analyze the effectiveness of community-based mental health care.

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The General Assembly,

Realizing that much of the developing world is engaged in subsistence farming,

Conscious that global climate change causes additional challenges for these farmers and their ability to provide sufficient amounts of resources to support their communities and countries,

Fully aware of the detrimental effects of desertification due, at least in part, to deforestation and over-farming,

Alarmed by the increasing amounts of contaminated water due to chemical runoff from farms and the harmful effects of erosion due to deforestation within the countries stated in section two,

Noting with deep concern that previous efforts to provide yield increasing tools, such as tractors, have been largely unsuccessful,

1. Designates an FAO subsidiary body to be created with representatives from twenty-two UN Member States;

2. Proclaims the initial twenty-two members of the subcommittee to be as follows: Zambia, Timor Leste, The Republic of the Congo, Djibouti, Yemen, Guinea, Haiti, Sudan, Ethiopia, Uganda, Burundi, Liberia, Angola, Niger, Tanzania, Mozambique, Sierra Leone, Madagascar, CHAD, Central African Republic, Indonesia, and Benin.

3. Designates that every five years twenty-two new applications will be accepted from either previous or new countries to obtain the aid they require. These applications will be decided on by the FAO. Further Proclaims that this subsidiary body provides training in sustainable and profitable farming practices, access to environmentally appropriate seeds, irrigation systems, and incentives for private industries to provide smallholder farms with access to tractors and other agricultural tools and machinery;

4. Requests that the General Assembly approve an additional \$50 million annually for ten years to the FAO for this subsidiary body.

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Convention to Reduce Coca Leaf Production

The General Assembly,

Knowing that Bolivia is a leading producer of the coca leaf producing 45% of the world's coca leaf and paste.

Seeing that the high demand for coca leaf has led to deforestation converting tens of thousands of land into coca leaf land. In addition, the high demand for coca leaf has caused an increase in illegal economic activities. Furthermore, there has been an increase in cocaine production correlating with the increase in coca leaf production.

Deeply concerned with the effects of a high production of the coca leaf on Bolivia as it contributes to illegal production of cocaine, is a large provider of cocaine to other nations, and contributes to economic and political issues within the nation. As well as concerned with the effects of monocropping, which destroys soil, decreases jobs for other wage workers, increases dependence on foreign imports, spreads pests and disease, creates pollution, and increases food costs.

Recognizing resolution 61/183, which called upon all member states to tackle the drug problem and acknowledge that the cultivation of narcotic drugs "had significantly increased and threatened the security and stability of that country and had negative regional and international implications". And resolution 62/8 of 2019, which again urges all member states to take action against the drug issue.

Acknowledging that the coca leaf production has caused many issues within the country and other Latin American Countries. We ask that the United Nations Office of Drug and Crimes (UNODC) take action and cut back the amount of coca leaf grown.

1. Reverse the former 2016 law that increased the land for coca leaf production from 12,000 to 22,000 hectares. Decreasing the amount of hectares by 1000 hectares per year for 10 years.

2. Dedicate the hectares formerly used for coca leaf to be revitalized for foodstuffs.

Farmers who revitalize their land to grow foodstuff will receive compensation for initial costs of crop changing. This compensation will be determined by UNODC.

3. Fund a program to revitalize the use of coca leaf to promote it for more homeopathic purposes. Bolivia will be required to send an annual report of how many hectares are being used for coca leafs. If Bolivia sees positive results, we recommend the UN to take similar actions in other Latin American countries in relation to coca leaf production. This should go into effect in January 2022.

Providing Humanitarian Relief to the Venezuelan People in both Venezuela and Colombia

The General Assembly,

Alarmed by the vast amount of Venezuelans --over 4 million-- who emigrated due to hyperinflation and increased shortages of fundamental resources,

Deeply concerned by host governments imposing policies that restrict border entry and temporary visas, as they increase Venezuelan migration through irregular methods, and escalates xenophobic sentiment,

Expressing concern for the thousands of Venezuelan refugees who are susceptible to labor and sexual oppression, violence, trafficking, and discrimination, due to lack of legal documentation and basic rights.

Having adopted the 1984 Cartagena Declaration which defines refugees as those who have left their home in response to "circumstances which have seriously disturbed public order," the declaration was incorporated into the legal frameworks of Colombia, Ecuador, Peru, and Chile.

1. Supports the UNHCR for cooperating with recipient countries and various organizations in administering vital supplies, emergency shelters, and implementing awareness campaigns in support of Venezuelan refugees;

 2. Further supports the UN in reinforcing their presence along key borders to limit exposure to illegal activity and exploitation;3. Trusts nations to continue delivering additional supplies and financial aid through UN-accredited

agencies;
4. Calls upon the UN to send medical commodities and health workers to Venezuela and Colombia to help the Venezuelan people and refugees;

5. Encourages recipient countries to continue mediation through the Quito process, developing a peaceful approach to the crisis and facilitating Venezuelan protection and rights;

6. Requests host countries issue temporary visas, which grant access to healthcare, employment, and education;

 7. Seeks international assistance to rebuild institutions such as the Treasury and the Central Bank within Venezuela.

Convention on the Aid of Healthcare in Chad by its Allies and Other Supporting Countries.

The General Assembly,

Chad has the lowest life expectancy, and the poorest healthcare of any country in the world. Ongoing conflicts such as civil war in Chad have made it extremely difficult for Chadians to have access to proper healthcare, or even clean drinking water. Only 4% of Chadians living in rural areas have access to clean water, which is a leading cause of health conditions, like diarrhea and cholera. Drought and food insecurity also play a huge role in the overall poor health of Chadians. There is an extreme scarcity of doctors in Chad. There is one doctor for every 38,000 inhabitants. There are 652,575 people of concern in Chad.

- 1. Chad's allies such as France are in better condition and have proper healthcare and medical supplies.
- 2. Chad's allies or surrounding countries willing to help would send in volunteer medical professionals with medical supplies to work with patients who are the most in need in existing hospitals, offices, and clinics.
- 3. Doctors being sent in would earn their same pay as if they were at their regular job, unless the budget of that hospital/offices allows for extra pay. They will stay for a 180 days at a time, then return home as new doctors are sent in with more supplies.

Convention on the Containment of the COVID-19 Virus

The General Assembly,

Recalling that COVID-19 (also known as the "coronavirus") is defined as a "Public Health Emergency of International Concern", as declared in the second meeting of the International Health Regulations Emergency Committee, 1/30/20.

Recognizing the steps already taken by the World Health Organization to inform countries on how to recognize and prevent the spread of COVID-19 and its donations of medical equipment such as masks, gloves, and gowns.

Deeply concerned over the increasing cases of COVID-19 and deaths throughout China and outside its borders.

Alarmed that epidemics and pandemics such as this can cause a great deal of death, instability within society, and mass hysteria.

Urging that more drastic and immediate steps must be taken to control the spread of this virus.

1. Establishes the United Nations Emergency Aid Fund to China that will grant up to \$300 million quarterly to the Chinese government to combat the COVID-19 virus and aid recovery. This fund will operate for the next 24 months with the option to extend if needed.

2. Requests donations of medical equipment (such as masks, gloves, and gowns) and basic supplies (such as food, water, medicine, and hygiene products) from member countries to better equip China's population to combat the COVID-19 virus, especially for populations in the quarantine zones.

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The General Assembly,

Recognizing the full Cuban Trade Embargo was started in 1962 after Cuba was allied with the Soviet Union in the Cold War,

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Bearing in mind the Trade Embargo has lasted for 58 years, thus making it the longest enduring trade embargo in history and causing Cuba a loss of \$3.3 billion annually,

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Noting with deep concern that the primary goal of the embargo was to force Cuba into a democracy, but has ultimately caused Cuban citizens to suffer,

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Observing the UN passed a resolution on November 7, 2019 condemning the US for the trade embargo,

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1. Calls upon the UN General Assembly to abolish the trade embargo on Cuba;

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2. Declares Accordingly of the United States to make financial reparations of 32.5 billion to the Republic of Cuba;

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3. Urges the Economic Commission for Latin America and the Caribbean (ECLAC) to oversee the transfer of these funds;

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4. Solemnly affirms to utilize the monetary compensation for the citizens of Cuba and to increase trade.

 Calls upon the United Nations to peacefully mediate the annexation of the unpopulated island of Tori-Shima of Japan to the Democratic People's Republic of Korea to gain adequate, safe lands for protective warfare defenses in a preliminary exchange of 13,499,999,423 KPW (North Korean Won), or approximately \$15,000,000 USD;

Recalling that the United Nations has committed to the well being of refugees as laid out in the New York Declaration for Refugees and Migrants;

Alarmed by the notion made by many scientists that the harmful effects oceanic waste will soon become irreversible,

Recognizing that thousands of immigrants are funneled through Mexican borders while seeking asylum in the United States;

Draws the attention to the fact that the United States has deferred responsibility for asylum seekers care to Mexico.

Expressing concern that The Mexican Commision to Aid Refugees, or COMAR, processed more than 29,000 immigrants in 2018;

Fully alarmed that the Mexican President Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador this year cut COMAR's budget by about 20 percent, to about \$1.1 million;

Noting that the United Nations Refugee Agency has already pledged close to a million dollars to support Mexican government with the rising number of asylum seekers;

Bearing in mind that the right of everyone to seek and to enjoy in other countries asylum from persecution is enshrined in the United Nations Universal Declaration of Human Rights of 1948 and is supported by the 1951 Convention Relating to the Status of Refugees and the 1967 Protocol Relating to the Status of Refugees;

- 1. Urges the United States General Assembly to commence negotiations in order to protect and aid asylum seekers who are denied access to any country;
- 2. Asks that the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees maintain an advisory role in the supervision over processing of asylum seekers throughout the world;
- 3. Requests that countries that deny asylum seekers take financial responsibility for the denied asylum seekers while their asylum status is being considered;
- 4. Mandates that countries compensate for any asylum seeker they deny by providing financial aid until they receive asylum in another country;
- 5. Calls upon the United Nations to enforce the provisions set forth within this resolution by instituting a fine of the GDP of each respective country decided upon and assessed by the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees in each individualized case for each country that denies asylum for 100 asylum seekers without providing financial aid for them until they receive asylum in another country;
- 6. Requests that this resolution go into effect October 1st, 2020, upon passage.

Also recalling the United Nations' unanimous adoption of Resolution 69/1 and its establishment of the United Mission for Ebola Emergency Response (UNMEERS) in order to combat the 2014 Ebola outbreak,

Determined to combat the spread of Novel Coronavirus and treat those that are afflicted,

- Calls upon the United Nations Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) and its leadership to coordinate the humanitarian relief mission and all humanitarian actors which participate in it;
- 2. Requests that OCHA utilize the Cluster System to coordinate emergency response to the Chinese mainland;
- 3. Further calls upon the World Health Organization (WHO) to collaborate with the Chinese Center for Disease Control and Chinese Red Cross to provide humanitarian assistance with medical personnel and supplies in order to counter the spread of Novel Coronavirus;
- 4. Affirms that the relief effort will be funded by the United Nations' Central Emergency Response Fund (CERF);
- 5. Due to the urgency of the growing Coronavirus situation, this resolution will go into immediate effect when passed.

Deeply concerned that there is no consistent governance of space to maintain peace in the inevitable conflicts caused by the inadequate space law or lack thereof,

- 1. Draws the attention to the inadequacies of current space law at both an international and state level;
- 2. Calls upon the governments of all member states to collaborate to create and adopt more comprehensive and consistent space law, particularly in regards to the regulation of commercial space usage;
- 3. Seeks the support and quidance of the United Nations Office for Outer Space Affairs in creating such enhanced space law;
- 4. Calls upon the United Nations Office for Outer Space Affairs to convene a conference to create international regulations on the commercialization of space, including but not limited to space mining, property rights, satellite usage, etc.;

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Reiterating its deep concern over the jeopardization of international security through actions of the United States of America including repeated violations of international security laws and conventions, particularly the order of an armed military drone strike on Baghdad Airport in the Islamic Republic of Iran resulting in the assassination of Iranian General Qasem Soleimani and threat of direct military attack on cultural sites belonging to the Islamic Republic of Iran.

Noting with deep concern that intentionally directing attacks on buildings dedicated to religion, historic monuments, providing that they are not military objectives, is a war crime under Article 8 of the Geneva Convention,

Reminds the General Assembly that an under resolution 29/3314,

- a. The use of armed force against a State against the political independence of another state is defined as aggression
- b. An attack by the armed forces of a State on the forces of another state qualifies as an act of aggression
- c. Aggression is the most serious and dangerous form of illegal use of force
- d. The duty of states under the United Nations Charter is to settle international disputes by peaceful means in an effort to preserve international peace and security
- e. A war of aggression is a crime against international peace. Further reminds that breaches of peace not taken in self-defense or with allowance from the security council under Chapter VII / Article 51 is a violation of the Charter of the United Nations,

Convinced that the actions of the United States of America are a threat to international peace and security,

- 1. Asks the member nations to strongly condemn the actions of the United States, their jeopardization of international peace, and disregard for international law,
- 2. Requests that notice be taken by the member nations of the UN. recognizing the United States' violent and illegal actions.

A Program to Invest in the Future of Low-Income Families and Reduction of Gang Violence

The General Assembly,

Noting with deep concern the recent high number of explosions in the suburbs of Swedish cities, as well as a 60% increase in bombings in 2019,

Taking into consideration that Swedish authorities note the socio-economic backgrounds as well as the immigration status of criminals convicted of the bombings, many of which come from low socio-economic, immigrant families (the vast majority of which come from Finland, Iran, Iraq, Syria, and what used to be Yuqoslavia),

Further deploring the fact that these attacks on Swedish suburbs are made by gang members and go against Article 3 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights stating that everyone has the right to life, liberty, and security of person,

Recognizing that these gangs hinder economic growth as well as the safety of citizens,

Viewing with appreciation the increased efforts by task forces of Swedish police to keep the gang violence down,

Considering that similar attacks occur in countries across the world and UN Secretary-General Guterres is striving to "break the vicious circles of suffering and conflict and to push for a strong surge of diplomacy for peace" seeing as "a wind of madness is sweeping the globe.",

Determined to keep individuals out of gangs to keep violence off the streets,

- 1. Calls upon the United Nations to establish a comprehensive educational program;
- 2. Emphasizing workforce development resources that provide education, trade skill development, and job placement to those who come from low socio-economic families;
- 3. Confirms that Sweden will adopt this program and will provide the workers and trainings to facilitate the program into the regions that need it the most immediately;
- 4. Further recommends that other countries with similar gang violence integrate the same program into their regions that are filled with violence.

A Resolution Relating to Immigration Resources

The General Assembly,

Currently, immigrants attempting to enter the United States through the Mexican border are treated poorly due to a lack of funding and resources. Asylum seeking is a human right and people have the right to be treated humanely. Better living conditions will create better relationships with other countries and the residents of other countries. When people are treated with respect, they are more likely to want to enter the United States legally and establish their lives here.

- 1. The United States is requesting funding from the United Nations to provide basic resources and shelter temporarily to immigrants along the border.
- 2. (deficiencies of the camps) 220,000 illegal migrants were apprehended at the Mexico-United States border in 201
- 3. According to ICE's FY 2018 budget, it currently costs the US about \$134 per day to maintain one adult bed. A family bed costs about \$319 and separated children living in tent cities costs \$775 per night. Immigrants stay for an average of 44 days and about 51,379 people are held in detention centers each day. Private prisons are benefiting from this.
- 4. This is a humanitarian issue in which immigrants are not getting adequate treatment when trying to cross the Mexico-United States border.
- 5. These resources would need to be in place one year, or 365 days, after the passage of this resolution by the general assembly.
