Deforestation in Australia

The General Assembly,

Having examined that Australia statistically is shown to have one of the highest rates of deforestation in recent history, ranking at a loss of approximately 3.5 to 7 billion trees per year;

Noting with deep concern, deforestation has affected Australia and many other countries, resulting in the loss of biodiversity and endangerment of many species including plants and animals;

Fully aware of the number of trees that have been removed due to excessive clear-cutting, 0.16% of Australia's forestry is lost annually;

Realizing that 40% of Australia's forest has been lost and the remaining forests are fragmented;

Taking into consideration that if deforestation is continued, it can cause climate change, desertification, soil erosion, fewer crops, flooding, increased greenhouse gases in the atmosphere, and a host of problems for indigenous people;

Emphasizing that soil erosion is augmenting the decline in soil fertility and increasing Australia's greenhouse gas emissions;

Recognizing The New York Declaration on Forests claims that such a dramatic change in a woodland loss could absorb 4.5 and 8.8 billion tons of carbon emissions each year.

Calls upon, The United Nations and the government of Australia, International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD);

- 1. Recommends action begin in Queensland within the first appropriate planting season;
- 2. Requests companies who are cutting down the trees to replant the cut section with the same type of tree, in a timely fashion, to reduce soil erosion and not further affect the ecosystem.
- 3. Encourages IFAD to persuade the various companies to "Recycle and buy recycled products, to look for Forest Stewardship Council (FSC) certification on wood and wood products."
- 4. Draws attention to the fact that if IFAD and other agencies take too long to become involved and assist, Australia may experience low and poor air quality which may cause many plants, animals, and humans to suffer and possibly die.

An Act to Invoke Better Prison Conditions in Belgium and Around the World

The General Assembly,

Conscious of the fact that Belgium is a small country and is very densely populated with an overall population of 11,200,000, and 11,040 of those people being in prisons,

Fully aware that although the people in the prisons are convicts, they still deserve basic humane treatment such as being fed and having proper sleeping arrangements,

Deeply concerned that prisoners in Belgium are not getting ethical treatment, sometimes receiving no food or drink,

Recognizing that the European Court of Human Rights charged Belgium with accusations of inhuman treatment in 2014,

Further insisting these criteria be considered for all countries around the world with the same prisoner treatment.

- 1. Expresses the hope of betterment in the prisons worldwide to support the values of basic human rights and better judgment of what is considered to be unlawful actions but might be judged unfairly;
- 2. Further requests extensions be built on to smaller-sized imprisonment buildings and with the intention of avoiding over-crowding;
- 3. Draws attention to thoroughly reviewing cases breaking the law that might be unfairly judged to reduce overpopulation in the prisons and justice;
- 4. Requests the support of investing more money into prisons urging better conditions supporting human rights;
- 5. Further requests that the two genders will be separated to prevent sexual abuse and privacy ensured;
- 6. Recommends these requests to prisons worldwide.

The General Assembly,

Noting the deep concern related to the level of air pollution in the People's Republic of China. The People's Republic of China's air pollution has caused between 350,000 to 400,000 premature deaths.

Recalling this topic has been brought to the attention of the United Nations on multiple occasions. The United Nations warned the People's Republic of China in 2011 that its' air pollution "had dire implications" related to its citizens health.

Emphasizing that the Declaration of Human Rights states, In Article 25, Everyone has the right to a standard of living adequate for the health and well-being of himself and of his family, including food, clothing, housing and medical care and necessary social services, and the right to security in the event of unemployment, sickness, disability, widowhood, old age or other lack of livelihood in circumstances beyond control.

Conscious that steps have been taken by the People's Republic of China to reduce the level of air pollution.

Bearing in mind, that officials with the United Nations environmental agency have hailed the Chinese government efforts in reducing the level of air pollution. China has made significant efforts to reduce drastically the amount of pollutants emitted into the atmosphere.

Determined to reduce the air pollution and improve the quality of life in the People's Republic of China,

- 1. Calls upon the United Nations to provide funding to purchase large air purifiers to reduce air pollution; several of these are being utilize and reducing pollution successfully.
- 2. Calls upon the United Nations to provide funding to increase public transportation.
- 3. Calls upon the United Nations to provide funding to increase research related to reducing air pollution from passenger vehicles.
- 4. Calls upon the United Nations to conduct air pollution tests on the current air quality now, as well each year following for 10 years.

An Act to Eradicate Human Trafficking

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The General Assembly,

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Aware that the Government of Cuba does not fully meet the minimum standards for the elimination of human trafficking,

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Recognizing that human trafficking is currently a global pandemic and generates an estimated 32 billion dollars annually,

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Deeply disturbed that of the estimated 21 million people trafficked yearly, 5.5 million of them are children under the age of 18,

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Noting that the United Nations Office of Drugs and Crimes report that the most common form of human trafficking is for sexual exploitation,

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Conscious of the direct violation with the United Nations Universal Declaration of Human Rights; Article 4 stating "No one shall be held in slavery or servitude; slavery and the slave trade shall be prohibited in all their forms."; as well as Article 5 stating "No one shall be subjected to torture or to cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment."

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1. Calls upon United Nations Human Rights Council to meet with Cuban government officials regarding encouragement and protection of citizens' personal liberties;

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2. Encourage the Human Rights Watch, Amnesty International and other NGOs to work with the UN in helping educate the Cuban judicial system along with judicial systems of other countries and advocate for human rights enforcement;

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3. Requests UN officials to collaborate with Cuban government officials to develop and enforce harsher laws and punishments for those convicted of human trafficking crimes.

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Poverty to Prosperity in the Horn of Africa

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The General Assembly,

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Alarmed that Djibouti is one of the poorest countries in the world,

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Deeply concerned with the lack of essentials accessible to a majority of the population of Djibouti with 42% of it's citizens living in poverty and 23% living in extreme poverty,

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Noting with deep concern that 90% of food in Djibouti is imported due to the difficulty in growing food which is attributed to the arid climate,

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Bearing in mind the United Nations #1 Sustainable goal is to end poverty in all forms,

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 Calls upon the United Nations Development Programme to work with organizations such as Oxfam and Aid for Africa to help increase entrepreneurship in order to end the cycle of poverty;

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2. Urges the Food and Agriculture Organization of the UN to work with organizations such as Farm Africa, AGRA and Seawater Greenhouses to increase the production of food produced in Djibouti through the use of greenhouses in order to reduce their dependency on other countries and reduce food costs;

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3. Recommends that the World Tourism Organization and UN legal advisers work with the government of Djibouti to create a media campaign to promote tourism and create a tourist tax in order to strengthen the infrastructure within Djibouti.

1	Resolution to Improve Education Systems and Government Funding
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The General Assembly,

Fully aware that an educated population must be the cornerstone of any future plan to improve social, economic and environmental conditions,

Noting further that education is the main means whereby a society constructs its values, and is a key factor in sustainable human development which will enable future generations to properly manage the country's social and natural resources,

Deeply concerned that the Dominican Republic is failing to comply with the requirements of the Education Law of 1997 in Article 197, stating that "the public expenditure for education should be at 4% of the Gross Domestic Product, or GDP," - that rate is currently sitting 1.9%; which is less than half,

Realizing that poor school conditions particularly in rural areas, a shortage of teachers and inadequate lesson material to fill the day also often resulted in students dropping out. Schools and teachers, however, have not had sufficient funds to improve academics,

Observing that the United Nations Universal Declaration of Human Rights: Article 26 (1) states "Everyone has the right to education. Education shall be free, at least in the elementary and fundamental stages. Elementary education shall be compulsory. Technical and professional education shall be made generally available and higher education shall be equally accessible to all on the basis of merit.",

Inspired by many Civil Society Organizations forming the Decent Education Coalition, which are attempting to place demands on the Dominican government to comply with their legal obligations,

Calls upon the United Nations to:

- 1. Demand Dominican government officials to comply with legislation adopted by the DR;
- 2. Assist Dominican government officials in establishing a relationship with International Education Organizations, such as NAFSA: Association of International Educators, IIE: Institute of International Education, UNICEF: United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund, among others; to reform the education system in the Dominican Republic, particularly in areas of curriculum, equity, and retention.

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Critical Crisis of Child Labor

The General Assembly,

Observing that 41.5% of children in Ethiopia are forced into child labor in order to help provide for their families,

Alarmed that Ethiopian law allows children under the age of 16 to perform hazardous work which goes against International laws,

Noting with deep concern that worldwide 218 million children between the ages 5–17 are employed and 73 million are in hazardous work conditions,

Recalling UN resolution 50/153 on the rights of children and the protection of children from performing any work that was likely to be hazardous, to interfere with the child's education, or to be harmful to the child's health or physical, mental, spiritual, or social development,

1. Requests that the International Labor Organization(ILO) send a delegation to work with the Ethiopian government to update their labor laws to comply with the ILO minimum age convention number 138;

2. Calls upon the United Nations Development Programme(UNDP) to work with the Ethiopian government and companies such as Ford and Google who are looking to expand their companies reach into Ethiopia and throughout Africa in order to create jobs and provide stability for the people of Ethiopia;

3. Requests that UNICEF and the World Bank work with organizations such as BuildOn, Uniform+1, and Save the Children to help provide schools, uniforms, and support thus providing access and encouragement to continue their education.

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Prevention and Reduction of Electronic Waste in Ghana

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The General Assembly,

5 6 Noting Ghana is home to the world's largest site for the dumping of electronic waste through the importing of out-of-date computers, televisions, phones and other devices,

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Alarmed that 23 percent of deaths in some developing nations, particularly nations in Africa, Asia, and Europe, are linked to various forms of pollution, notably electronic waste, Noting the UNEP (United Nations Environment Programme) estimates that between 2007 and 2020, domestic television e-waste will double, computer e-waste will increase five times, and cell phone e-waste will surge eighteen times its current amount,

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Deeply concerned that e-waste negatively impacts the health of millions of people through exposure to toxic waste, and the seepage of harmful elements such as lead can enter the soil and groundwater,

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Fully aware that e-waste in countries like Ghana, where electronic waste is being dumped at alarming rates, can cause immense and, at times, irreversible damage to the land and water because only 29 percent of global e-waste is handled via the accepted best practice recycling channels,

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1. Requesting the United Nations set and enforce measurable standards and guidelines for the disposal of E-waste in developing countries,

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2. Calls upon the United Nations to send a team of 200 trained volunteers to Ghana to assist in proper E-waste management practices for five years until the problem decreases exponentially.

Convention on the Boycott of Indian Exports

The General Assembly,

Noting that the Universal Declaration of Human Rights affirms the principle of the inadmissibility of discrimination and proclaims that all human beings are born free and equal in dignity and rights and that everyone is entitled to all the rights and freedoms set forth therein, without distinction of any kind, including distinction based on sex,

Recalling that discrimination against women violates the principles of equality of rights and respect for human dignity, is an obstacle to the participation of women, on equal terms with men, in the political, social, economic and cultural life of their countries, hampers the growth of the prosperity of society and the family and makes more difficult the full development of the potentialities of women in the service of their countries and of humanity,

Reminding fellow delegates that the nation state of India signed and ratified the Committee on the Elimination of the Discrimination of All Women (CEDAW),

Declaring the nation state of India has repeatedly not affirmed their commitment to the principles of the CEDAW since the year of ratification,

Noting the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom (WILPF) conducted a thorough review of how India is following through on their CEDAW commitment and found it lacking,

Stating the nation state of India has either moderately and even completely rejected the recommendations of the 2014 WILPF review,

1. Calls upon the member states of the UN to support an immediate boycott of Indian exports until a full, favorable WILPF panel review is conducted from July 31, 2019 – Jan 31, 2020.

A Convention to lower the gap between higher and lower class in Ireland

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The General Assembly,

Alarmed by the gap created by the higher and lower classes due to 20% of the higher class earning five times more than the lower class. Note that the economy is quickly rising, and that gap is still a prominent issue that is lacking a fix where 1 out of every 6 people live in poverty.

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Deeply concerned that there is an abundance of poverty, and not enough banks and workers.

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Keeping in mind , that Ireland has a total of 87 banks opposed their neighboring country, France, that has 400 banks in total

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Fully aware, that the Irish government contributes and agrees to place one bank in each of the five least financial parts of Ireland and that this could help not just to eliminate the financial gap, just by allowing the people to open savings accounts, etc., but offering more job opportunities for impoverished people, such as accountants and bank workers.

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Convinced that it will cost \$120 per square foot with a total of \$120,000 in total for all 5 banks.

2. Further resolves lack of accountants/jobs and the gap between high and low classes

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1. Calls upon the UN Development program for \$120,000 fund for all of the banks.

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3. Designated to those who makes less than \$218.90 a week or less, or \$11,422.81 or less annually.

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4. Reminded that there will be no cost to civilians.

Keeping in mind, Principle 9 of the Declaration of the Rights of the Child, adopted in 1990 by the General Assembly of the UN, states the child "shall not not be the subject of traffic in any form...the child shall not be admitted to employment before an appropriate minimum age; he shall in no case be caused or permitted to engage in any occupation or employment, which would prejudice his health or education or interfere with his physical, mental, or moral development",

Emphasizing the fact that according to the Government Humanitarian Aid Commission over 250,000 people in Sudan have been affected by the flooding which is more than double the number of people in previous years,

1. Urges the UN Human Settlements Program to work with Habitat for Humanity to build stable homes providing adequate shelter from floods in Sudan;

2. Calls upon the United Nations Industrial Development Organization(UNIDO) to assist with the construction of water drainage systems directed to reservoirs to be used for the production of potable water;

Noting the deep concern related to the level of air pollution in Tawian

Recalling this topic has been brought to the attention of the United Nations on multiple occasions.

Emphasizing that the Declaration of Human Rights states, In Article 25, Everyone has the right to a standard of living adequate for the health and well-being of himself and of his family, including food, clothing, housing and medical care and necessary social services, and the right to security in the event of unemployment, sickness, disability, widowhood, old age or other lack of livelihood in circumstances beyond control.

Conscious that steps have been taken by Taiwan to reduce the level of air pollution.

Bearing in mind, that Taiwan has significantly reduced many of the most prevalent and dangerous pollutants, but the situation appears due almost as much to the polluted air sweeping across the Taiwan Strait from China

4. Calls upon the United Nations to conduct air pollution tests on the current air quality now, as well each year following for 10 years.

1 A resolution to improve quality of life for orphans in Tajikistan 2

The General Assembly,

Recognizing the absence of orphanages in Tajikistan.

Alarmed by the absence of orphanages. Hundreds of children are being put into a single orphanage. This orphanage doesn't have electricity. 43 out of 1000 children die before their 5th birthday, and that is mostly caused by the poor living conditions in the orphanages in Tajikistan.

Adoptions from the Tajikistan orphanage are rare. According to the United Nations Human Rights Declaration article 16–1:Men and Women of full age, without any limitation due to race, nationality or religion, have the right to found a family. Article 16–3: The family is the natural and fundamental group unit of society and is entitled to protection by society and the State.

- 1. Noting that the condition of the one orphanage in Tajikistan, we ask the United Nations to improve the condition of the one existing orphanage.
- 2. Realizing that there is only one orphanage in Tajikistan, we would like to build more orphanages to improve the living conditions for orphans in Tajikistan.
- 3. To spread the orphanages throughout the country. We will build 2 more orphanages in the cities of Khujand and Murgab.

3	The General Assembly,

5	Deeply concerned about the percentage of Turkey affected by child sexual abuse.
6	
7	We are fully aware that child sexual abuse affects more than just our country of Turkey, however in this country
8	alone sexual child abuse rates have risen over 700% in the past ten years, and 18 out of every 100 people who
9	get married were sexually abused as a child.
10	
11	Noting further, the number of cases reported for sexual child abuse worldwide is 90,000 a year.
12	
13	Knowing out of these 90,000 cases world wide 1/9 of them are found in turkey can be concerning.
14	
15	We plan to create a task force with RAINN that will help to further the prevention of sexual child abuse in
16	turkey and better the safety of all kids, and our future generations. We would also like to extend the prison
17	sentence from 15 years to a life sentence.

Assistance to Fund Child Labor Reform in Uganda

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The General Assembly,

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Fully aware that in 2017, Uganda made moderate advancements in efforts to eliminate child labor, however, it is not enough because children in Uganda engage in the worst forms of child labor in commercial sexual exploitation, as well as dangerous manual labor,

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Approving that approximately \$9 million was set aside by the Ugandan government to a program that aims to reduce youth unemployment through enterprise development, job creation, and business skills training,

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Recognizing that more funding is needed, to train law enforcement agencies to conduct child labor inspections and investigations,

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Taking into consideration, gaps in the legal framework persist that contradict laws regulating the minimum age for employment,

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Deeply concerned that existing programs are inadequate to address child labor in the country, "Child Labor - Uganda." United States Department of Labor, 19 Sept. 2018, www.dol.gov/agencies/ilab/explore-our-resources/reports/child-labor/uganda.

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 Calling for the assistance of UNICEF, the United Nation Children's Fund that is already present in Uganda to help fund continuing efforts in the country to protect children and prevent dangerous child labor;

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Combating Human Trafficking

The General Assembly,

Convinced that human trafficking has reached the level of an epidemic, not only in the United Kingdom, but around the world,

Deeply Disturbed that the 24.9 million people are currently being trafficked for modern day slavery, and only 9,000 traffickers were convicted in courts around the world,

 Alarmed by the insensitivity of world governments by not prioritizing the effort to end this and spend adequate money in doing so. Currently, traffickers make \$150 billion per year, and the world is vastly behind in spending to try to stop it. Even the United States only spends \$120 million per year, less than 1% of the profits made by criminals. The city of London's police force, one of the largest cities in the world, only spends \$3 million per year, and only 2 out of 45 British police departments reported spending an adequate amount of money to combat trafficking,

Bearing in mind that the United Nations "Trafficking Victims Protection Act" only gives minimal suggestions to stop trafficking, Recalling that the United Nations Declaration of Human Rights, Article 4, states: No one shall be held in slavery or servitude; slavery and the slave trade shall be prohibited in all their forms.

1. Requests that the world as a whole spends and adequate amount of money to combat trafficking. Each country shall spend according to their GDP,

2. Further requests that an international database be readily available for all nations to use at their border crossings and ports of entry, and make it an international crime to fail to report any activity that has anything to do with trafficking. That includes using known trafficked workers, or knowingly aiding a trafficker,

3. Recommends that medical or mental care be more easily accessible for victims of human trafficking regardless of their legal status in that country.

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A Convention to Provide More Funding for Foster Parents in the United States
