Implementation of Sewage Systems and Water Treatment Plants in Kabul

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The General Assembly,

Deeply concerning death rates in Kabul, Afghanistan have led us to further research the cause of each death in the city. Studies show that annually 10,000 kids under the age of five die from sanitation caused by preventable diseases, including diarrhea, cholera, and dysentery.


Convinced, proper placement of sewage pipelines would greatly reduce the death rate in Kabul. This city is the 64th largest in the world, populating at 4.635 million. It has been agreed upon by the UNAMA (United Nations Assistance Mission in Afghanistan) that every person should be allowed the basic human right of clean water.

Having examined all the pros, this resolution would positively affect neighboring cities and the city of Kabul itself. The sewage pipes and dump would come to an estimated cost of 1.604 million. For a water treatment plant it would cost an estimated \$500,000 to one million per 150,000 gallons of water needed.

Keeping in mind, the UNAMA has set aside an annual fee for the country of Afghanistan. Our resolution would require a two percent tax increase. After eight years, the sanitary plan would be completely paid for so the tax would reduce again. An additional donation would come from the UNICEF foundation.

Recognizing, the use of the new sanitation devices in Kabul, many pros have come up. With the process of cleaning up the human waste, the excretions could be donated to multiple farms across the country, all used as manure/fertilizer for their crops. Additionally, this resolution would drastically change the amount of money being spent on hospital bills and stays.

1. Supports the use of a city dump to all residents.
2. Further resolving, 300 square miles of sewage pipelines in Kabul will be inserted.
3. Calls upon the implementation of water treatment plants.
4. Further invites other cities to take part in this resolution
5. Considering the facts, our plan would be carried out January 1, 2019

An Act To Stop LGBTI Discrimination In Armenia

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The General Assembly,

Deeply troubled by the fact that activists reported that lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and intersex (LGBTI) people face discrimination, harassment, and violence in Armenia. The government has not addressed hate speech or discrimination against LGBTI people.


Incredibly upset that LGBTI men in Armenia are trapped under article 116 of The Armenian Penal Code, which states that men in Armenia aren't allowed to have relationships with people of the same sex.

Disappointed with the fact that over 90% of the population of straight people in Armenia are hostile to LGBTI people and want limits on their rights enforced by the government.

Saddened by the fact that as of 2017, it is illegal for same-sex couples to adopt children, no matter what the case of the couple or the child.

Disheartened by the fact that hurtful protests and fist-fights were immediately posed when the GLAG (Gay Lesbian Armenian Group) was created. It then had to be shut down for the safety of the participants.

1. Requests that the UN reaffirms in a public announcement that every human being is born free and equal, and that everyone is entitled to all the rights and freedoms in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, without exception of any person, no matter race, color, sex, religion, political or other opinion, national or social origin, property, birth or other status;
2. Calls upon the UN to appoint an Independent Expert on protection against violence and discrimination based on sexual orientation and gender identity to help LGBTI people find ways of dealing with discrimination and violence;
3. Asks the United Nations to raise awareness of violence and discrimination against persons on the basis of their sexual orientation or gender identity, and to identify and address the root causes of violence and discrimination;
4. Calls upon the government of Armenia to work in cooperation with other tolerant countries in order to implement extra measures that contribute to the protection of all persons against violence and discrimination based on sexual orientation and gender identity;
5. Pleads that Armenia's government, in cooperation with the UN, creates facilities to house children and teens who have been disowned by their parents because of their sexuality.

An Act to Provide Disease Prevention Education in the DRC

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The General Assembly,

According to the Humanitarian Health Action publication in the World Health Organization, 3 million people have died in the DRC in the last 5 years due to Preventable and Treatable diseases. Additionally, an estimated 400 children die every day with nearly half of the deaths from Malaria, and other endemic diseases. Hundreds of people die in the DRC due to diarrheal diseases, such as cholera. These can be prevented with interventions currently available. This is a qualifying reason for action. We plan to provide education and the necessary resources available to solve this major issue.


1. To combat this issue, we will start by providing education on preventative measures such as hand washing and good sanitation. In addition, we will introduce water purifying tools and products like the Pee-Poo© which is a biodegradable toilet. We also seek funding for disinfectants, insect sprays, mosquito nets and food covers. We will work with volunteers from UNICEF® to teach our citizens how to use these products.
2. Regarding finances, funding will come from our valuable natural resources estimated at 21 trillion United States dollars. Additionally, we plan to partner resources from several other countries at an estimated cost of 1 to 5 million dollars.
3. Should the resolution pass, quality of life will improve for millions of Congolese, thereby extending the life expectancy. Without these, the living condition for the citizens could worsen as each second, hour, day and week passes by. Provision of a Variety of Illegal Narcotic Treatments

5 Alarmed by the drug epidemic that has arisen in Estonia, Russia, New Zealand, Mexico, and other countries around
6 the world as well as the lack of proper treatment for people suffering from the effects of drug addiction,

8 Recalling that the use of illegal narcotics poses a great threat to humanity of all races and ethnicities around the
9 world, as declared in resolutions 44/16, 34/173, 72/197, and 52/92,

11 Recognizing that 20% of the 1,306,788 people who have inhabited Estonia have partaken in the use of illegal

15 Emphasizing the abundance of amphetamines among illegal narcotic users, without having a reliable treatment plan
16 for this drug, only having needle and syringe programs open to the public along with take-home naloxone programs,

19 Affairs. While almost half of the budget is set aside for opioid substitution treatment, the remaining funds are divided

23 resources for the treatment of amphetamines, and have no way to get reliable treatments for their illegal narcotic

27 programs, take-home naloxone programs, drug consumption rooms, and heroin-assisted treatment,

30 Zealanders, Russians, and Mexicans as well as other countries all across the world, funded by the Ministry of Social
31 Affairs (of all countries), by dividing funds evenly among the various treatment plans,

Ensuring the Protection of UNESCO World Heritage Sites

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The General Assembly,

Believing that World Heritage Sites and potential World Heritage Sites are imperative to the education of world citizens and continuing the traditions, culture, and heritage of various places and people around the world. The United Nations Educational Scientific, and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) was started in 1945 to see this goal achieved.


Deeply concerned that many of the World’s Heritage Sites are not adequately protected and are in danger of being gone forever, such as the Mayan city of Copan and the Rio Platano Biosphere Reserve in Honduras, and other sites around the world such as those in Latin America, Africa, and Asia. Many sites are already nearly destroyed due to wars in Syria, Yemen, and Afghanistan.

Bearing in mind that the UNESCO World Heritage Sites provide a criteria for sites to be added to the list of protected sites and a criteria for their protection, yet many of these criteria for protection are being ignored.

Recalling that one of the goals of UNESCO is that every world citizen may grow and live in a cultural environment rich in diversity and dialogue, where heritage serves as a bridge between generations and peoples.

Calls on the United Nations to follow up on, and help protect the sites they have listed as endangered.

1. Requests a multinational team of advisers be sent to assess the UNESCO World Heritage Sites that are safe to visit and determine the quality of protection and maintenance they are receiving.
2. Further recommends, when the site does not meet the criteria, the United Nations will give them an allotted amount of time to fix the problems occurring. If then they do not make any effort to fix these problems, the United Nations will then cut off certain funds such as military aid they provide to their country.
3. Emphasizes that tourism money generated from these sites will bring positive economic opportunities to the region. Copan in Honduras generates 120,000 visitors a year. If the site is managed even better, then more tourists will visit, bringing in more economic dollars. If the site is destroyed or severely damaged, tourist visits will drop dramatically, severely affecting the economic situation of the region.

6. Notifies the public within the area about the reported gang violence, as to make the citizens in the area aware of the potential danger.

Gender Equality in Pakistan and Other Islamic Countries

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The General Assembly,

Given Article 2 of the United Nations (UN) Universal Declaration of Human Rights, natural rights and freedoms cannot be based on race, sex, language, religion, political, or other opinion. Every human is born with and deserving of these regardless of the above factors,


Alarmed by the fact that in Pakistan and other Islamic countries there is a high rate of domestic violence, and the laws put in place relating to women’s rights are not being enforced,

Emphasizing that around 90% of women in Pakistan have been involved in domestic violence at one point in their life (<https://www.theatlantic.com>), the UN needs to raise the consequences for mistreatment of women. This includes honor killings, abuse, and rights,

Observing the rehabilitation programs, there must be changes to the state of mind. Looking at the costs of this project, there will be no fee on the rehabilitation program. This is because prison staffs have a current prison counselor that will be trained to teach about domestic violence. Their schedule will be modified to fit the needs of the program. Something needs to be done about the already affected women. Whether they are scarred physically or emotionally. There needs to be a women’s center put in place out of the infrastructure budget. According to www.dawn.com, other projects under infrastructure are given 44 billion dollars and a women’s center needs to be top priority. This will be directed by certified counselors, and volunteers and doctors on hand,

Resolving this issue by enforcing harsher punishments and helpful programs will make a strong decrease on the domestic violence and discrimination activity. This will change cultural ways for the better leaving the violence and lack of equality behind.

1. All of these actions against women are inhumane and it is crucial that they be stopped. We propose life imprisonment for multiple murders (more than 1), 25 years in prison for murder of one person, 15 years for abuse, and 9 months for public discrimination. These consequences will vary on past record, and level of violence. Also, all of these actions’ ramifications excluding the life imprisonment will require rehabilitation during jail time,
2. People will be put through classes and activities that show how sexual harassment and morals against the natural rights of women are not socially acceptable.
3. We request UN support through financial or personnel means to train the police of Pakistan and other Islamic countries similarly to the fugitives. This will also help control the bias when it comes to arrests and anything involving domestic violence,

1 A Resolution to Implement a Typhoon Evacuation System for all Island Residents

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The General Assembly,

Deeply concerned that Filipinos are the second most prone to typhoons in the world and there are 103.3 million people in the Philippines,

Residents need a more efficient public evacuation system to safely get everyone to a nearby country until the storm blows over therefore avoiding deaths,


Recognizing that about 2,000 to 6,000 citizens die each time a typhoon strikes,

Approximately 15 typhoons occur each year, a number that is growing,

Bearing in mind that the existing system of signals warns people up to 36 hours before the storm touches down and intensifies as the storm gets closer,

Noting the system of signals is sufficient to warn people, it does not ensure safe evacuation for citizens,

1. Calls upon the funding from United Nations Office for Disaster Risk Reduction (UNISDR) to rent more container ships and have additional forms of transportation for evacuation;
2. Requests that container ships that the country already owns be utilized to carry large numbers of people to nearby countries at the speed of 26.5 mph;
3. The affected population can travel to safety where they can be protected from the typhoon and return to their homes as soon as the storm is over.

Resolution to Acknowledge Bullfighting as Animal Cruelty, and Ban it as a Sporting Event

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The General Assembly,

Deeply concerned that the practice of bullfighting is still legally permitted as a spectator event,

Convinced that bullfighting is a true form of animal cruelty,


Noting further, that according to the International Organization for Animal Protection (OIPA), over half of Portugal's population views bullfighting as animal cruelty and would support laws banning it,

Observing that some Spanish and Portuguese provinces have moved to ban bullfighting, these bans have been overturned by the countries' government which deemed them a 'cultural asset',


Recalling that for the past 13 years, the World Society for the Protection of Animals (WSPA) has been lobbying for a UN Declaration on Animal Welfare (UDAW). To date they have not been successful in achieving this aim,

Determined to stop the public mutilation and later slaughtering of bulls, for public sport,

1. Calls upon the United Nations to start negotiations with Portuguese government officials in order to reach an agreement to discontinue bullfighting as a spectator sport;
2. Condemn the act of bullfighting by imposing significant fines and strict punishment for those in charge of, involved in, or supporting this cruelty, regardless of traditional and cultural background/relevance.

2. Requests the equal access to training courses and elementary education for young Gypsies to better prepare them to enter the workforce, ensuring that 75% of school-age Gypsies are enrolled in school in the next three years;
3. Further requests for nations to provide clean water to Gypsies living on the outskirts of their societies, having sand water filters in place in the next three years.

- 19 the world, many consumers in other countries will be affected from the pesticides within the goods;

- 12 nurses per 10,000 Zimbabwean citizens,

- 14 Confident that establishing a healthcare training program and updating medical technology in Zimbabwe would
- 15 greatly benefit the healthcare system in Zimbabwe, therefore ameliorating the healthcare crisis,

- 17 1. Calls upon the UN and the World Health Organization to provide funding for medical supplies and
- 18 improved healthcare technology in five existing Zimbabwe healthcare settings,

- 20 2. Calls upon countries in the UN to provide volunteering doctors and medical professors to educate
