An act to reduce water pollution through advancements in technology.

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The General Assembly,

An advance to in technology that allows for reducing water pollution in seabins. The V5 Seabin unit is a floating debris interception device designed to be installed in marinas, Yacht Clubs, ports, etc. The Seabin can catch an estimated 1.5 Kgs. of floating debris per day (depending on weather and volume of debris). This includes micro plastics as small as 2mm. The catch bag can hold up to 20 Kgs of debris and should be checked twice daily and emptied as needed. The Seabin needs to be cleaned on a yearly basis. This will be completed by the country in which it is located. The Seabin is installed in a specific "Debris Problem Area" on a floating dock. This strategic positioning enables the wind and the currents to push the debris directly to the Seabin.

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 Establish Seabins in every first word country with a port. The number of Seabins will based on the number of ports and docks the country has. As of 2017, there were over twenty establised Seabins. This number needs to increase in order to effectively reduce water pollution.

A Request for the United Nations to Commission a Team of Agricultural Researchers for the Widespread Modernization of the World's Agrarian Economy

The General Assembly,

Observing that Chinese agriculture, especially in its vast rural areas, is well below its potential because China currently imports very few genetically modified products and currently utilizes farming techniques that are centuries old,

Conscious of the unfounded stigma around genetically modified agricultural products,

Alarmed by the fact that China only approved the import of one single biotech product as of 2016, a Bayer CropScience Ltd soybean,

Convinced that betterment of Chinese agriculture would not only help China, but surrounding countries as well because China currently produces 20% of the world's food and this percentage could be increased exponentially with the integration of crops modified for optimal productivity in specific climates, soils, and other agricultural factors,

- 1. Calls upon this assembly to commission a research team to survey and develop genetically modified crops for specific local environments in China and other countries;
- 2. Requests the research team to be multinational to stabilize credibility and expertise;
- 3. Encourages that access to these advanced products be first given to China's commercial farms to be gradually be integrated into China's informal agrarian market;
- 4. Approves of the UN to direct the research team towards beneficial projects after the modernization of China.

A Proposal to Ensure Sustainable Food Resources

The General Assembly,

In 2017, nearly 815 million people were reported to be in states of hunger, according to the WHO.155 million children aged under five are stunted, meaning they are below expected levels of growth. This is an increase of 38 million from 2016. These trends are a consequence not only of conflict and change but also of sweeping changes in dietary habits as well as economic slowdowns.

The largest cause of starvation is the lack of arable land. This forces nations with largely infertile lands to import goods. Most of these nations are either landlocked or are currently placed under sanctions, both of which prohibit the trade of food, among other things. The rate of growth in population is especially great in nations with low values on the Human Development Index (HDI), such as in starving nations, where food is needed the most.

The preamble to the United Nations Charter states as one of its core missions: "to reaffirm faith in fundamental human rights, in the dignity and worth of the human person, in the equal rights of men and women and of nations large and small..." Food is one of the most basic human necessities, and the prohibition of this necessity due to politics is unethical in the least. It is also concerning that a nation could have a large amount of obesity while the nations to which they prohibit food are in starvation. Also, due to concern about government's not properly distributing the food, the UN will send a member of IFAD twice a year, to make sure the people are being are fed.

- 1. This proposal urges nations to ameliorate the damages from sanctions on the supply of food in developing nations.
- 2. Members of the United Nations can help end the prohibition of food transfer by:
- 3. Contributing more aid to the International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD) and similar UN-sponsored organizations
- 4. Agreeing to bypass sanctions in the realm of food transfer
- 5. Applying any available education resources to assist in the training of sustainable agricultural practices.
- 6. This resolution will not require monetary aid from any nation. This proposal will take effect immediately after ratification.

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To Solve The Sexual Violence Towards Women

The General Assembly,

According to a report of the UN High Commission for Human Rights, sexual violence remains extremely serious due to the pain they have caused the number of victims. Human Rights Watch talks about 'horrific levels of rape' and other forms of sexual violence, used by all armed groups, such as the military. The victims of the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC), majority being women (73%) and children (25%), endure rapes often associated with other abominations.

Recalling that donors and development agencies (like the Times Up Foundation) funds many projects providing medical assistance and psychological support to victims. They will help us buy the rape alarms in U.S. dollars, and ship them to Congo. However, we want the Times Up Foundation to fund us to buy rape alarms to protect the well-being of DRC citizens, male or female, child or adult.

Convinced that the DRC government has been unable to respond to sexual violence,

Reaffirming personal rape alarms would be a step towards helping men and women feeling more in their towns. Rape and other forms of sexual violence have been used as tools to win and maintain authority over civilians in territories occupied by rebel groups, or even the military,

Bearing at the DRC security sector must be changed due to its involvement in sexual violence due to its involvement in persistent sexual violence towards innocent civilians. Adding an alarm (a small item that one can attach to clothing or any accessory) would be a broad approach targeting points is needed for reducing these crimes and sustaining peace,

1. Calls upon all women to contribute in Time's Up Legal Defense Fund to provide legal support to women and men who have experienced sexual harassment for their own benefit.

2. Encourages all citizens to donate to the Times Up Foundation, and to listen carefully for the alarms.

Restoration of Human Rights in Egyptian Prisons

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The General Assembly,

Guided by the Declaration of Human Rights article 1, 3, 5, 9, 19, and 20; Egyptian's laws and prison system deny humans of their basic rights.

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Deeply concerned about the degradation of human rights in Egypt: People can be held indefinitely through Egyptian's pretrial detention law. Prisoners being held are denied security of person and are subject to degrading treatment such as torture.

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Conscious the Egyptian government has undergone steps to analyze prisons' ability to host inmates

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- 1. Calls upon the Egyptian government to improve their prison and law violations of human rights.
- 2. Requests the pretrial detention law to be changed to prevent indefinite detention, to allow alternatives such as parole, and only be used in severe crimes.

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3. Further requests prisons to be altered to provide a safe and reasonable living situation. This will be accomplished through stricter guard regulations, less crowded living arrangements, and accessible medical assistance.

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4. Notes the actions should take place on June 1, 2019

Recognizing the World Health Organization's definition of Transplant Tourism as a patient travelling across a national border to be transplanted elsewhere,

Taking note the most common countries traveled to for transportation are the Philippines, India, Pakistan, and Iran,

Noting further 5 to 10% of kidney transplants around the world come from commercial living donors,

Deeply concerned that various studies have reported complications for donor recipients who participate in transplant tourism, including increased risk of viral infections such as HIV and hepatitis, fungal infections, surgical complications, and organ rejection,

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Alarmed by study results which show dramatic effects on organ donors including high mortality and morbidity rates, lack of compensation, decline in family income, increased poverty levels, deterioration of donor health, and psychosocial effects including isolation and regret,

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Believing that without regulation travel for transplantation will result in the commercialization of organ trafficking and lead to local population being deprived of equitable services,

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- 1. Urges member states to develop medical legislation that guarantees both short term and long term health care for both donors and recipients including physical and psychosocial services,
- Encourages countries to develop programs to become self-sufficient in organ donation needs and to guarantee the country's population is being adequately served before foreign patients,
- 3. Takes note that countries could increase their ability for self-sufficiency by utilizing organs from deceased donors through an opt-out program based on the assumption that all citizens will be organ donors, if viable at the time of death, unless they could to opt out of the donation process,
- 4. Emphasizes countries participating in travel for transplantation should develop system of transparency in all transplant programs and develop national registry of deceased and living organ donations,
- 5. Calls upon the World Health Organization to develop an international standard of informed consent that details all possible complications, long term care, and psychological evaluations for donors,
- Further requests member states ban all advertising which promotes the sale of organs and develop public education programs which informs prospective donors of the risks and long terms effect of organ donation.

Alarmed by the targeted religious minority groups in Iraq that are systematically being killed, tortured, and raped forcing them from their homeland. The United Nations, along with the leadership of Iraq, are struggling to find a solution.

Conscious that Articles 2, 3, 4, and 5 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights are being violated,

Observing that, for the past three years, humanitarian aid has bypassed the Christians and shortchanged the Yazidis. The Chaldean Archdiocese of Erbil, which is the sole guarantor of care for most Christian survivors of ISIS genocide, has received zero of 1.4 billion of the US Humanitarian aid,

Deeply concerned that these religious and ethnic minorities are at risk of soon becoming extinct in Iraq.

Alarmed by the fact that In 2015, ISIS was believed to be holding people as slaves and many of those being held as slaves, are still in danger.

Emphasizing that as of August of 2017, the Iraqi Foreign Minister Ibrahim al-Jaafari asked the UN Secretary for a resolution to the enslavement of their people.

Determined to ensure the safety for these minority groups, we call upon the United Nations to the following:

- 1. The United Nations, along with United Nations High Commission for Refugees, and the Iraqi Christian Relief Council will partner in funding and create a program that will lead to safety for minority groups in Iraq.
- This program will be overseen by an Ambassador for Religious Freedom that will be enabled upon the passage of
 this Resolution, with the authority to implement actions to protect and secure these targeted populations. The
 ambassador will also be responsible for deciding the amount of money sent directly to minority groups.

Permitting the Demilitarization of the South China Sea

The General Assembly,

Conscious that the South China Sea is one of Southern Asia's most important trade waterways,

Fully aware that the country of China has recently laid claim to this disputed body of water, as has the United States,

Having considered that other countries, such as Japan, India, Malaysia, and Australia all rely on the South China Sea to stimulate their economies,

Recalling that in the 1982 adoption of the Law of the Sea Convention by the U.N. established the following regarding ocean usage and sovereignty: Freedom of navigational rights, Set territorial sea boundaries 12 miles offshore, Set exclusive economic zones up to 200 miles offshore

Concerned that app China has violated this charter by laying territorial claim to the entire South China Sea, rather than its customary 12 miles

Recognizing the United Nations' power in this situation, we propose the neutralization of the South China Sea.

Requests that all military presence with the exception of U.N.-led coalitions be prohibited outside any country's territorial miles.

Emphasizes that if this neutralization doesn't occur, Australia, the United States, China, and India may deploy their own naval forces, creating the threats of both war and trade stagnation.

Expresses its hope that this encourages trade and unity among countries, rather than war.

- 1. China has been competing with Vietnam, the Philippines, Taiwan, Malaysia, and Brunei over the past few years on who should have the rights to the sea.
- 2. Aside from the nation of Japan, countries such as The United States, India, and Australia are unhappy with this claim as this waterway plays a big role to their economies. The U.S. in recent times has sent naval forces to the sea to combat the presence of Chinese ships. Both countries see the other as "militarizing" the South China Sea when it has been stated by many that it should facilitate trade and act as a resource.
- 3. As a peace enactment, we suggest to the U.N to neutralize this sea thus making it international waters. This demilitarizes the waterway and allows more trade to take place. This also allows the waterway to remain open without tarnishing the trade agreement between China and these nations. As representatives of Japan, this neutralizing act will allow us to trade more freely and to acquire better ties with one of our neighboring nations.
- 4. If this waterway we to be made international waters, it would greatly benefit Japan as 4/5 of their main trade partners (South Korea, Thailand, Hong Kong, and China) are accessed via the South China Sea. If this neutralization does not occur, the nations of Japan, India, The U.S. and Australia will all be take their own action and place a naval presence in the South China Sea.

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A Resolution to Establish Refugee Work Sites with Shelters

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The General Assembly,

Bearing in mind the advisory opinion of UN resolution 319 A (IV) titled: Refugees and stateless persons (1949) and guided by The Vision of Migration and Refugee Assistance Act (1962), on the importance of resolving the integration of refugees issues and labeling it as "a humanitarian crises," we hereby propose a resolution for refugee work sites with shelters in order to enforce refugee registration and encourage establishment.

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Alarmed by the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) Jordan Factsheet of June 2017, "Jordan hosts the second highest number (89) of refugees per 1,000 inhabitants in the world," with more than 93 percent of those Syrian refugees living under the poverty line.

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 Proclaims that UNHCR and its sister organizations shall direct their funding to commence refugee work sites with shelters. This allows every person who's listed as refugee according to U.S. Citizens and Immigration Services (USCIS) guidelines, to be placed, after registration, in a safe, secure environment that will help them through establishment.

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2. Calls upon the UN that the refugees housed in these facilities are able to settle in an environment staffed by physicians from the non-profit, volunteer based Organizations, including the UNHCR, United Nations Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA), and United Nations Programme on HIV/AIDS (UNAIDS).

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3. Further requests that the centers provide refugee individuals and families proper housing and nutrition, until approved establishment by United Nations Research Institute for Social Development (UNRISD), while being protected by locals who will be trained by UN Peacekeepers in order to maintain security of the facility.

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4. Note that the estimated cost to build each shelter will be approximately \$380,000 and the annual cost to maintain and staff each shelter will be approximately \$260,000.
