- 1 An act to reduce water pollution through advancements in technology.
2
3 The General Assembly,
4
5 An advance to in technology that allows for reducing water pollution in seabins. The V5 Seabin unit is a
6 floating debris interception device designed to be installed in marinas, Yacht Clubs, ports, etc. The Seabin can
7 catch an estimated 1.5 Kgs. of floating debris per day (depending on weather and volume of debris). This
8 includes micro plastics as small as 2mm. The catch bag can hold up to 20 Kgs of debris and should be checked
9 twice daily and emptied as needed. The Seabin needs to be cleaned on a yearly basis. This will be completed by
10 the country in which it is located. The Seabin is installed in a specific "Debris Problem Area" on a floating dock.
11 This strategic positioning enables the wind and the currents to push the debris directly to the Seabin.
12
13 1. Establish Seabins in every first world country with a port. The number of Seabins will be based on the
14 number of ports and docks the country has. As of 2017, there were over twenty established Seabins.
15 This number needs to increase in order to effectively reduce water pollution.
16
17 2. Each country will need to maintain their Seabins and meet the needs of the system. If the Seabins are
18 not properly being cared for, educators will reemphasize the care that is needed.
19
20 3. The United Nations will realize that the real purpose of the Seabins is education. People across the
21 globe need to be educated about this simple solution: Seabins will stop marine litter.
22
23 4. This will be put into effect by December 31, 2019.

1 A Proposal to Ensure Sustainable Food Resources


2
3 The General Assembly,

4
5 In 2017, nearly 815 million people were reported to be in states of hunger, according to the WHO. 155 million
6 children aged under five are stunted, meaning they are below expected levels of growth. This is an increase of
7 38 million from 2016. These trends are a consequence not only of conflict and change but also of sweeping
8 changes in dietary habits as well as economic slowdowns.

9
10 The largest cause of starvation is the lack of arable land. This forces nations with largely infertile lands to
11 import goods. Most of these nations are either landlocked or are currently placed under sanctions, both of
12 which prohibit the trade of food, among other things. The rate of growth in population is especially great in
13 nations with low values on the Human Development Index (HDI), such as in starving nations, where food is
14 needed the most.

15
16 The preamble to the United Nations Charter states as one of its core missions: "to reaffirm faith in fundamental
17 human rights, in the dignity and worth of the human person, in the equal rights of men and women and of
18 nations large and small..." Food is one of the most basic human necessities, and the prohibition of this necessity
19 due to politics is unethical in the least. It is also concerning that a nation could have a large amount of obesity
20 while the nations to which they prohibit food are in starvation. Also, due to concern about government's not
21 properly distributing the food, the UN will send a member of IFAD twice a year, to make sure the people are
22 being are fed.

- 23
24 1. This proposal urges nations to ameliorate the damages from sanctions on the supply of food in
25 developing nations.
26
27 2. Members of the United Nations can help end the prohibition of food transfer by:
28
29 3. Contributing more aid to the International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD) and similar UN-
30 sponsored organizations
31
32 4. Agreeing to bypass sanctions in the realm of food transfer
33
34 5. Applying any available education resources to assist in the training of sustainable agricultural practices.
35
36 6. This resolution will not require monetary aid from any nation. This proposal will take effect immediately
37 after ratification.

The General Assembly,

According to a report of the UN High Commission for Human Rights, sexual violence remains extremely serious due to the pain they have caused the number of victims. Human Rights Watch talks about 'horrific levels of rape' and other forms of sexual violence, used by all armed groups, such as the military. The victims of the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC), majority being women (73%) and children (25%), endure rapes often associated with other abominations.


Recalling that donors and development agencies (like the Times Up Foundation) funds many projects providing medical assistance and psychological support to victims. They will help us buy the rape alarms in U.S. dollars, and ship them to Congo. However, we want the Times Up Foundation to fund us to buy rape alarms to protect the well-being of DRC citizens, male or female, child or adult.

Convinced that the DRC government has been unable to respond to sexual violence,

Reaffirming personal rape alarms would be a step towards helping men and women feeling more in their towns. Rape and other forms of sexual violence have been used as tools to win and maintain authority over civilians in territories occupied by rebel groups, or even the military,

Bearing at the DRC security sector must be changed due to its involvement in sexual violence due to its involvement in persistent sexual violence towards innocent civilians. Adding an alarm (a small item that one can attach to clothing or any accessory) would be a broad approach targeting points is needed for reducing these crimes and sustaining peace,

1. Calls upon all women to contribute in Time's Up Legal Defense Fund to provide legal support to women and men who have experienced sexual harassment for their own benefit.
2. Encourages all citizens to donate to the Times Up Foundation, and to listen carefully for the alarms.

16 such as parole, and only be used in severe crimes.

- 18 3. Further requests prisons to be altered to provide a safe and reasonable living situation. This will be
19 accomplished through stricter guard regulations, less crowded living arrangements, and accessible
20 medical assistance.

- 22 4. Notes the actions should take place on June 1, 2019

- 24 5. Recommends the UN should oversee, enforce, and aid the Egyptian government in following these
25 guidelines

Bearing in mind the advisory opinion of UN resolution 319 A (IV) titled: Refugees and stateless persons (1949) and guided by The Vision of Migration and Refugee Assistance Act (1962), on the importance of resolving the integration of refugees issues and labeling it as “a humanitarian crises,” we hereby propose a resolution for refugee work sites with shelters in order to enforce refugee registration and encourage establishment.

Alarmed by the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) Jordan Factsheet of June 2017, “Jordan hosts the second highest number (89) of refugees per 1,000 inhabitants in the world,” with more than 93 percent of those Syrian refugees living under the poverty line.

1. Proclaims that UNHCR and its sister organizations shall direct their funding to commence refugee work sites with shelters. This allows every person who’s listed as refugee according to U.S. Citizens and Immigration Services (USCIS) guidelines, to be placed, after registration, in a safe, secure environment that will help them through establishment.
2. Calls upon the UN that the refugees housed in these facilities are able to settle in an environment staffed by physicians from the non-profit, volunteer based Organizations, including the UNHCR , United Nations Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) , and United Nations Programme on HIV/AIDS (UNAIDS).
3. Further requests that the centers provide refugee individuals and families proper housing and nutrition, until approved establishment by United Nations Research Institute for Social Development (UNRISD), while being protected by locals who will be trained by UN Peacekeepers in order to maintain security of the facility.
4. Note that the estimated cost to build each shelter will be approximately \$380,000 and the annual cost to maintain and staff each shelter will be approximately \$260,000.

- 6 global energy crisis, increasing rate of inflation, and scarcity of access to basic necessities,
- 7
- 8 Emphasizing that 82% of Venezuelans live in poverty,
- 9
- 10 Highlighting the sanctions placed upon Venezuela by the European Union and the United States,
- 11
- 12 Pointing out that these sanctions have had a dramatic toll upon Venezuela’s already weak economy and caused
- 13 many needless deaths,
- 14
- 15 Reaffirming that every human has the right to adequate health and living conditions, “through international
- 16 cooperation”, as declared in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights,
- 17
- 18 1. Venezuela requests that the United Nations mediate the negotiations between Venezuela, the United
- 19 States, and the European Union.
- 20
- 21 2. Venezuela declares the intention to revoke the ban on international humanitarian aid in return for the
- 22 cessation of the economic and political sanctions against the Venezuelan government and leaders.
- 23
- 24 3. Upon the removal of said sanctions, the Venezuelan government will permit the entrance of non-profit
- 25 and foreign aid across the border, allowing public access to fundamental necessities such as food and
- 26 medicines.
- 27
- 28 4. Venezuela pledges to allow citizens to receive foreign aid for the duration of time that international
- 29 sanctions and embargoes are lifted.

15 Draw the attention of the General Assembly that there is no better solution than one in which all nations are

18 1. Call upon the General Assembly and the United Nations Convention on Climate Change to offer
19 economic assistance and support in order to restructure the economy towards sustainable development
20 and to create a climate favorable for businesses to invest in green growth, in accordance with U.N.
