8 bees could have a drastic effect on global ecosystems,
9
10 Emphasizing that bee pollinators are responsible for 90% of the food that is eaten across the globe,
11
12 Expressing its appreciation for the European Union's efforts in banning neonicotinoid pesticides which have
13 harmful effects on bees and other pollinators,
14
15 1. Calls upon all member nations of the United Nations to adopt legislation which would ban pesticides
16 which are harmful to bees and other pollinators;
17
18 2. Emphasizes the urgent need for member nations to not only ban harmful pesticides but also take
19 measures to ensure that bee populations are protected and cultivated;
20
21 3. Trusts that delegates will return to their local governments after this General Assembly and urge those
22 nations to take up this matter with all haste;
23
24 4. Further recommends that member nations, once legislation is passed, treat this legislation as a criminal
25 offence as endangering the bee population likewise endangers the human population.

Resolution to Address Bail and Prison Over-Crowding

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The General Assembly,


Fully aware, that the jails in Buenos Aires are built to hold 26,000 people, but they are holding 33,000 people right now. Some areas of the jails and prisons are flooded with sewage. The population of the jails are growing 1,600 inmates a year. The crime rate is going up, causing the inmate count to continually increase.

Deeply concerned that very few people that are arrested have the money to pay for bail, causing them to be held in jail for months until their actual trial. If people had the money to pay for bail, they could stay out of jails until their trial, saving the government money. The government would be able to take some of the funds out of cleaning, food, and other jail costs and put their funding towards the betterment of other parts of the country.

Reaffirming that in article 5 of the Declaration of Human Rights it states "No one shall be subjected to...inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment." Also a UN resolution has been passed, the Nelson Mandela Rules ensures that prison conditions live up to a certain standard.


Noting further that Piera Barzano, senior Regional Advisor of the Justice Section at UNODC commented, "Prison overcrowding can also be considered as a symptom of a malfunctioning justice system, and the problems of overcrowding have to be dealt with by the prison administration, although the solutions are seldom within their reach."

1. Calls upon the UN to create a new agency funded by 0.15% of the UN's total revenue(\$79.8 million). Individual governments would also be able to contribute to this fund. This fund would then be used to pay the cash bail of prisoners in countries with a pretrial incarceration rate of 50% or more. Prisoners that are presumed innocent will be eligible for this new funding to pay their cash bail.
2. Recommends actions to take place in all countries with a pretrial incarceration rate of 50% or more starting in January 2021.

1 Reducing Greenhouse Gases for Future Generations

3 The General Assembly,

4

5 Deeply concerned that greenhouse gases are a large problem around the world.

6

7 Emphasizing that global warming is increasing rapidly due to greenhouse gases adding to the atmosphere. In

8 1950 the carbon dioxide level was 300 parts per million. Now it is at its all time high of 415 parts per million.

9 Earth's average temperature has risen 1.9 degrees fahrenheit since 1880. We have lost approximately 34% of

10 sea ice since 1979. The ice lost in Antarctica has tripled in the past decade.

11

12 Recalling the UN resolution 48/186 and 42/187 on the Environment Perspective in 2000 and Beyond on the

13 report of the World Commissions on Environment and Development

14

15 Reaffirming the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change 1, the Paris Agreement, and the

16 Protection of global climate for present and future generations of humankind.

17

18 Expressing its appreciation for the work of Palestine, the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate

19 Change, and 188 countries present at the 21st Conference of the Parties of the UNFCCC.

20

21 Guided by the UN secretary's statement on climate change saying, "Climate change is moving faster than we are

22 and its speed has provoked a sonic boom SOS across our world."

23

24 Confirms Trees can help reduce greenhouse gases by taking in the extra carbon dioxide in the atmosphere.

25 Trees can take in carbon dioxide and give us oxygen.

26

27 1. Requests we should take action by planting more trees around Australia and the world.

28 2. Proclaims we will give each country 1 tree for every 10 square miles, for example we would give

29 Germany 13,784 trees because Germany has 137,849 square miles. The country is also given the

30 opportunity to place the trees wherever they choose.


31 3. Further reminds we are getting more than just one benefit from planting trees.

32 4. Takes note of not wanting to get rid of greenhouse gases completely because they keep our Earth from


33 getting too cold.

34 5. Emphasizes that the type of tree that will be given out to each country will be determined upon their

35 climate.

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The General Assembly,

Alarmed by the fact that children are working at very young ages, they are doing very laborious jobs and jobs that their ages can not handle. They work at shoe shiners, street cleaners and other jobs. These young children start working at the young age of 10. To add onto the danger they only earn 0.14 cents per shoe pair. The main reason young children work is to pay for school supplies and just basic living necessities.

Observing that, United Nations International Labor Organization (ILO), says "Children under 14 should not work. An estimated 850,000 Bolivian children work, which is nearly 30% of children ages 5 to 17, according to UNICEF."

1 A Resolution to End Deforestation in the Amazon

2
3 The General Assembly,

4
5 Noting that conservation of the Amazon is incredibly important because the rainforests provide a major home
6 to many species, and many species are actually only found in the Amazon. "40,000 plant species, 427 mammals,
7 378 reptiles, more than 400 amphibians, and around 3,000 freshwater fishes" comprise the species that live in
8 the Amazon (according to WWF).

9
10 Fully aware that deforestation is not the primary reason for the destruction of the Amazon, it is being burnt
11 down at incredible rates, which are continually rising, the likes of which have rarely been seen before.


12
13 Acknowledging that the plan that has been implemented has not been as effective as originally projected at the
14 time of its creation, despite praise from its authors. The document calls for a world where forests are
15 "sustainably managed, contribute to sustainable development, and provide economic, social, environmental, and
16 cultural benefits for current and future generations" though has failed to act quickly or effectively enough to
17 slow and prevent further burning of the Amazon and other rainforests. Document "United Nations Strategic
18 Plan for Forests 2017-2030" A/71/L.63 and "United Nations Forest Instrument" A/71/L.64

19
20 Concerned that there are no legally binding international laws on deforestation in effect.

21
22 Keeping in mind that the IUCN, the International Union for Conservation of Nature, has designated
23 approximately 44 percent of the Amazon as a protected area.


24
25 Recognizing that António Guterres, Secretary-General of the United Nations has said "I'm deeply concerned by
26 the fires in the Amazon rainforest. In the midst of the global climate crisis, we cannot afford more damage to a
27 major source of oxygen and biodiversity. The Amazon must be protected." on Twitter (at 1:13 PM on Aug 22,
28 2019)

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1. Calls upon the IUCN to officially instate the whole of the Amazon as a protected forest.
 2. Further requests the UN to set up a designated border of the Amazon. With that in place, any land that is then taken from the Amazon for agriculture will have major sanctions on the goods produced in the Amazon. With these sanctions and taxes in place, they will pay for the replanting of the Amazon and classes for farmers to learn about how to utilize more sustainable farming methods.
 3. Urges these actions take place in the beginning of 2021.

1 A Resolution to End Assaults Against Women

2
3 The General Assembly,

4
5 Alarmed by the fact that officers in Prisons/detention centers in Chile are sexually assaulting many women.
6 Many of these women have still not returned to their homes. Reports have said that women have been raped,
7 forced to strip down naked, and touched in many inappropriate places with hands, and rifles. They are
8 threatened that they will be killed if they don't cooperate.


9
10 Conscious that this problem has grown a rising concern during the recent protests in Chile. Many women have
11 reported the officers doing these awful things to them after being arrested from participating in these protests,
12 but their voices aren't heard without the evidence.

13
14 Observing that according the Chilean Network Against Violence Against Women, "42 cases of sexual abuse are
15 reported each day to the police (approximately two every hour). In 2018, only 25.7% of sexual abuse cases
16 resulted in judicial rulings." There has been a Chilean civilian protest, where the female protestors stood in the
17 streets and said "the rapist is you," and "It wasn't my fault; not where I was, not how I dressed." Many of these
18 women have suffered some form of sexual abuse.


19
20 Fully aware that in resolution 2467 it states, "The acute vulnerability of so many women, children and men to
21 sexual violence in conflict situations around the world must crystalize our resolve into clear action to prevent
22 these crimes."

23
24 Recalling Secretary- General Antonio Guterres stated, "Let us declare in one voice: We will not tolerate anyone
25 committing or condoning sexual exploitation and abuse. We will not let anyone cover up these crimes with the
26 UN flag. ... Let us make zero tolerance a reality."


- 27
28 1. Call upon the United Nation to hire certified people to check the security tapes at each prison and to
29 check the police officers twice per month. If there are not security cameras, the United Nations will
30 provide them.
31 2. Requests the group of the United Nations members to come to each Chile prison, twice per month. After
32 they take the tapes, they do have to review them, but they do not have to review them in the prison.
33 According to Un.org, Article 41 of the United Nations Charter gives the Security Council the authority to
34 use a variety of measures to enforce its decisions. This can and often includes creating committees,
35 which is what we would do to create the job of the United Nations members who would come around to
36 the prisons.

An Act to Restrict Oil Exploitation

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The General Assembly,

Observing that as of 2017 in Ecuador, 8.3 billion barrels of oil were drilled illegally and the profit did not go towards Ecuador’s declining economy,

Understanding that Ecuador is a poor country and gets most of its money from its oil sales,


Conscious that the Ecuadorian government needs to get money and the private companies need to get profit from the oil they drill,

Aware that If people are illegally drilling oil oil profit is taken away from the companies,

Concerned that prices will be rising for food and shelter because people need more money,


Realizing that most people can’t afford such expensive prices

1. Calls upon the U.N. to fine people for drilling on private property. This fine will close at least 30 dollars per barrel and will increase by one dollar for every barrel on top of this 30 dollar beginning fine. Private Property includes local fields, parks, and the Amazon rainforest. If the company or people are not able to financially pay the fine they will have to work service hours. Those service hours will be put towards cleaning up oil spills, also it will be put towards rainforest preservation. The fine or the amount of service hours sentenced shall vary on the amount of oil drilled illegally that the government knows about;
2. Proclaims that Ecuador shall direct 3% of its GDP towards natural resources to help form other fuel incomes. If necessary other countries such as the U.S. shall fund money towards this project. As a return, Ecuador shall pay back as much money as given or give that much in oil or natural resources in return;
3. Resolves that Ecuadorian companies shall fund 2 to 5% of their income per physical year towards switching its oil product to natural resources. Those companies will have to make at least 45% of its product to be natural resources. The natural resources they could use are coal mines, wind turbines, and solar panel farms. Said natural resources will benefit because it costs less to produce and can be made more of, it can also be farmed in mass amounts. This will save the company more, which can let more people be given raises. This in turn makes people have more money to spend which increases the GDP of the country.

1 Commitment to Radioactive Waste Solution prior to Nuclear Reaction Creation

3 The General Assembly,

5 The Estonian government had to build a new storage facility for the radioactive waste that was generated
6 during decommissioning of left over nuclear reactors at the former Soviet Paldiski naval base was responsible
7 for creating on our soil.. The project cost the Estonian taxpayers about 90m euros (\$103.4m), but was
8 necessary for responsible environmental protection. The Radiation Act was by the European Atomic Energy
9 Community (EURATOM) Directives and effective on May 1, 2004. The part of this act dedicated to radioactive
10 waste management states that the estimated harmful effect on future generations of such practices will not
11 exceed the effect permitted in the legislation. It also required that the activity and quantities of created
12 radioactive waste and emissions are as low as possible. This would also prevent members of the United
13 Nations from violating the resolution: Prohibition of the dumping of radioactive wastes from the 56th session in
14 2001–2002.

15
16 There are currently up to thirty countries that belong to the United Nations that have expressed intent to
17 create nuclear reactors by the year 2025, yet many do not have the supporting GDP to provide for a reactor
18 and waste management.. It is irresponsible to start building nuclear power plants without the financial
19 resources to contain radioactive waste. The price to build a nuclear power plant ranges from 6 billion and 9
20 billion, however the cost to contain waste is 38 billion and rising. Hazardous waste has negative and
21 irreversible human health and environmental impacts and needs a proactive solution. We ask the United
22 Nations Assembly to support the following initiatives:

- 23
24 1. Enforce written and verified approval for containment of waste management resources and ability to
25 build infrastructure prior to any nuclear facility build out.
26
27 2. Introduce economic sanctions and fines for members that are not complying.
28
29 3. Allow a nuclear task force to inspect all areas suspected of violating the containment resolution and
30 monitor correct installation for effectiveness.

10 Convinced that we need to protect the environment from the effects of wildfires such as smoke contamination
11 and pollution.


12
13 Inspired by the steps taken by Finland and the tips provided by the national geographic, New Zealand is
14 prepared to begin taking steps towards a healthier sustainable environment.

15
16 Recalling the concern of the United Nations with the effects of wildfires (such as pollution and deforestation) in
17 other countries, such as Argentina, Croatia, Egypt, France, Greece, and more.

18
19 Recognizing the destruction that recent New Zealand wildfires are having on their environment, as well as the
20 surrounding areas, yet understanding the difficulty of wildfire prevention. In order to solve this problem, we will
21 enforce a law to create awareness for all of the fire hazardous acts that people willingly participate in on a
22 regular basis. Through our program IPEW (Inmates Preventing Extreme Wildfires) we will request prisoners to
23 clean up flammable materials in their environment such as dry and dead plants or unattended fires.


24
25 Believing in the necessity for environmental safety in New Zealand for its citizens as they live in an area of
26 smoke contamination, apocalyptic grey fog, hazy skies, and power outages due to wildfires.

- 27
28 1. Requesting the enforcement of a law (beginning in New Zealand and advancing, after a successful year,
29 to spread to other countries affected by wildfires such as China, Croatia, Italy, Greece, United States,
30 and Australia) preventing unattended fires, smoking in public parks, using fireworks in a densely
31 forested area, and burning materials without purpose. The consequence for any person who violates the
32 law will be a fine of \$150 for each incident..
33
34 2. Requesting the implementation of the IPEW program, therefore requiring the inmates to rid their
35 surroundings of fire hazardous brush. This program will also benefit the high imprisonment rates of New
36 Zealand by instilling responsibility characteristics in the prisoners.

An Act to Decrease Climate and Economy Problems in Norway

5 Emphasizing that Norway’s oil production causes environmental and climate problems for the globe and
6 Norway’s economy has been declining recently,
7
8 Citing Part 1 of Consideration Article 25 in the Human Rights Declaration quotes, “Everyone has the right to a

17 Bearing in mind that this oilfield has significantly been contributing to air pollution, climate, and environmental
18 issues. Global leaders are debating the best approach to combat an intensifying climate crisis. The United
19 Nations (UN) has also recognized the phenomenon as the defining issue of our time, with a recent report calling
20 it “the greatest challenge to sustainable development.”
21
22 Deeply concerned that the economy is also already declining because the unemployment rate increased in
23 November, retail sales slowing down in October, and consumer confidence decreasing in December.
24
25 Recognizing that shutting down oil production and increasing production of renewable resources would create
26 more jobs and help the economy,
27
28 Determined to achieve using a better option to help the climate and environment and grow the economy,

30 1. Calls upon Norway’s government to reduce the production of oil over the coming years;

A Resolution to Provide Asylum for Refugees

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The General Assembly,


Concerned that there have been 700,000 Venezuelans that have entered Peru, and only 161,000 of them have applied for asylum, and 700 of those applicants have actually been granted temporary asylum in the country.

Noting that when Venezuelan immigrants come to Peru, they have 3 options. They can apply for temporary asylum (which may lead to permanent residency), obtain a tourist visa, or stay in the country undocumented.

Recalling that as stated in article 14 in the Declaration of Human Rights, Everyone has the right to seek and to enjoy asylum in other countries asylum from persecution. The New York Declaration, the UNHCR, and the UN are not only partnering with NGOs and governments but with financial institutions, civil society and think tanks and academia and faith leaders. With these groups, they will ease pressure on countries that welcome and host refugees, build self-reliance of refugees, expand access to resettlement in third countries and other complementary pathways, and create conditions that enable refugees to return to their home countries. (If they have the desire to do so.)

Fully aware that Eduardo Stein, joint special representative for Venezuelan refugees and migrants states, "A total of 95 organizations in 16 countries have come together to put in place in a record time a coordinated roadmap for action to respond to the urgent humanitarian needs of refugees and migrants from Venezuelan but also a plan to secure their social and economic inclusion in the communities that receive them."

1. Urges the United Nations to make getting temporary asylum in Peru easier for these migrants. By getting asylum in Peru, they can work for an income, which will be necessary for them to return home once Venezuela is safe again. They also have the option to travel somewhere else to start a new life. Recommends the United Nations to provide incentives for international companies to build facilities in Peru. The refugees will work at those facilities.
2. The revenue will go to the company, but money from income taxes and other business taxes will go to the government, and the government will use that money to provide resources for refugees that they are currently unable to.

5 Considering Taiwan’s minimum wage is drastically lower than that of its neighbors,
6
7 Observing that Taiwan’s average yearly salary only reaches \$1,500 after taxes,
8
9 Deeply disturbed that many other nations such as the Philippines, Nigeria, Malaysia, Hong Kong, Singapore,
10 South Korea, Kazakhstan, Indonesia, Russia, Turkey, Poland, India, and Czechia also suffer from minimum wages
11 below the cost of living,
12
13 Seeing as an increased minimum wage raises worker productivity and employee morale leading to lower
14 employment costs,
15
16 Keeping in mind that increased minimum wages boosts demand for goods and services leading to economic
17 stimulus,
18
19 Recalling ECOSOC Resolution 2008/18 and the goal of promoting full employment and decent work for all,
20
21 Conscious of the work being done by the Political Economy Research Institute to provide research and
22 proposals to promote living wages to improve life on our planet,
23
24 Guided by the UN Deputy Secretary General’s opening remarks of the seventy-fifth session of the Commission
25 for Social Development regarding income inequality,

27 1. Welcoming the opportunity to discuss a global minimum wage,

Resolution to stop illegal capturing of wildlife in Thailand


The General Assembly,

Thailand is currently experiencing a spike in the number of cases of illegal poaching and capturing. The current laws in Thailand have not been successful in combating this issue. Since the Wild Animal Reservation and Protection Act was amended in 2014, Thailand still accounts for 49% of the illegal ivory trade.

1. Areas like zoos and areas highly populated with endangered animals will be protected by guards with monthly thorough examinations of each place.
2. Inner parts of forests (or other areas with these high populations) may have fences that are also guarded.
3. Specific wildlife services will be provided that are in charge of preventing theft and will arrest people.
4. These services will have the role of travelling and more wandering the areas, having shifts, etc.
5. Tourists will be checked when entering and exiting.
6. Tourists are not allowed to interact with exotic animals in the environment unless given permission or they must pay a fine.
7. Tourists must be thoroughly searched before entering an airport and a plane.
8. Around areas that are highly populated with endangered animals can be protected by guards.
9. Animals cannot be bred without a specific license
10. There will be a fish and wildlife type service preventing poaching and will be able to arrest poachers and anyone caught smuggling animals, and more game wardens added to each area especially in heavily animal populated areas
11. This bill will be paid for and supported by PETA and will be put into effect as of June 2022.

5 Previous actions of the United Nations to combat trafficking was to create Security Council Resolution 2331 in
6 2016. This resolution was based on current international law, and included measures to prevent, suppress and
7 punish trafficking of individuals with a focus on victims that are women and children.

8
9 The Ukraine is deeply concerned about the increasing incidence of Human Tracking. There are currently
10 approximately 40.3 million people victimized by modern day slavery today, with 1 in 4 as children. This is a
11 global problem where approximately 500,000 individuals cross international borders each year. Education is the
12 key to the reduction in trafficking numbers. All countries with the highest incidence of human trafficking belong
13 to the U.N., despite Security Council Resolution 2331.

15 The Ukraine calls upon the United Nations to assist in three ways:

- 17 1. Request for the supply of funds through voluntary contributions of the world's countries with the
18 positive GDP after debt considerations according to the current calculations based upon
19 www.worlddebtclock.org .

21 2. The Ukraine requests a voluntary contribution from countries with positive cash flow of .001%. This
22 can result in 1.37 billion to fund the Education Resolution proposed based on current calculations. All
23 countries to provide complete access to determined human trafficking hotspots to support education

3 The General Assembly,

5 Having examined the fact that the Vatican City is exempt from the United Nations, maintaining only observer
6 status, it prevents the country from taking a stand in world matters,

8 Bearing in mind that the Vatican City houses some of the most influential people in the world, providing voting
9 rights for this country would institute a wider scope to world problems,

11 Recalling that the Vatican City is eligible to join the United Nations with voting rights, and preventing the
12 country from doing so would be a direct violation against Article IV of Chapter II of the UN Charter,

14 Further reminds that maintaining Vatican City's non-member status prevents the country from participating in

17 Bearing in mind that the advisory opinion of American delegate to the Security Council Adlai Stevenson, on the
18 magnitude of the UN, and how it should encompass all, not the privileged, Vatican City therefore asks that
19 member nations,

21 1. Call upon the UN Security Council to discuss the voting rights of Vatican City, allowing the country full
22 membership to the UN, eliminating its current observer status.

24 2. Further recommend the addition of the Vatican City to the permanent UN member board, in hopes of
25 bringing new ideology, and new tactics to enforce peace and tranquility to the world.

27 3. Request the UN Security Council and General Assembly to revoke permanent observer status from the
28 Vatican City and replace it with permanent member status.

30 4. Further proclaim the introduction of the Vatican City into the United Nations as an official member
31 nation, effective the date the ruling is passed by the General Assembly, and two-thirds of the Security

A Resolution to Help the Refugee Crisis


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The General Assembly,

Deeply concerned that migration is a huge problem in the world. As of today, 70.8 million people have been forced out of their homeland. There are already safe asylums, but the journey to get to them is what takes a toll on refugees. According to World Vision, The top countries where refugees are fleeing are 6.7 million refugees from Syria, 4 million refugees from Venezuela, 2.7 million refugees from Afghanistan, 2.3 million refugees from South Sudan, 1.1 million refugees from Myanmar.
