Observing that tourism has improved areas, such as: the Sahara Desert, Morocco, and Tunisia,

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Noting with extreme concernthat children in Armenia with disabilities are discriminated against, are seen to be shameful, are often hidden, prevented from receiving a good education, have a lack of proper care, or are sent to orphanages by their parents because they do not want to face the shame or expenses,

Recallingthat "disabled persons shall be protected against all exploitation, all regulations and all treatment of a discriminatory, abusive, or degrading nature" as stated in the Declaration of the Rights of Disabled Persons,

Observing the "UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities" we have recognized that discrimination against children with disabilities is not only an issue in Armenia, but in the entire world,

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Fully awareArmenia has built 22 facilities to help disabled children although they are all located in the capital, making it harder for children not in the capital,

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Acknowledging "that disability is an evolving concept and that disability results from the interaction between persons with impairments and attitudinal and environmental barriers that hinders their full and effective participation in society on an equal basis with others"

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- 1. Urgesmember nations of the United Nations to donate an amount of approximately \$225,000 in United States dollars to construct a school specifically built for children with disabilities to learn.
- 2. Calls upon the staff of said school to provide instructional nightly classes for parents of disabled children on how to properly take care of them.

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#### The Aborigines Health Crisis in Australia

The General Assembly,

 Affirming the presence of government sponsored healthcare in the country of Australia,

Alarmed by the exclusion of aboriginal people, based on race, from the healthcare system in Australia,

 Deeply Disturbed by the high mortality rate, and shortened life expectancy, of Australia's aboriginal people compared to other ethnic groups within the country,

Further recalling that insufficient healthcare is a global problem affecting millions, as stated in the previous resolutions 70/232 and 59/202,

Recognizing that the Declaration of Human Rights declares that everyone has the right to adequate medical care regardless or race, gender, or social class,

Convinced that the Australian government has isolated these indigenous people in the northernmost regions of the country resulting in malnutrition and high rates of disease, due to a lack of basic necessities including healthcare,


Noting with deep concern that many have brought attention to this issue but no efforts have been made to resolve the problem,

1. Requesting that the Australian government provide doctors, medical supplies, and proper access to healthcare in areas where many aboriginal people live,

2. Recommends to begin by putting in place a mobile clinic in effect immediately and improved hospitals in heavily populated areas to restore the aboriginal people's trust in the care of their doctors in order to increase the life expectancy and overall health of the aboriginal people,

3. Calls upon the United Nations to supply a committee of representatives and the World Health Organization to contribute medical professionals to make recommendations to Australia's Health Minister to assess the levels of success,

4. Viewing with appreciation that this plan be implemented as soon as possible to enhance the well-being of this dwindling population and preserve the cultural heritage of these native peoples, pending on UN approval, by the end of 2019.



An Act to Reduce Crime Against Tourists and Citizens

The General Assembly,

Convinced that crime occurs more than average and is dangerous and destructive to the country and is too critical to let pass by anymore,

Recalling that crime occurs to 1 out of 181 citizens and 824 crimes occur each year,

Noting that this statistic is unacceptable and can be fixed through additional interventions,

- 1. Reaffirming that additional security and services follows the United Nations Human Rights statement concerning freedom from slavery and torture and internationally the right of social protection;
- 2. Conscious that if we take these steps to train our officials and allow services for citizens and tourists that then we can allow and ensure a more safe community as a whole;
- 3. Bearing in mind that the Bahamas is in critical shape due to crime, we propose also to build on the UN's 2008 campaign to support our cause.

Recognizing and Supporting Victims of Domestic Violence in Bangladesh

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The General Assembly,

4 5

Deeply concerned that nearly two out of every three women in Bangladesh are victims of some forms of domestic violence every day. Women are failing to report domestic violence because of their threatening abusers.

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Alarmed by the dowry killing, stalking, rape, acid attacks, physical abuse, and verbal abuse used as violent acts against women.

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Noting further that the domestic violence rehab centers are not well built, unsafe, unwelcoming, and not helpful which decreases the number of women reporting their situations.

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1. Calls upon the UN to send trained and certified doctors and policeman to go from home to home assessing the position that women are in; relocating any women and children found to be victims of such abuse to a domestic violence center for rehab.

2. Recommends the antagonist to pay a fine of \$1,500 and a sentence of 5 years to life in prison depending upon their actions toward the victim. Recommending the fine paid be donated to the rebuilding of other domestic violence centers in Bangladesh.

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3. Requests there be a criminal exchange with neighboring countries. All criminals will go to prison and not be released back on the streets.

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4. Seeks 1.1 million dollars to initiate the bill by January 1, 2020.

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A Resolution Purveying Accessible Addiction Treatment Centers for Narcotics

The General Assembly,

Alarmed by the cannabis epidemic that has arisen in Chilé, The United States of America, Canada, Iceland, France, Australia, and other countries around the world as well as the lack of proper treatment for people suffering from the effects of addiction,

Convinced that the use of recreational cannabis poses a serious threat to individuals lives,

Aware of the dreadful effects of cannabis on the brain, lungs, digestive system, heart, and nervous system,

Recalling that the use of narcotics poses a great threat to humanity of all races and ethnicities around the world, as declared in resolutions 44/16, 34/173, 72/197, and 52/92,

Recognizing that 11 out of every 50 people who inhabit Chilé have partaken in the use of marijuana, including 1 in 3 secondary school students, while there are approximately 158.8 million users in the world,

Emphasizing the abundance of recreational cannabis among illegal narcotic users without having available treatment plans for this drug,

Observing that marijuana use is a gateway drug, 7 out of 10 people who use other drugs started by using cannabis,

Noting with deep concern that treatment and rehabilitation for cannabis addiction in the public sector of Chilé is scarce to the majority of the population,

Bearing in mind the previous statement, citizens of our nation as well as citizens of other nations around the world do not have available resources for the treatment of cannabis addiction and have no reliable options for other narcotic addictions,

Conscious of steps taken by Germany and Denmark in order to maximize treatment plans for marijuana addictions, narcotics, and other drugs,

Determined to provide a variety of treatments including narcotic treatments available to Chilean, Americans, Canadians, and Australians as well as other countries all across the world,

Fully aware that cannabis is beneficial in medical use,

Confident that when used incorrectly, cannabis is a dangerous substance and should be acted against,

- Requests the UN Conference and General Assembly to continue this discussion on providing treatments until the war on addiction is won;
- 2. Urges other countries when designing drug intervention programs confirm that they have treatments for cannabis and other narcotics;
- 3. Recommends for member nations to prohibit cannabis for recreational uses, and provide recovery solutions for those in need

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Emphasizingthat air pollution, primarily from wood burning stoves and diesel-burning vehicles, accounts for at least 1/30th of annual deaths in Denmark by causing heart disease in thousands of Danish citizens,

Having considered the fact that air pollution in Denmark is harmful not only to Danes but to residents of nearby countries as pollution travels via air currents,

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Fully aware that Europe has taken collective action in the past that significantly reduced pollution levels in countries such as Denmark, one example being the UNECE Convention on Long-range Transboundary Air Pollution of 1983.

Considers that billions of people internationally use wood burning stoves, which greatly contributes to pollution and related health issues, and proposes that countries where this is a common practice, begin introducing alternative methods for cooking and heating along with incentivizing these methods;

23 24 2. Calls upon developed countries to push for transportation that relies on energy from sources other than diesel, perhaps by introducing higher tax rates on diesel-powered vehicles or creating some sort of motivation for citizens to utilize clean energy;

Recalling the UN's failure to uphold Chapter 1, Article 1, Section 3 of the UN Charter: "To achieve international co-operation in solving international problems of an economic, social, cultural, or humanitarian character, and in promoting and encouraging respect for human rights and for fundamental freedoms for all without distinction as to race, sex, language, or religion."

a. Eliminate prejudice within the UN council.

f. Countries should not be deemed more powerful based on wealth and population.

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Recognizing the basic rights to water & samp; sanitation as addressed in 64/292 and the UN Assembly of 2010 recognized the basic right for personal & samp; domestic uses must be safe, acceptable, affordable and physically accessible,

Further Recalling the Universal Declaration of Human Rights states that everyone has the right to life, freedom & safety and the UN Sustainable Development Goal #6 ensures access to water and sanitation for all,

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Conscious that multiple studies and theories for improving sustainable water sources such as: Journal of Environmental Management, Vol 61 Issue 2, 2001 and Shortage in Jordan: Sustainable Solutions Vol 250 Issue 1,2010,

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Bearing in Mind that the UN Secretary General stated in June 2015 "Even today in the 21st century, nearly 1,000 children under the age of five are killed each day by a toxic mix of unsafe drinking water, poor sanitation and poor hygiene,"

1. Calls upon the UN to provide \$32 million to purchase a "seawater greenhouse desalination" facility; Further recommends that we purchase one "clay pot" water filter per family in the affected areas of Fiji at a cost of \$15 million;

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Convention on the Institution of a Reading Program for Reduced Jail Sentences

The General Assembly,

Deeply Concerned that 40% of incarcerated Germans will return to prison in the next three years.

Fully Aware that, according to the World Health Organization, overcrowding, various forms of violence, enforced solitude or conversely, lack of privacy, lack of meaningful activity, isolation from social networks lead to severe mental health defects and depression.

Affirming that this resolution would put into effect a reading program at prisons around the world, which would allow prisoners to read a selected book, and submit a report to a resident reading official provided by the federal state and trained by the nation's Department of Education in cooperation with UNESCO.

Having Examined these conditions, instituting a reading program would help to dampen, if not eliminate these effects on prisoners according to the International Literacy Association and lessen the chances of inmates returning to prison.

Keeping in mind that this program, while being only a suggestion to countries with a low crime rate, will be mandatory for countries with a crime index greater than or equal to 60%. It will apply to non-violent prisoners who have received a sentence with the chance of parole. This program will take 4 days off of one sentence per book report completed correctly.

Emphasizing that this program will rely on donated books and therefore will have a nonexistent budget, and will go into effect by January 2021.

#### **Declares Accordingly that**

1. \*UNESCO will work with local Departments of Education to gather books for inmate use. These can include audio books as well as books in print.

2. Book Reports will be put into a Google Forms Document

3. The local Department of Education's trained official, with the Warden's consent, will determine if any days off of the inmate's sentence will be awarded.

Access To Medical Related Services For Nepal

The General Assembly,

Convinced that medical accessibility in Nepal is inaccessible to a large percent of the population, the government of Nepal seeks to have financial assistance from the United Nations to increase access.

Emphasizing the fact that 22% of the Nepali population is unable to have basic medical needs met when natural disasters occur. This is due to the remote and isolated locations of villages within the country. The country of Nepal calls upon the United Nations to aid with medical supplies and medical structures for Nepali citizens.

Recalling that in the last major earthquake, multiple Nepali's died because government agencies had very little medical aid and education on basic medical procedures. When in dire situations the people of Nepal cannot help each other by providing emergency medical services such as CPR and first aid. In the last natural disaster, Nepal had 9,000 confirmed deaths and over 22,000 injured. There were also large numbers of casualties and wounded in the earthquakes.

Referring back to the United Nations' Declaration of Human Rights' Article 25, the government of Nepal is unable to provide the necessary well being of its citizens – particularly those living in remote areas of the country. The declaration states, "Everyone has the right to a standard of living adequate for the health and well-being of himself and of his family, including food, clothing, housing and medical care and necessary social services, and the right to security in the event of unemployment, sickness, disability, widowhood, old age or other lack of livelihood in circumstances beyond his control." By ignoring this request, the United Nations and its General Assembly are ignoring one of the basic Human Rights outlined by its declaration.

Nepal calls upon the United Nations to assist in supplying funds to procure medical supplies for remote locations as well as educational support for its citizenry to appropriately use those supplies. Recognizing that by supplying Nepal with medical educators, access to supplies, and basic funding, many lives can be saved before the next natural disaster. The country of Nepal is seeking .5% of the 84 billion dollar funding to support access to first aid supplies and basic training for citizens in remote locations.

A proposal to require the Russian government to develop a National Action Plan in response to global slavery

The General Assembly,

Modern slavery entails to, as stated by the US State Department, sex trafficking, child sex trafficking, forced labor. Forced marriage also falls under modern slavery.

The Global Slavery Index estimates that 794,000 people lived in conditions of modern slavery in Russia on any given day in 2018.

In a 2018 report, the U.S. State Department says Russia still remains among the worst offenders of forced labor and human trafficking. The report states "The Russian government does not fully meet the minimum standards for the elimination of trafficking and is not making efforts to do so." Russia is ranked Tier 3 for the sixth year in a row. (Tier 1 being the best and Tier 3 being the worst)

Russia has criminalized human trafficking, however the act of slavery is not criminalized in Russia. Forced labor in Russia most frequently occurs in less regulated industries, such as agriculture, construction, and logging to name a few.

Russian women and children are victims of forced sexual exploitation, both within Russia and overseas. Child sexual exploitation is widespread throughout Russia. The noticeability of the crime has decreased due to the popularity of internet and online usage, which has created new ways to "approach" and exploit victims. It is reported that teenage girls are most commonly sexually exploited in brothels, hostels, saunas, and more so in private homes and apartments. In Russia women and girls are abducted for forced marriage: for example a 17 - year old girl was forced to marry a 46 year old police commander who already had one wife.

- 1. Calls upon the Russian government to create a National Action Plan to:
  - a. Introduce legislation that criminalizes slavery.
  - b. Establish legislation that criminalizes forced marriage and provide protection to those who may fall victim to forced marriage.
  - c. Publicly report statistics pertaining to modern slavery.
  - d. Establish shelters for victims of modern slavery and provide training for social workers so that they may be better prepared to handle modern slavery victims.
  - e. Ensure labor inspections for modern slavery in areas and places prone to exploitation.
- 2. Requests the UN to grant one million dollars towards the construction of shelters for victims of slavery.

Reducing Teen Pregnancy Rates of St.Lucia

The General Assembly,

Observing that the teen pregnancy rate in the country of St.Lucia is approximately 18.5 percent of all pregnancies and the rate is higher than neighboring countries including the United States of America,

Referring to Sarah Flood-Beaubrun's Statement to "The International Conference On Population and Development" she stated "high prevalence of teen pregnancy has long been a feature of the St.Lucian society".

Also stating they are trying to seek and find solutions to this problem,

Confident, that teen pregnancy is an incessant, unnecessary threat to the citizens of St. Lucia,

Welcoming, the aid from Cairo on this issue. However, the citizens should be able to choose and pick their resolutions for this devastating problem affecting thousands in the population,

Notes, that the World Bank shows that Saint Lucia had 158 births out of every 1000 women from the ages 15 to 19 in 1960 and 41 from 2016, while Haiti had 77 births in 1960 and 38 births in 2016.

- 1. Encourages, the Government of St.Lucia to take measures on creating financial aid programs and enforce existing support plans for young women;
- Considers, the increase of STDs and young women dying from childbirth. The Government of St.Lucia should
  increase inspections on multiple STDs in mothers/expecting teens and also create stricter policies for
  pregnant teens;
- 3. Emphasizes, that these resolutions should start in densely populated areas where this rate is insurmountably higher than in the surrounding areas;
- 4. Requests, help from fellow countries in The UN on reducing these problems and will consider negotiation offers from other countries.



Convention on the Reformation of Immigration Laws in Sweden

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The General Assembly,

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Having examined, Sweden's current immigration laws, it has been concluded that said laws should be reformed.

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Conscious that since the 1980s immigration has increased by 87k people per year, from 27k/year to 114k/year. With immigration, criminal activity has also been on the rise. A total of 12-22% of immigrants are connected with illegal activity. It may not sound like much but that's 14k criminals entering Sweden per year. With this document, the laws allowing possible criminals, or others that could harm people to enter and exit Sweden without much resistance will be reformed.

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The Swedish government is proposing the following reforms to current immigration laws:

- No history of major crimes
- No major contagious illness
- Tests & search for illegal drugs
- Active, violent mental disorders: disorders that are both currently active and could cause significant harm to other individuals
- Undeniable evidence of relationship between two immigrants travelling together
- A "safe space" to ask said immigrants if they are coming willingly/being trafficked, individually and with confidentiality.
- Basic understanding of government and primary language 1–4 will deny access into the country, 5 & 6 will result in an investigation for human trafficking, and 7 will result in a course of basic language
- \*Significant words are in italics and/or bold\*

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1. To effectively carry out these reforms, we request from the UN financial aid to construct civic centers in the cities of Stockholm, Gothenburg, and Malmo. The buildings will cost an estimated 55 million (USD) each. This would result in a total of 165 million (USD). The Swedish government would raise taxes by 1% to maintain the buildings and employ government workers.

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2. We also request this resolution be passed by the UN in support of these reforms so that it may be used as a model for other European countries struggling with immigration.

Convention on the Reduction of Human Trafficking Among Adolescent and Adult Females in Ukraine

Fully aware that trafficking has imprisoned and enslaved approximately 40.3 million individuals worldwide,

Taking note that the United Nations defines human trafficking as the recruitment, transportation, transfer, harboring, or receipt of persons by improper means (such as force, abduction, fraud, or coercion) for an improper purpose including forced labor or sexual exploitation,

Reaffirming that the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, Article 6, states that no one shall be held in slavery or servitude; slavery and the slave trade shall be prohibited in all their forms,

Having examined resolution 71/167 stating that it is essential to place the protection of human rights at the centre of measures taken to prevent and end trafficking in persons, and to protect, assist and provide access to adequate redress to victims, including the possibility of obtaining compensation from the perpetrators.

Emphasizing that Ukraine's labor and sexual exploitation crisis presents a great threat to the mental, emotional, and physical health of those trafficked,

Guided by the fact that the risk of being trafficked is higher among people fleeing conflict,

Realizing that in 2010, the United Nations launched an international human trafficking "plan of action" to combat this crisis, urging Governments around the world to take consistent and unified measures to try to end the suffering,

Observing that in 2018, the United Nations acknowledged that human trafficking is the third largest crime in the world,

- 1. Takes note of the use of juvenile curfews to deter human trafficking and reduce crime rates in multiple cities worldwide;
- 2. Emphasizes that Ukraine's attempts to address this problem have been ineffective in deterring human trafficking among females;
- 3. Requests the UN's help in implementing their plan of action within Ukraine;
- 4. Further requests that the plan of action include a nationwide curfew between 10pm and 5am for those, residing in Ukraine, that are under the age of 18;
- 5. Recommends that the UN provide additional training for law enforcement, to help in the identification of human trafficking rings and victims;
- 6. Supports mandatory imprisonment for those convicted of trafficking;
- Seeks support for the development of an educational program, for secondary schools, to promote safe practices and overall knowledge among female adolescents focusing on tactics often utilized by human traffickers;
- Calls upon the UN to create an international pamphlet and televised/radio broadcasted Public Service Announcement, utilized by multiple countries
  and languages, to raise awareness among females worldwide.

Recalling that the United Nations Refugee Agency helps refugees rebuild their lives.

- 1. Calls for the United Nations to set global quotas on accepting refugees and provide equitable financing for countries accepting refugees.
- 2. Encourages the United Nations to provide leadership in refugee crises and provide equitable responses with contributions from all member countries.
- 3. Request that member countries form partnerships and collaborate on solutions to refugee displacement.

Solving All Current and Future Economic and Humanitarian Crises in the World

The General Assembly,

Deeply concerned about the humanitarian and economic crises that are threatening the lives of the citizens of the countries of Venezuela, Somalia, South Sudan, Syria, Yemen, and others,

Convinced that, without the the intervention of the UN, the governments of the aforementioned countries will collapse and start a disaster that will affect every nation on this planet,

Emphasizing the state of hunger in the citizens of several countries across the world that are suffering from economic and humanitarian crises including hyperinflation,

Desiring medical resources to help the millions of families that are suffering with treatable illnesses because of the lack of personal wealth and stability in their native countries,

Alarmed by the rate of devaluation of the currencies of countries across the world that will cause a worldwide economic crash, Deeply disturbed about the probable outcome of a global pandemic will be caused as a result of lack of action by the nations of this body,

Conscious of the refugee crises that have formed as a result of several nationwide economic and humanitarian situations in the Middle East, Africa, and Eastern Europe,

Taking note of the UN's responsibility to assist all struggling developing nations, as well as to deliver humanitarian aid to the citizens of those countries,

Reaffirming that without action of the member nations of the UN and its worldwide agencies the stability of the world will collapse,

- Urges this body to create the United Nations Crisis Management Office (UNCMO) to manage and coordinate all aid and recovery operation in designated countries;
- 2. Requests the WHO (World Health Organization) in coordination with the UNCMO to start a classification program of countries based on the level of health-related severity and deliver aid and vaccines accordingly;
- 3. Designates the WHO in coordination with the UNCMO to assist local health officials in combating the effects of diseases, and also preventing diseases in their respective countries (including HIV, tuberculosis, malaria, and Zika);
- 4. Further requests the WFP (World Food Programme) to start a mission in UNCMO designated countries to fill the empty stomachs of the local people, which in turn leads to the ultimate prevention of further such disease outbreaks;
- Calls upon the IMF (International Monetary Fund) to work with local and UNCMO officials to restructure debt and bailout, when necessary, in UNCMO
  designated countries and work towards preventing a global pandemic;
- Encourages the UNIDO (United Nations Industrial Development Organization) to assist UNCMO officials in maintaining stability after IMF restructuring and assisting the struggling people in well-suffered economies;
