19 Acknowledging "that disability is an evolving concept and that disability results from the interaction between  
20 persons with impairments and attitudinal and environmental barriers that hinders their full and effective  
21 participation in society on an equal basis with others"

23 1. Urges member nations of the United Nations to donate an amount of approximately \$225,000 in United  
24 States dollars to construct a school specifically built for children with disabilities to learn.

Affirming the presence of government sponsored healthcare in the country of Australia,

Alarmed by the exclusion of aboriginal people, based on race, from the healthcare system in Australia,

Deeply Disturbed by the high mortality rate, and shortened life expectancy, of Australia’s aboriginal people compared to other ethnic groups within the country,


Further recalling that insufficient healthcare is a global problem affecting millions, as stated in the previous resolutions 70/232 and 59/202,

Recognizing that the Declaration of Human Rights declares that everyone has the right to adequate medical care regardless of race, gender, or social class,

Convinced that the Australian government has isolated these indigenous people in the northernmost regions of the country resulting in malnutrition and high rates of disease, due to a lack of basic necessities including healthcare,

Noting with deep concern that many have brought attention to this issue but no efforts have been made to resolve the problem,

1. Requesting that the Australian government provide doctors, medical supplies, and proper access to healthcare in areas where many aboriginal people live,
2. Recommends to begin by putting in place a mobile clinic in effect immediately and improved hospitals in heavily populated areas to restore the aboriginal people’s trust in the care of their doctors in order to increase the life expectancy and overall health of the aboriginal people,
3. Calls upon the United Nations to supply a committee of representatives and the World Health Organization to contribute medical professionals to make recommendations to Australia’s Health Minister to assess the levels of success,
4. Viewing with appreciation that this plan be implemented as soon as possible to enhance the well-being of this dwindling population and preserve the cultural heritage of these native peoples, pending on UN approval, by the end of 2019.

Bearing in mind that France has the highest rate for depression in the world as António Guterres, the 2018 secretary-general, once said: "staff struggling with anxiety, depression, and post-traumatic stress disorder or other circumstances have reported feeling isolated and ashamed with no one to turn to for help."

Fully aware that other countries such as America are working to help solve the worldwide problem of depression,

1. Requests access to the information the UN has gathered to help develop content for an awareness campaign entitled SAD (Share Awareness of Depression) consisting of curriculum materials, social media posts, and commercials.
2. Calls upon the World Health Organization to assist us in creating and distributing the SAD campaign materials.
3. Trusts that through the SAD campaign, we can encourage people to be more open about and seek help for their depression or other issues.
4. Calls upon other nations to promote this campaign to help bring an end to depression across the globe.

1                                    Convention on the Institution of a Reading Program for Reduced Jail Sentences

2  
3    The General Assembly,

4  
5    Deeply Concerned that 40% of incarcerated Germans will return to prison in the next three years.

6  
7    Fully Aware that, according to the World Health Organization , overcrowding, various forms of violence,  
8    enforced solitude or conversely, lack of privacy, lack of meaningful activity, isolation from social networks lead  
9    to severe mental health defects and depression.

10  
11    Affirming that this resolution would put into effect a reading program at prisons around the world, which would  
12    allow prisoners to read a selected book, and submit a report to a resident reading official provided by the  
13    federal state and trained by the nation's Department of Education in cooperation with UNESCO.


14  
15    Having Examined these conditions, instituting a reading program would help to dampen, if not eliminate these  
16    effects on prisoners according to the International Literacy Association and lessen the chances of inmates  
17    returning to prison.

18  
19    Keeping in mind that this program, while being only a suggestion to countries with a low crime rate, will be  
20    mandatory for countries with a crime index greater than or equal to 60%. It will apply to non-violent prisoners  
21    who have received a sentence with the chance of parole. This program will take 4 days off of one sentence per  
22    book report completed correctly.

23  
24    Emphasizing that this program will rely on donated books and therefore will have a nonexistent budget, and will  
25    go into effect by January 2021.

A Call to Reduce Poverty Worldwide

The General Assembly,

Alarmed that across the globe nearly three billion people, almost half of the world's population, live in poverty,


Deeply concerned that one billion children are living in poverty, and that 22,000 children die each day due to poverty,

Recognizing that poverty leads to poor health, poor education, and shorter lives, and that reducing poverty will result in lower crime rates, lower homelessness, and happier families,

Recalling that former U.N. Secretary General Ban Ki-moon stated, "there is no question that we can deliver on our shared responsibility to put an end to poverty,"

Noting that the best ways to reduce poverty include providing basic infrastructure to improve economic development, such as roads, electricity, running water, high speed internet, schools, and health clinics;

1. Calls upon the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) to administer the following aid program designed to decrease poverty;
2. Makes available each year five \$10 million grants to combat poverty through the building of infrastructure;
3. Notes that one \$10 million grant can provide the following infrastructure: 84 miles of roads, 26 miles of power lines, 72 miles of running water, 1,000 miles of high speed internet cable, 1,000 schools, or 166 health clinics;
4. Emphasizes that countries will have the option to choose any combination of these solutions that best suit their specific needs;
5. Proposes that if after five years the country can show a reduction in poverty the loan is forgiven, but if not the loan must be repaid;
6. Affirms that each \$10 million loan represents less than one tenth of one percent of the U.N.'s annual \$5.4 billion budget and all five loans together equal less than 1% of this budget.

1           A proposal to require the Russian government to develop a National Action Plan in response to global slavery  
2  
3    The General Assembly,  
4  
5    Modern slavery entails to, as stated by the US State Department, sex trafficking, child sex trafficking, forced labor. Forced  
6    marriage also falls under modern slavery.  
7  
8    The Global Slavery Index estimates that 794,000 people lived in conditions of modern slavery in Russia on any given day in  
9    2018.  
10  
11   In a 2018 report, the U.S. State Department says Russia still remains among the worst offenders of forced labor and human  
12   trafficking. The report states "The Russian government does not fully meet the minimum standards for the elimination of  
13   trafficking and is not making efforts to do so." Russia is ranked Tier 3 for the sixth year in a row. (Tier 1 being the best and  
14   Tier 3 being the worst)  
15  
16   Russia has criminalized human trafficking, however the act of slavery is not criminalized in Russia. Forced labor in Russia  
17   most frequently occurs in less regulated industries, such as agriculture, construction, and logging to name a few.  
18  
19   Russian women and children are victims of forced sexual exploitation, both within Russia and overseas.  
20   Child sexual exploitation is widespread throughout Russia. The noticeability of the crime has decreased due to the  
21   popularity of internet and online usage, which has created new ways to "approach" and exploit victims. It is reported that  
22   teenage girls are most commonly sexually exploited in brothels, hostels, saunas, and more so in private homes and  
23   apartments. In Russia women and girls are abducted for forced marriage: for example a 17 - year old girl was forced to  
24   marry a 46 year old police commander who already had one wife.  
25  
26   1.   Calls upon the Russian government to create a National Action Plan to:

28        a.   Introduce legislation that criminalizes slavery.

Reducing Teen Pregnancy Rates of St.Lucia

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The General Assembly,

Observing that the teen pregnancy rate in the country of St.Lucia is approximately 18.5 percent of all pregnancies and the rate is higher than neighboring countries including the United States of America,

Referring to Sarah Flood-Beaubrun’s Statement to “The International Conference On Population and Development” she stated “high prevalence of teen pregnancy has long been a feature of the St.Lucian society”.

Notes, that the World Bank shows that Saint Lucia had 158 births out of every 1000 women from the ages 15 to 19 in 1960 and 41 from 2016, while Haiti had 77 births in 1960 and 38 births in 2016.

1. Encourages, the Government of St.Lucia to take measures on creating financial aid programs and enforce existing support plans for young women;
2. Considers, the increase of STDs and young women dying from childbirth. The Government of St.Lucia should increase inspections on multiple STDs in mothers/expecting teens and also create stricter policies for pregnant teens;
3. Emphasizes, that these resolutions should start in densely populated areas where this rate is insurmountably higher than in the surrounding areas;

Convention on the Reformation of Immigration Laws in Sweden

The General Assembly,


Having examined, Sweden’s current immigration laws, it has been concluded that said laws should be reformed.

Conscious that since the 1980s immigration has increased by 87k people per year, from 27k/year to 114k/year. With immigration, criminal activity has also been on the rise. A total of 12-22% of immigrants are connected with illegal activity. It may not sound like much but that’s 14k criminals entering Sweden per year. With this document, the laws allowing possible criminals, or others that could harm people to enter and exit Sweden without much resistance will be reformed.

The Swedish government is proposing the following reforms to current immigration laws:

- No history of major crimes
- No major contagious illness
- Tests & search for illegal drugs
- Active, violent mental disorders: disorders that are both currently active and could cause significant harm to other individuals
- Undeniable evidence of relationship between two immigrants travelling together
- A “safe space” to ask said immigrants if they are coming willingly/being trafficked, individually and with confidentiality.
- Basic understanding of government and primary language 1-4 will deny access into the country, 5 & 6 will result in an investigation for human trafficking, and 7 will result in a course of basic language
- \*Significant words are in italics and/or bold\*

1. To effectively carry out these reforms, we request from the UN financial aid to construct civic centers in the cities of Stockholm, Gothenburg, and Malmo. The buildings will cost an estimated 55 million (USD) each. This would result in a total of 165 million (USD). The Swedish government would raise taxes by 1% to maintain the buildings and employ government workers.
2. We also request this resolution be passed by the UN in support of these reforms so that it may be used as a model for other European countries struggling with immigration.

Convention on the Reduction of Human Trafficking Among Adolescent and Adult Females in Ukraine

5 Deeply concerned that the number of adolescent and adult females illegally trafficked in Ukraine is higher than the international average, with over 230,000  
6 Ukrainian victims since 1991,  
7  
8 Fully aware that trafficking has imprisoned and enslaved approximately 40.3 million individuals worldwide,

10 Taking note that the United Nations defines human trafficking as the recruitment, transportation, transfer, harboring, or receipt of persons by improper means  
11 (such as force, abduction, fraud, or coercion) for an improper purpose including forced labor or sexual exploitation,

13 Reaffirming that the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, Article 6, states that no one shall be held in slavery or servitude; slavery and the slave trade shall be  
14 prohibited in all their forms,

16 Having examined resolution 71/167 stating that it is essential to place the protection of human rights at the centre of measures taken to prevent and end  
17 trafficking in persons, and to protect, assist and provide access to adequate redress to victims, including the possibility of obtaining compensation from the

20 Emphasizing that Ukraine’s labor and sexual exploitation crisis presents a great threat to the mental, emotional, and physical health of those trafficked,

Human Rights Treaty for Vietnam

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The General Assembly,


Deeply concerned that Vietnam’s Human Rights crisis poses a serious threat to all people In Vietnam, so we ask the UN to address our issue,

Recalling that every Human is born with thirty human rights, no matter the nationality of the person, the country of Vietnam is infringing on multiple Human Rights such as Restrictions on Freedom of Expression, Restrictions on Freedom of Assembly, Association, Movement, Freedom of Religion and up to 5 more,

Alarmed by how Vietnam is violating 8 Human Rights. Here is an example of a violation “Police arrested at least 21 people for sweeping “national security” offenses that are used to punish critical speech and peaceful activism.” according to ‘World Report 2018’. This is a Human Rights violation because according to ‘UN Universal Declaration of Human Rights’ Vietnam is violation of Article 19 and Article 20,

Determined to find an agreement with Vietnam and the UN for safeguarding all human rights of citizens of Vietnam and to make Vietnam a safer, equal, and more successful country.

1. Expecting the United Nations and Vietnam to sign a Human Rights Treaty so that the Vietnam citizens can get the rights they are born with and deserve;
2. Guided by participating countries to put trade sanctions or taxes on Vietnam until they fix the addressed Human Rights problems.

A Resolution to Address the Yemen Water Crisis

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The General Assembly,

Issue being that there are currently 1.4 million people in Yemen hunting for water, including children and adults of all ages.

Deeply concerned that there are not enough water treatment centers for the citizens living in this country, the current number being only 3 water purification centers in the country, located in Al Jawf, Hadhramaut, and Aden

Takes note of 90% of the sanitary water being used for qat, a non-prescription drug that 30% of young boys and girls in Yemen are being pressured into using, and provides no income for the country of Yemen.

Determined to build enough water purification centers for the citizens of Yemen to provide them with clean, accessible water,

Keeping in mind the cost in which the UN will fund,

1. Calls upon the UN to help build 11 new water purification centers, costing an approximate \$50,000. Trust that the number of qat users will go down, since groundwater will be utilized for drinking.
