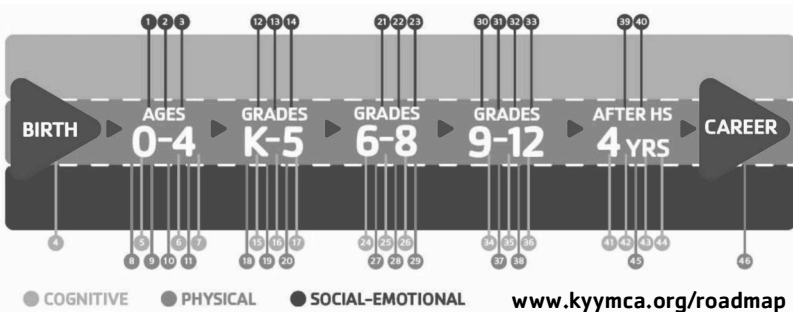

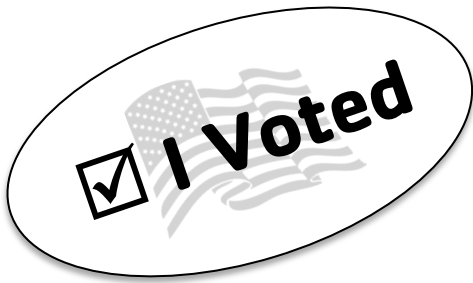

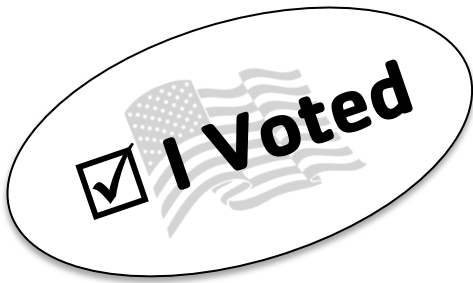

**CONFERENCE STUDENT CODE OF CONDUCT AND DRESS CODE**

The purpose of this Code of Conduct is to identify personal behavior that is consistent with the purpose and objectives of the Kentucky YMCA Youth Association. The items within the Code are designed to protect the welfare of the program for current participants and future generations. A participant's personal behavior reflects upon one's self, one's Student YMCA, and the Kentucky YMCA. Registration in any Kentucky YMCA conference program indicates personal acceptance of the Code of Conduct. Any student sent home for violation of this Code will be at the expense of parent or guardian.

**EXPECTATIONS OF PARTICIPANTS**

1. Each delegate shall conduct himself/herself in an orderly and responsible manner before, during, and after all functions of the Kentucky YMCA conference programs.
2. All participants share the responsibility for their actions equally when violations of the Code are witnessed. Those who choose to be present when a violation occurs and do not immediately act to remedy and report the violation shall, by their own choice, be considered participants in the violation. In relation to this Code, there are no "innocent bystanders."
3. No delegate shall leave a Kentucky YMCA function unless the approval of his/her advisor AND the director of the program is secured. The delegate must be picked up and returned by a parent or legal guardian who must take responsibility for the delegate in writing.
4. Each delegate is legally and financially liable for the removal, defacing, or willful damage to public or private property. Any act of vandalism, destruction of property, or misuse of a facility may be a crime and will be treated as a potential criminal violation.
5. Food (including gum and candy) and beverages other than water (including those sold by the hotel) are not permitted in any meeting sessions.
6. Cell phones, music players, or other wireless communications devices are not to be used during any meeting session.
7. The use of tobacco products, burning of incense, possession of alcoholic beverages, and the use of legal or illegal drugs not in accordance with a prescription is forbidden at any Kentucky YMCA function.
8. Youth delegates may not enter rooms other than those assigned by the Y-Staff or advisor.
9. Physical intimacy between participants of any gender is inappropriate at all times while at Kentucky YMCA Youth Association Programs and is prohibited.
10. All delegates shall be in and remain in their assigned rooms by scheduled curfew and doors shall remain closed until scheduled end of curfew.
11. Badges shall be worn ONLY by the individual whose name is on the badge. Badge switching or sharing is strictly prohibited. Participants will wear their assigned badges at all times when they are not in their sleeping rooms, and must be visible at all times. Badges are to be worn around the neck and are not to be defaced, decorated, or altered in any way. There may be a charge for replacement badges.
12. Unless there is a fire, participants will not pull the fire alarm. Pulling a fire alarm is a serious offense, and any participant who does so will be held financially and potentially criminally liable. Hotel alarms automatically summon the fire department and create a great inconvenience and fear for the hotel and other guests.
13. Use of personal vehicles by students during Kentucky YMCA conferences is strictly prohibited.
14. Weapons of any kind and items that could cause injury or damage to participants and/or property are strictly forbidden.

**VIOLATION OF EXPECTATIONS**

All violations of this code of conduct are to be brought to the attention of the Y-Staff. Participants found to be in violation of the above expectations will be subject to disciplinary actions at the discretion of advisors and the Y-Staff including but not limited to: calls to parents/guardians; incident report filed; participant sent home; school policies implemented. At all times the Y-Staff reserves the right to alter disciplinary actions at their discretion.

**ROOMING POLICY**

I understand that conference delegates are typically housed four (4) to each room and that in order to participate in this program; I must share a room and bed with at least one other student of the same sex from my delegation. I may be roomed with students of the same sex from another delegation, in which case I will not share a bed with a person from another delegation. I further understand that I may not room with anyone other than YMCA conference delegates

-- not an advisor, parents, or other relatives -- without expressed notarized\* parental consent (\*notarization only required if student rooms with adult other than parent/legal guardian), and permission of Executive Director of the Kentucky YMCA. I also understand that I may not room alone.

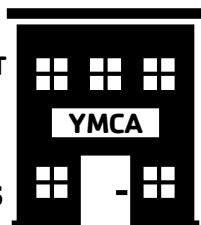

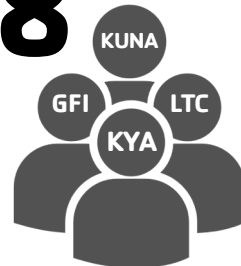

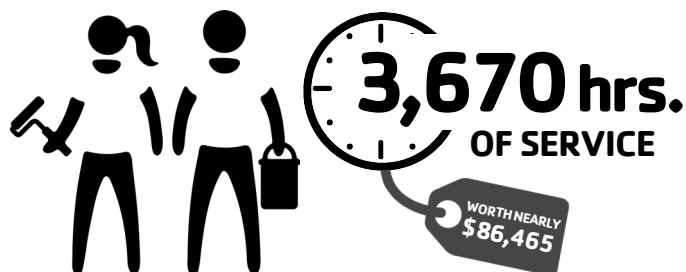

# Family Dollar, et al v. Baytos

This year's case is *Family Dollar v Baytos*, a workers' compensation case. Workers' compensation is a unique area of the law. When a worker gets injured on the job, he or she is entitled to compensation to cover their medical care, their lost wages, and the loss of any future earning capacity. Because there are many on-the-job injuries every day, there is a special statutory scheme (or, set of laws) for the court system to handle these cases. In other words, workers' compensation cases go to a special "mini court system" so that they do not clog up Kentucky's district and circuit courts. The judges in the workers' compensation system handle only workers' compensation claims, and are specialists in this unique area of law.

A workers' compensation claim is a case where a person alleges they were injured as a result of their job duties, and are asking their employer for compensation for the injury. The types of claims vary greatly, from workers involved in accidents at work, to workers who contract diseases as a result of the work environment, such as black lung. Workers' compensation claims do not go through the normal tiered court system. Instead, the case is initially heard before an Administrative Law Judge (ALJ). If one of the parties wants to appeal the decision of the Administrative Law Judge, that party appeals to the Workers' Compensation Board. If a party is still displeased with the ruling, the case then can be appealed to the Kentucky Court of Appeals, and on to the Kentucky Supreme Court. The Kentucky Supreme Court is the final word in all Workers' Compensation matters.

Stephen Baytos suffered a serious injury while working as a manager at Family Dollar. He was lifting boxes, and felt chest pain, which was ultimately determined to be a torn thoracic aorta. He filed a workers' compensation claim, asking for Family Dollar to pay for his medical care, and for his lost wages. The ALJ first determined that the injury was, in fact, actually caused by his work activities. After it was determined that Family Dollar is liable for Baytos' injuries, Family Dollar tried to settle with Baytos as to the amount of compensation he would receive. Baytos agreed, and a settlement agreement was executed.

Sadly, Mr. Baytos died several years later as a result of the torn thoracic aorta. Normally, when a worker dies as a result of their job duties (for example, a fatal on-the-job accident), his or her dependents are entitled to receive compensation for their death. Therefore, Mr. Baytos' widow, Mamie Baytos, filed a motion to reopen his workers' compensation claim, and she asked for compensation for his death. Family Dollar objected, arguing that Mr. Baytos had settled the claim and it could not be reopened.

The ALJ agreed with Mamie, and awarded her compensation for her husband's death. Family Dollar appealed, and the Workers' Compensation Board reversed the decision. The Board reasoned that the settlement agreement was final, and Mr. Baytos had waived his right to ever reopen the claim. This waiver was binding on his dependents. Mamie appealed, and was successful before the Court of Appeals.

In this case, there is no dispute as to any material fact. Both sides agree as to all the relevant facts (that Mr. Baytos suffered a torn thoracic aorta, that he knowingly entered into the settlement agreement, and that he later died as a result of the injury). The only question before the court is whether Mrs. Baytos is entitled to reopen a claim that her husband settled before his death.

The main issue to address is whether Mrs. Baytos is entitled to reopen the claim even though her husband entered into a final settlement agreement before his death. Another way to think about the issue is: Even if Mr. Baytos settled *his* claims, is he entitled or capable of waiving *his wife's* rights to compensation?

The **Appellants**, Family Dollar, will argue that the settlement is final. It should emphasize that it is in the interest of public policy for settlement agreements to be final and not subject to endless litigation.

The **Appellee**, Mamie Baytos, will argue she has a right to compensation separate from her husband. Even if her husband received compensation for his *injury*, she is still entitled to compensation for his *death*.

Students might also consider the following questions in formulating their arguments:

- Are the rights of an injured worker different from the rights of the workers' family, or do the families' rights depend on the workers' rights?
- What exactly did Mr. Baytos agree to in the settlement agreement?
- Why is it important to Family Dollar, and other companies, to settle workers' compensation claims? What is Family Dollar's interest in having a "final" judgment?
- In creating the workers' compensation system, did the General Assembly promote the settling of claims through settlement agreements?

**BE A BETTER DEBATER!!!**  
**READ THESE HELPFUL HINTS AND TIPS:**

- **ALWAYS ADDRESS THE CHAIR!** “Harry Potter, Hogwarts Gryffindor, Sir/Madam Chair.”
- **TECHNICAL QUESTIONS**
  - READ the bill before you decide on your question. DON’T ask questions that are already in the bill. For example, “When will this bill go into effect?” and “How much will this bill cost?” are usually answered in the Body of the Bill.
  - Don’t ask questions that begin with “WHY...?” Those are almost always debatable.
- **WHAT YOU MAY DO DURING PRO/CON DEBATE**
  - Each time you are recognized, you may do ONE or TWO of the following things:
    - Ask the sponsor(s) a *technical* question about the bill
    - Ask the sponsor(s) a *debatable* questions about the bill
    - Give a speech for or against the bill
    - Yield your remaining time to another delegate
  - If you would like to ASK A QUESTION (or a series of 2 questions), when you are recognized, say, **“Will the sponsor(s) yield to a question (or ‘series of questions’)?”**
  - If you would like to SPEAK OR YIELD YOUR TIME AFTER ASKING A QUESTION, you should also say, “And I reserve my right to speak (or ‘yield my time’) afterward.”
  - If you would like to YIELD YOUR TIME AFTER SPEAKING, you should reserve your right to do so after addressing the chair.
    - EX: “Hermione Granger, Hogwarts, Sir Chair. I reserve my right to yield the remainder of my time to Delegate Malfoy from Hogwarts Slytherin.”

BILL TITLE	The subject of the BILL.
CAUCUS	A meeting of a group or party, generally to make a decision on behalf of their group.

DIVISION (OF THE ASSEMBLY)	A MOTION to force a standing vote; generally invoked when a voice vote is unclear.
DOCKET	A list of BILLS to be presented.
MAJORITY VOTE	More than half of the votes cast.
MOTION	To introduce a proposal for consideration by the CHAIR.
PARLIAMENTARY INQUIRY	To request advice on procedure from the CHAIR. SENATORS or REPRESENTATIVES may make this point at any time another delegate is not speaking.
REPRESENTATIVE	A member of the House.
ROLL CALL	Calling the names of all members to determine their presence.
SECOND	A personal approval of a motion, generally making it subject to debate.
SENATOR	A member of the Senate.
STATE OF THE COMMONWEALTH ADDRESS	Made by the Governor and containing a review of the general condition of the state and his/her recommendations to the Assembly.
TABLE	A MOTION to defer action on a BILL.
TWO-THIRDS MAJORITY	The majority vote is at least double the minority vote.
VETO	Privilege of the Governor to reject passed legislation.
YIELD	To relinquish time to another Representative or Senator

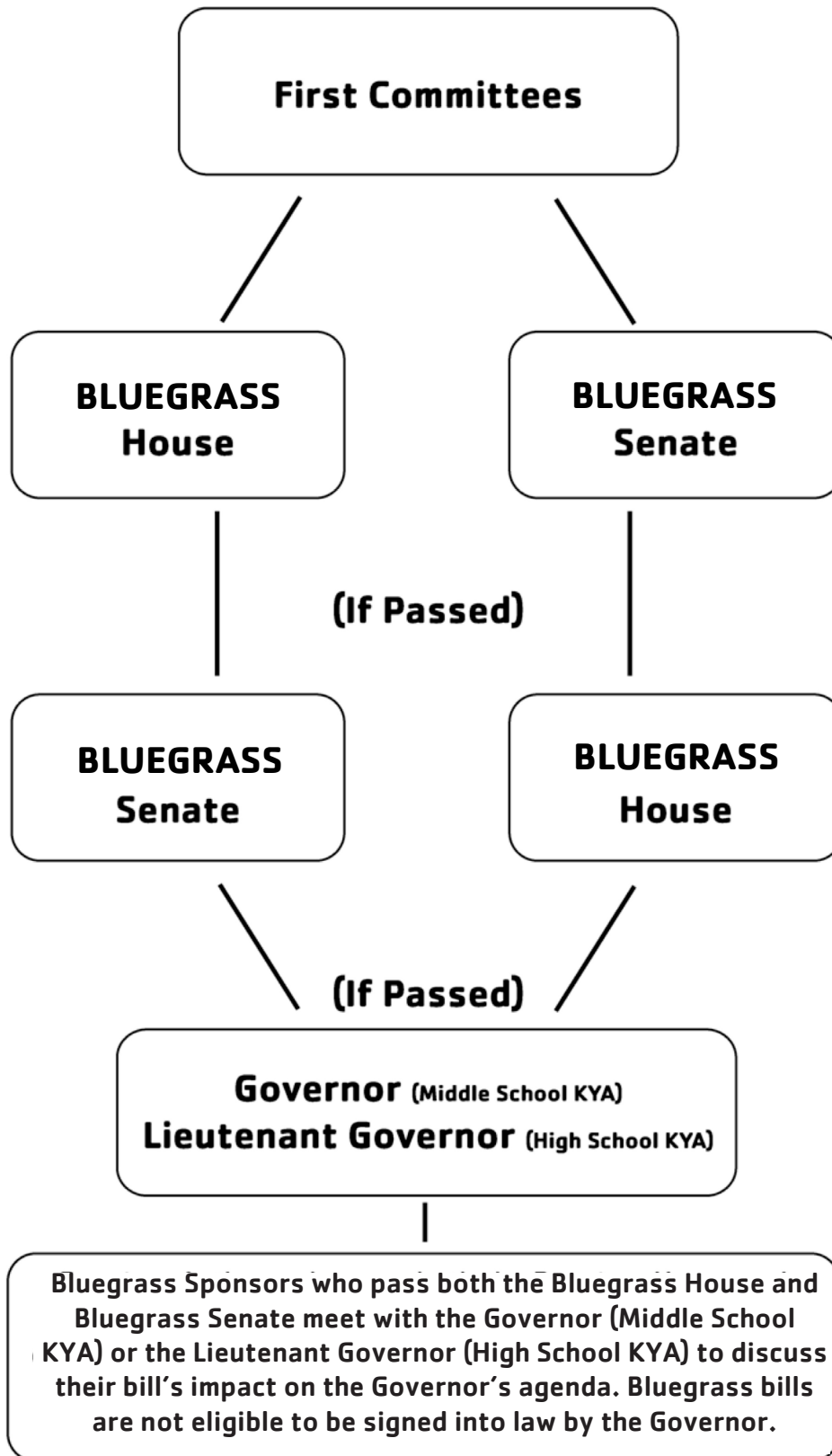

3                                    **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
4  
5 Section 1: In the interest of social and gender equality, we propose that the current sales tax on  
6 feminine hygiene products be taken away.  
7  
8 Section 2: We define feminine hygiene or menstrual hygiene products as personal care products used  
9 by women for menstruation, vaginal discharge, and other bodily functions related to the vulva and  
10 vagina. This includes tampons, maxi-pads and panty-liners, vaginal creams or moisturizers, over the  
11 counter vaginal medications and ointments, and intimate cleansing and deodorants.  
12  
13 Section 3: Currently in the State of Kentucky, prescription drugs are not taxed because they are seen  
14 as medical goods. This includes all prescriptions – even things like Viagra. Feminine hygiene products  
15 are an every-month necessity for all females, but, as of now, do not qualify to be exempt from sales  
16 tax. Under this bill, we propose that tampons and the aforementioned feminine hygiene products be  
17 labeled medical goods and consequently be exempt from taxation.  
18  
19 Section 4: Implementation of this tax will not cost money.  
20  
21 Section 5: If a retailer does not comply with the passage of this bill, they will be fined the total amount  
22 of sales tax for all sales of feminine hygiene products dating back to the day of passage.  
23  
24 Section 6: This bill will go into effect 90 days after it is passed.

5    Section 1: This bill will require all public collages and universities to put into place security measures to

8    Section 2: Our bill will implement a campus force which will provide such services as assisting with  
9    vehicle lockouts, providing security escorts to anyone on campus, and conducting car and foot patrols  
10   around campus. Campuses will require use of ID cards when wanting access to campus activities and  
11   services. Students working in classrooms after hours must have a faculty member present. A text  
12   messaging hot-line will be put in place to alert staff and students of disturbances around the campus.  
13   Finally, a strict no alcohol or drug policy will be enforced.  
14  
15   Section 3: The campus force would be a combination of volunteer students and hired officers. Before  
16   being put onto campus force students must go through a rigorous check by the school. A small increase  
17   in tuition cost as well as a small increase in funding from the state will allow schools to pay for officers  
18   as well as any other changes that will be made.  
19  
20   Section 4: Schools that do not comply to the safety standards will receive a warning that state funding  
21   will be withdrawn. If they fail to put the safety measures in place after a 2 month period state funding  
22   will be retracted until they are implemented.

24   Section 5: This bill will be put into action by the beginning of the new semester in the year 2018.

5    Section 1: Tragedies happen every day, whether we are where them or not. This bill would help  
6    students and teachers be prepared for catastrophes can hospitality or injuries and schools.

7  
8    Section 2: Elementary, middle, and high schools would be required to offer training for natural disaster  
9    preparedness and emergency situations. All students would be required to participate in these  
10   trainings, which would be conducted during school day. Students will learn what to do during the fire,  
11   tornado, earthquake, lockdown, bomb threat, and a medical emergency, as well as why they would take  
12   these actions and secondary plans of action. Teachers will learn how to control students and keep all

6 Section 1: In Kentucky, current legislation mandates that when a citizen reaches the age of 70 and  
7 upon the next renewal following that milestone, they must take a vision test when renewing their  
8 license. This bill proposes an additional provision to this legislation that would require senior drivers  
9 to additionally retake the driver’s test. Drivers would not immediately re-test and renew when turning  
10 70 but rather wait until the next scheduled renewal date as listed on their license.  
11

12 Section 2: This bill will not eliminate age-related injuries and deaths caused by senior citizen drivers;  
13 however, it will seek to decrease those numbers and help equip elderly drivers with up-to-date training  
14 and information regarding safe driving.  
15

16 Section 3: Adding this provision will affect drivers who turn 70 beginning January 1, 2018 and will not  
17 affect drivers over age 70 who have previously had their licenses revoked.  
18

19 Section 4: Senior citizen drivers across the state of Kentucky will be affected by this bill. Drivers will  
20 continue to take their vision test and driver’s test in their county of residence at the appropriate  
21 testing site.

5 Section 1: This bill permits any registered voter to request an absentee ballot, without limitation (so-  
6 called "no excuse" absentee voting) up to four (4) weeks before the Election Day.

7  
8 Section 2: Kentucky restricts absentee early voting only to those who can demonstrate narrow  
9 categories of "excuse" or cause for not voting on Election Day, such as being entirely absent from the  
10 city or county or in cases of medical emergencies. These restrictions do not take into account the work  
11 schedules and family responsibilities of many citizens. If our bill is put into effect, voters will have the  
12 option to vote early for any purpose.

13  
14 Section 3: Work, family, and other life obligations tend to get in the way of civic duties like voting. In  
15 nine states (9) more than thirty (30) percent of voters used early voting. This shows that implementing  
16 this bill into our voting system will bring in much more voters due to the extended time period.  
17 Because of the additional voting opportunities, lines will not be as long on Election Day. This will help  
18 the voting run smoothly and efficiently, while again causing more citizens to get involved.

20 Section 4: All laws or parts of laws in conflict with this bill are hereby repealed.

Section 3: This bill has been enacted in Maryland, Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, Illinois, New York, Minnesota, and New Jersey.

Section 4: There will not be any additional funding needed for this bill to be enacted. With the loss of the feminine products tax, the government will have to budget in the same way that they do for groceries and medicinal items/medicine.

Section 5: Feminine products are necessary for the hygiene of females. These items are currently being taxed as a luxury item, but they are necessities.

Section 6: This bill will go into effect on January 1st, 2017.

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Section 1: Currently, there are no term limits in Kentucky for state level legislators. Senators serve four year terms, and state representatives serve two year terms.


Section 2: The Princeton and Northwestern 20 year study proved that only those with money have a voice in government. This study showed that the opinions and needs of the bottom 90% of income earners in Kentucky have no impact on legislative decisions. Term limits allows for many new people to come into our government, and with new people come new ideas and perspectives.

Section 3: This bill will help limit corruption within our government.

Section 4: Kentucky's constitution will be amended to limit all Kentucky state level Senators and Representatives to serving two terms in office. Legislators who have already served their two terms will not be able to run for re-election.

Section 5: This will require no funding as it is only a change in procedure. This will reduce the amount of money involved in politics because it will prevent payments to a certain candidate for long periods of time.

Section 6: This bill will come into effect January 1, 2017. Candidates elected in 2016 will not be effected until they run for re-election.

1 An act to require all Kentucky hospitals to make average medical bill pricing publicly available.


2  
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5 Section 1: As it currently sits in the American Healthcare System, there is no way future patients of a  
6 hospital can determine the cost of their stay. This is especially shocking, given the fact hat the U.S. has  
7 the highest health care cost as a percentage of GDP out of all developed countries (18%).

8  
9 Section 2: This especially true to Kentucky. With the growing costs of health care and the decreasing  
10 reimbursement of medical expenses from insurance companies, it is increasingly important that  
11 Kentuckians are aware of the costs of the treatments that they receive. The National Patients Bill of  
12 Rights states that "You have the right to choose health care providers". This bill seeks to empower a  
13 patient's right to choose by requiring health care providers to make average medical bill costs publicly  
14 available. In doing so, patients will be able to compare multiple hospital's billing expenses when  
15 considering inpatient stays; this encourages competition amongst health care providers while  
16 simultaneously providing patients with the right to choose.

17  
18 Section 3: This bill will mandate that hospitals will report their average cost per inpatient stay or  
19 Internet database sites such as healthcare.gov, the hospital's own website, or incorporated into the  
20 facility's patient information pamphlet. This bill also mandates that most average hospital expenses will  
21 be itemized and made available to potential patients prior to hospital stays. Average hospital expenses  
22 will include cost for general surgical procedures, radiology expenses, basic feeds charged by specialty  
23 physicians, room and board, and any other pertinent fees that may arise. The creation and  
24 implementation of this information will be virtually cost-free, as hospitals already have specific billing

12 legally related to the patient. The patient must be physically and mentally capable of self-administering  
13 the aid-in-dying dmg.

15 Section 4: A physician is required to complete a full assessment of the patient's medical history and  
16 current condition. If the physician believes the patient's request is impaired in any way due to  
17 depression or mental illness, tests and evaluations are required for the patient to pass before the  
18 physician can carry out the patient's wishes

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1                   An act to Establish Romeo and Juliet Laws in the Commonwealth of Kentucky

3                   **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
4

5 Section 1: The Age of Consent in Kentucky is 16. The current law states that anyone engaging in sexual  
6 relations with someone between the age of 13 and the age of 15 can be prosecuted under 5 statutory  
7 sexual abuse charges. ‘Close in age’ means that if you are under the age of 16, you may consent to  
8 anyone up to 2 years older than you.  
9

10 Section 2: This bill will establish the close-in-age exemption, commonly known as “Romeo and Juliet  
11 laws” in the commonwealth of Kentucky. Romeo and Juliet laws are put in place to prevent the  
12 prosecution of individuals between the ages of 13 and 15 who are in a consensual relationship when  
13 both are close in age to each other to also include 16 and 17 year olds, and one or both of the  
14 partners are below the age of consent. Romeo and Juliet Laws should be enacted to allow individuals  
15 that are between the age of 13 and 15 in consensual sexual relationships that are close in age to not  
16 be prosecuted for rape to include the ages of 16-17. If one individual is more than 2 years older than  
17 the defendant, they will still be prosecuted and fined.  
18


19 Section 3: The current Kentucky law states that if the act of intercourse is to occur between a minor  
20 and someone who is either in an authoritative position, or someone who the minor is dependent on,  
21 then the minor cannot consent until they turn 18. Any acts that are sexual in nature between someone  
22 who is under 18 and someone they are dependent on may be classified as statutory rape, as it could be  
23 a violation of the authority and responsibility that is held over the minor. This portion of the law will  
24 not be altered.  
25

26 Section 4: The following charges will be enforced according to any violations of this bill. The five sexual  
27 abuse charges are: Sodomy which is a class A felony which would entitle 20-50 years in prison – to  
28 include incest resulting in serious bodily harm, Rape in the first degree is a class b felony to include  
29 incest, which would entitle 10-20 years in prison. Sexual abuse in the first degree is a class c felony  
30 which entitles 5-10 years in prison, and unlawful use of electronic means to induce a minor to engage  
31 in sexual relations is class D felony which entitles 1-5 years in prison.  
32

33 Section 5: No additional funding will be necessary as it is an amendment to the current laws and  
34 statutes.

5 Section 1: The purpose of this bill is to allow private and home schooled students the opportunity to  
6 participate in extracurricular activities that their school doesn't provide. These activities include  
7 sports, music programs, clubs, etc.

8

9 Section 2: The private and home schooled students will be held at the same standards as public school  
10 students, including grade requirements and sports fees. They will have to tryout or audition just as  
11 public school students do.

13 Section 3: Home school and private school families are already paying taxes to fund the public schools  
14 and other school programs. Therefore, they should be eligible to participate in the extracurricular  
15 activities that their school does not provide.

16


17 Section 4: Some states already have similar laws implemented. Such as, the Tim Tebow Law in Florida.  
18 More than twenty states have already passed this bill.

20 Section 5: This bill will go into effect on July 1, 2018.

1 An act to require that all 911 call centers in the state of Kentucky be compatible with FCC enhanced  
2 911 standards.  
3

4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
5

6 Section 1: Due to the prevalence of mobile phones, most of the 911 calls made are on cell phones. The  
7 current 911 call center system is outdated and it is unable to determine the location of the caller using  
8 GPS on cell phones. Only calls on landline phones are immediately traceable to an address. This lack of  
9 accurate location data can increase response times by several precious minutes, which can be the  
10 difference between life and death. It is estimated by the FCC that 10,000 lives could be saved  
11 nationwide every year of emergency response times were decreased by one (1) minute.


12  
13 Section 2: This act will require that all 911 call centers in Kentucky be in compliance with SEC  
14 guidelines. This act will also require that the requesting of location data be automated.

15  
16 Section 3: Funding for this project will be obtained through the same taxes that currently fund 911 call  
17 centers. Funding currently allocated for maintenance of aging systems can be reallocated for  
18 implementation of this new system.

19  
20 Section 4: The new center would be able to automate the process of requesting location data from the  
21 cellular network the phone is attached to. The exchange of data required for location to be determined  
22 can take several seconds or even a few minutes. Once the four major carriers are in compliance with  
23 the FCC guidelines the new centers will be able to speed this process up through the aforementioned  
24 automation and the more widespread complaints of cellular networks with these data requests.

25  
26 Section 5: This program will also help to increase accuracy for 911 calls made from cell phones in  
27 doors, which could be less accurate as walls can interfere with cell signals.

28  
29 Section 6: This act will go into effect 90 days after it is passed in all 911 call centers will be required  
30 to be in compliance 365 days after the law goes into effect.

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1 An act to Require Drug Testing for Government Assistance Recipients Convicted of a Drug Charge

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
4

5 Section 1: All individuals that have been convicted of any drug use or drug-related charge must report  
6 for a series of drug tests to determine continued eligibility for government assistance.  
7

8 Section 2: For the purpose of this bill, government assistance includes Supplemental Nutrition  
9 Assistance Program (SNAP) and Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), known as Kentucky  
10 Transitional Assistance Program (K-TAP) in Kentucky.  
11

12 Section 3: The mandatory test will be in the form of a urine test. All drug tests will be administered at  
13 The Department for Community-Based Services, which have local branches throughout Kentucky  
14 counties.  
15

16 Section 4: The hours for these branches will now be extended from 8:00 AM - 4:30 PM to 8:00 AM -  
17 6:00 PM Monday through Friday.  
18

19 Section 5: Failure to pass a drug test will result in immediate loss of K-TAP and SNAP benefits.  
20 Individuals that fail the drug test will be referred to The Kentucky Office of Drug Control Policy:  
21 Operation UNITE toll free treatment referral line. Individuals can have their benefits reinstated thirty  
22 days after a failed drug test upon successfully passing another drug test.  
23

24 Section 6: Once an individual has passed a drug test for six consecutive months, they will be tested  
25 only once every other month. Once an individual passes the series of drug tests for a period of 12  
26 months, they will be tested every six months. The tests continue as long as they are enrolled in  
27 government assistance.  
28


29 Section 7: Funding will come from the annual budget of The Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family  
30 Services, which is 480 million dollars total.  
31

32 Section 8: The Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services will oversee the implementation,  
33 enforcement, and regulation of this bill.  
34

35 Section 9: This bill will go into effect January 1, 2017.

4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
5

6 Section 1: This bill will require all 120 counties in the state of Kentucky to put in place a higher  
7 frequency of speed limit signs.  
8


9 Section 2: Currently, throughout the Commonwealth there are few regulations regarding the placement  
10 of speed limit signs, with some occurrences having signs at a respectful distance, where others are  
11 simply too far away.  
12

13 Section 3: This bill would mandate the provision of additional, state-funded, 15 signs per 100 square  
14 miles. This bill would also put in a maximum distance between signs of 5 miles of highways and 1 mile  
15 on any other road.  
16

17 Section 4: This bill would be enacted once signed into law, and all signs must be put in place one year  
18 after signing, November 2017.  
19

20 Section 5: This bill would cost approximately \$181,840.50. All of this can be funded from the  
21 \$700,000,079 budget for Highway Management according to The Kentucky Transportation Cabinet  
22 from 2015-2016.

6 Section 1: Currently, there are five school board members for each county in the state of Kentucky,  
7 excluding Jefferson County with seven. None of these are required to have any past teaching  
8 experience.  
9


10 Section 2: School board elections will be altered so that each county not fitting this bill's requirements  
11 will have a specialized election where only retired teachers may run. If only one teacher runs, the  
12 election will not be specialized to prevent the teacher from automatically winning. If no teachers run,  
13 the election will not be specialized. This process will be repeated until the board fits the two teacher  
14 requirement.  
15

16 Section 3: Only one teacher election may happen with each election cycle (ex. two teacher spots empty,  
17 three spots being run for, only one can be a teacher).  
18

19 Section 4: Jefferson County will be required to have three members that meet the teacher requirements,  
20 since they have seven board members instead of five.

22 Section 5: The Kentucky Board of Elections will enforce this bill.

3                                    **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**


4  
5    Section 1: A luxury tax is a tax levied on goods considered to be luxuries and in Kentucky the luxury  
6    tax is classified as a selective sales tax. Feminine products are placed under this tax along with things  
7    like boats and expensive cars.

8  
9    Section 2: Like most states that tax menstrual products, Kentucky imposes a 6% sales tax on all  
10    tangible personal property but allows exceptions for certain necessities or “non-luxuries” such as food  
11    and prescription medical supplies. However, hygiene products are specifically excluded from coverage  
12    under the medical products exception.

13  
14    Section 3: In 2014 the Kentucky State Government collected \$2,222,967 from selective sales and  
15    gross receipts taxes. This is the total amount of all types of selective sales taxes, which the luxury tax  
16    falls under. Eliminating the tax on this specific product would result in a very small loss of this revenue  
17    and wouldn’t affect the budget in any significant way.

18  
19    Section 4: Nearly every woman on the planet needs these essential feminine products like pads and  
20    tampons which makes it unsensible to tax them as a luxury. This bill would eliminate the tax on  
21    essential feminine products.

22  
23    Section 5: This bill will be enforced by the Kentucky Department of Revenue and will go into effect 3  
24    months after passage.

5 Section 1: This bill allows 15 year old youths to take the written test on road safety and laws to get

8 Section 2: The teen will have to hold their permit for 365 day, complete 70 hours of practice driving  
9 with at least 20 hours at night, and complete a Driver's Education Course before getting their  
10 Intermediate License.

11

12 Section 3: This bill helps the teen by allowing him/her to drive through all four seasons with an adult.

13

14 Section 4: When a teen turns 16 and 6 months or held their Intermediate License for 180 days, then  
15 they may apply for a full unrestricted license.

16

17 Section 5: Any cost will be founded by the Department of Motor Vehicles.


18

19 Section 6: This bill will go into effect 6 months upon passage.

20

21 Section 7: When this bill goes into effect, any teen between 15 and 16 can choose to get their permit  
22 or wait until they turn 16, but will have to hold the permit for 365 days.

11 Section 3: Mylan Company has become a monopoly due to them being the only wide spread producers  
12 of the Epipen. Being that it is illegal to run a monopoly, we should address the issue of price inflation.


13  
14 Section 4: If the company raises the rates of Epipen that company would pay fines.

15 First offense-A fine of \$25,000

16 Second offense- A fine of \$100,000

17 Third offense- This will result in a lawsuit from the Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services.

18  
19 Section 5: This bill will go into effect one month after it is passed.

3                                   **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5  
6 Section 1: Studies from Ohio State University show that more than 60 percent of college students are  
7 stressed about their financial lives. The study concluded that universities need to help students  
8 manage this stress and balance their time to stay successful. A life skills class in high school would  
9 provide education on money management, cooking, childcare, and other basic needs to help prevent  
10 these future stresses. These skills will help all students take care of themselves and be productive  
11 citizens after high school.

12  
13 Section 2: The curriculum will be an integrated course with the units derived from all of the career  
14 pathways outlined in the Program of Studies for Family and Consumer Sciences under Career and  
15 Technical Education to be approved by the Professional Standards Board. This includes objectives of  
16 Child/Human Development, Money Skills, Relationships, Culinary I, Principles of Hospitality, and FACS  
17 Life Skills.

18  
19 Section 3: This life skills 1 credit class will be added into the health curriculum, increasing the health  
20 graduation requirement to 1.5 credits. One credit hour will be removed from electives, maintaining the  
21 total of 22 credit hours for minimum high school graduation requirements. Students that do not  
22 participate in this class will not be able to graduate high school.


23  
24 Section 4: Teachers for this class will need to be a state-certified educator with a concentration in  
25 business or economics. Teachers must follow state assigned model curriculum outlined by the Board of  
26 Education to instruct the class.

27  
28 Section 5: Budget for curriculum development will be determined by the Professional Standards Board  
29 by the end of 2017, and funding for implementation of the class will be provided through the  
30 department of Career and Technical Education, which is categorized under Next Generation Learners  
31 Programs as stated in the Budget of the Commonwealth (2016-2018) Volume 1.

32  
33 Section 6: This bill will be put into effect at the beginning of the 2018-2019 school year.

3                                    **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

5    Section 1: It costs on average \$160,000 for a city to run a NEP (needle exchange program) which  
6 equals to about \$20 per user per year. The implementation of this bill has the potential to lower the  
7 tax rate on medical tax in Kentucky.


8  
9    Section 2: If store clerks or clinics do not abide by this bill a month after the implementation, there will  
10 be a fine of \$500. If the store clerks and clinics are still not abiding by the bill another month after they  
11 have been fined the first time, they will receive a fine of \$1,000. By the third month after the  
12 implementation of this bill, store clerks and clinics who still refuse to abide by this bill will receive an  
13 extra fine of \$2,000 every month until they do abide by it.

14  
15    Section 3: This bill aims to decrease the percentage of heroin users in Kentucky by withdrawing the  
16 distribution of clean needles, which provoke the use and abuse of heroin, provided by clinics.

18    Section 4: This bill shall be implemented in January 2017.

8 Section 2: In Kentucky the prison population is 21,657. however the crime in Kentucky is about  
9 15% lower than the national average. 91% of Kentucky's crimes are property crimes, and the  
10 other 9% are violent crimes.  
11  
12 Section 3: This bill aims to lessen the sentences of non-violent, non-sexual offenders and to  
13 increase the maximum time off allowed for good behavior from 60 days per year to 90 days per  
14 year for non-violent, non-sexual offenders.  
15  
16 Section 4: This bill will go into effect January 1, 2017.

1 An act to equip and certify first responders for the administration of Naloxone

2  
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5 Section 1: Naloxone is a drug used to reverse the effects of an opioid overdose. Opioid drugs include  
6 heroin, oxycodone, morphine, codeine, and fentanyl. It can be administered by an injection or nasal  
7 spray. Last year, in Kentucky, over 1,248 people died from a drug overdose. This is a steep incline from  
8 2014, when 1,079 people died of overdoses. The use of opioid has become so widespread it has been  
9 raised to epidemic level.


10  
11 Section 2: Naloxone, also known by the brand name Narcan, is a medication that can reverse the  
12 effects of opioid overdose. It is most often injected into a person experiencing an overdose; however, it  
13 can also be used as a nasal spray. Opioids can affect a person's breathing. When too much is taken it  
14 can cause a person to stop breathing. Scientifically, Naloxone attaches to the same parts of the brain  
15 that receive heroin along with other opioids, and it blocks the opioids for 30-90 minutes to reverse the  
16 respiratory depression that would otherwise lead to death from overdose.

17  
18 Section 3: Currently in Kentucky, anyone can obtain Naloxone with prescription from their insurance  
19 company or the agency or organization by which they're employed. A half hour to an hour long training  
20 session is required in order to carry and use Naloxone. EMTs as well as policemen will be provided with  
21 Naloxone, as it is required by this bill. This bill will require all first responders to carry and be trained in  
22 the use of Naloxone.


23  
24 Section 4: The money to purchase the drug for EMTs and police officers will be supplied from the  
25 Kentucky state medicaid budget, which makes up about 24 percent of the Kentucky state budget.  
26 Kentucky has several billion dollars in their budget dedicated solely for medicaid, and there is  
27 \$361,317,000 for public health, from which the funding for Naloxone for EMTs and policemen will be  
28 provided.

29  
30 Section 5: A bottle of injectable Naloxone or one nasal spray costs between 40 to 50 dollars; however,  
31 bought wholesale from KY pharmacies, it can be greatly discounted to about 20 to 30 dollars per  
32 bottle. Each police officer and EMT in Kentucky will be supplied with 1 bottle of Naloxone to be carried  
33 at all times. The money from the medicaid budget will be used for training and providing EMTs and  
34 police officers with Naloxone. Currently, there are 2,740 certified EMTs in Kentucky and 7,600 police  
35 officers in Kentucky, so this will cost approximately \$200,000, which is only 0.0006% of Kentucky's  
36 medicaid budget.

37  
38 Section 6: This bill will go into effect on January 5, 2017.

1                   An act to reduce the corporate income tax for companies in the state of Kentucky  
2  
3                   **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
4  
5 Section 1: The unemployment rate in the Kentucky is 5%. Although this seems low, there are still  
6 220,000 people who cannot provide for themselves. To ensure continued economic growth for  
7 Kentucky and jobs for these people, more companies must be attracted to Kentucky in hopes that the  
8 unemployment rate will reach 0%.  
9  
10 Section 2: The purpose of this bill is to decrease the income tax on companies by 0.5%. This will reduce  
11 the tax on businesses with incomes less than \$50,000 to 3.5% (from current rate of 4%). For  
12 businesses that make \$50,000 to \$100,000, we will reduce the tax to 4.5% (from current rate of 5%),  
13 and for companies that make more, the tax will be 5.5% (from current rate of 6%). This will strengthen  
14 the state's economy, provide more jobs for the people, and attract more industries into the state. With  
15 this increase in jobs, the government will ultimately have more funding that can now be used towards  
16 creating even more jobs, helping our public schools, and to better the lifestyle of the average  
17 Kentuckian.  
18  
19 Section 3: For companies in the United States that use over 50% clean energy, the corporate income  
20 tax will be reduced by 1%. This way, the state will attract more clean energy driven businesses in order  
21 to further improve the local financial system. This will transition Kentucky into a clean energy driven  
22 state while also restoring lost jobs of the state's coal industry that has given Kentucky energy for so  
23 many years.  
24  
25 Section 4: This bill will go into effect one year after it is passed.

1                   An act to Legalize Charter Schools in the Commonwealth of Kentucky

2  
3  
4                   **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

5  
6   Section I: Kentucky’s dropout rate in 2016 was 14% with 95% of the dropouts being persons of low  
7 income or of a minority. The charter schools proposed in this bill will be open to enrollment specifically  
8 from minorities and students who qualify as low income.

9  
10   Section II: Charter schools function as independently run public schools; therefore, each charter school  
11 will be funded by the state based on enrollment and attendance. On average, the state of Kentucky  
12 gives a public school \$13,276 per student.

13  
14   Section III: A pilot project involving implementing two charter schools into one rural and one urban  
15 setting will be required before authorizing all counties to build and run individual schools. One school  
16 will be placed in Owsley County, and the other in Jefferson County.


17  
18   Section IV: The charter schools implemented first will be only high schools, allowing a maximum 600  
19 students per school. If the pilot schools are successful, the possibility for middle and elementary  
20 charter schools will be opened.

2  
3                                    **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5 Section 1: The Commonwealth’s pension system currently has \$12.4 billion in liabilities. The  
6 Commonwealth only has \$2,356,000 available, just 19% of the funds required. The majority of these  
7 funds were lost in the recent stock market crashes, as this money is kept in investments.


8  
9 Section 2: The pension system is set to pay out \$200 million this year in benefits. The current budget  
10 puts only \$130.7 million in. This is a net loss of nearly \$70 million.

11  
12 Section 3: The Blue Ribbon Commission on Tax Reform determined that the Commonwealth should raise  
13 the tax on cigarettes by \$0.40 per pack. This would bring the total tax per pack on cigarettes to \$1.00.


14  
15 Section 4: This bill will implement the suggested tax increase on cigarettes and use the funds accrued  
16 by the additional \$0.40 per pack to bolster funding for the severely underfunded pension system. This  
17 would result in an additional \$120 million per year.

18  
19 Section 5: At such time as these funds are no longer needed by the pension system, they may be  
20 redirected by appropriate legislative action.


21  
22 Section 6: This bill would be enacted on January 1st, 2017.

5   Section 1: This bill will amend state child labor laws to include those over 18 still enrolled in high  
6   school until completion of their high school education.  
7  
8   Section 2: Whereas current state labor laws state that once someone turns 18, they are considered an  
9   adult in the work force. Therefore, they are considered able to work "adult hours" and no longer  
10   protected by the child labor laws. For children under the age of 18, labor laws state that they may not  
11   work after 10:30 pm preceding a school day and until 1:00 am on non-school days. Currently those  
12   turning 18 while still in school are no longer protected by these laws.  
13  
14   Section 3: Therefore, any violations of this law will result in the penalties imposed by the Labor  
15   Department for violations of child labor laws.  
16  
17   Section 4: This bill will require no addition funding and will become effective August 1, 2017.

- 1 An act to Prohibit the Distribution and Use of Disposable Cups Over 24 Ounces in Restaurants in the  
2 State of Kentucky  
3
- 4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
5
- 6 Section 1: The act, when implemented, would prohibit the distribution of disposable cups over the size  
7 of twenty-four (24) ounces by any business or enterprise within the Commonwealth.  
8
- 9 Section 2: This act, when implemented, would not require any funding from the state.  
10
- 11 Section 3: The penalties for violating this law would be as follows: Upon the first offense, the business  
12 would receive a warning from the Kentucky Health Department in addition to a \$1000 fine. On the  
13 second offense, the establishment would receive a 3-4 business week probation period in which they  
14 will not be permitted to sell their products. Upon a third offense, complete shutdown of the  
15 establishment, enforced by Kentucky Health Department.  
16
- 17 Section 4: The bill will be enacted on February 1st, 2017.

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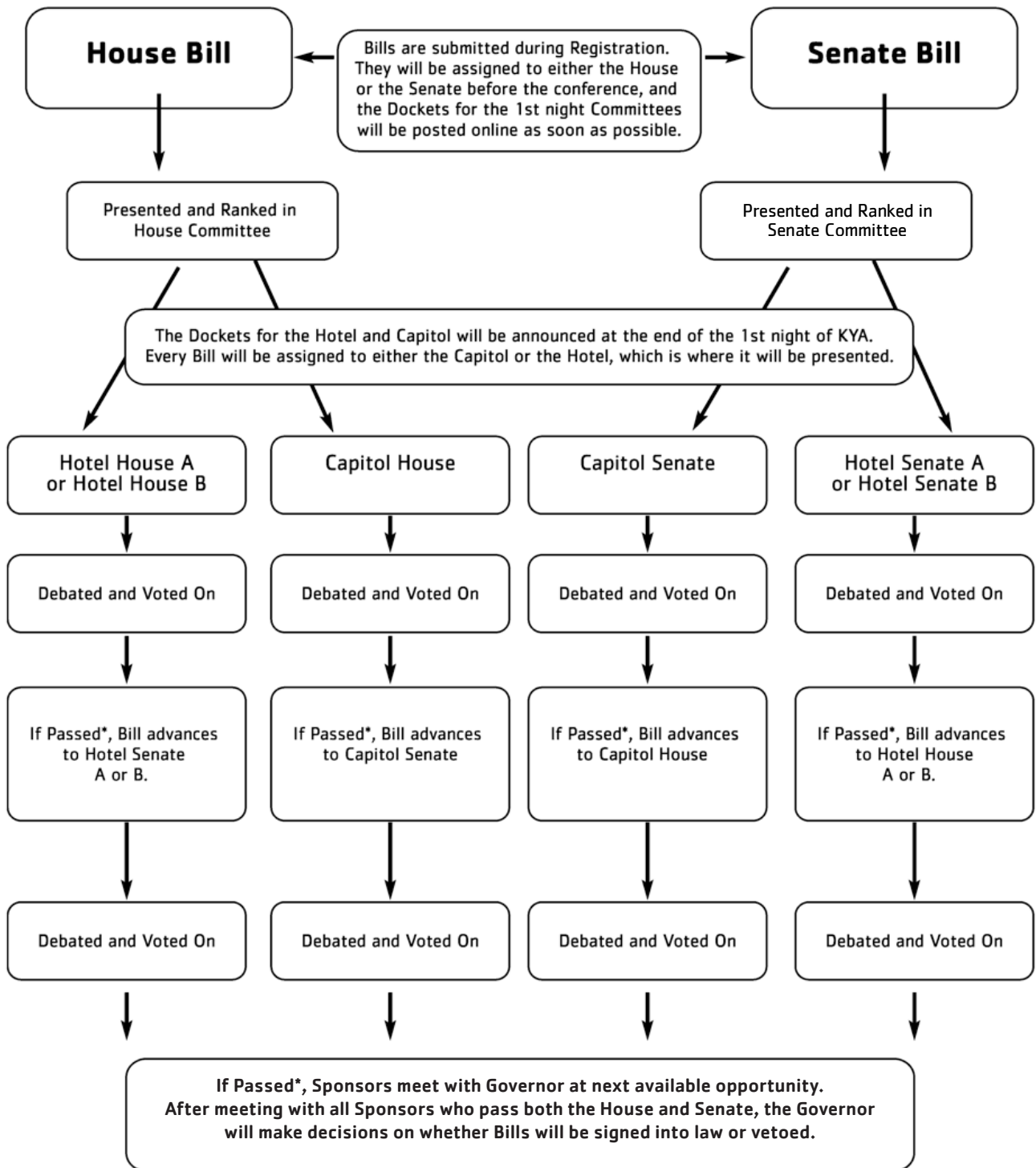
1           An act to mandate Kentucky school districts to obtain and be trained in Narcan administration  
2  
3                           **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
4  
5   Section 1: Narcan, or naloxone, is an antidote for a heroin overdose. It has the ability to reverse or  
6   block the effects of opioids in the brain. This bill will mandate Kentucky school districts to obtain  
7   Narcan in all public and private schools. This will allow public schools and private schools to be  
8   prepared for heroin overdose situations, and to help prevent a drug overdose death.  
9  
10   Section 2: After the bill’s passage, Kentucky school districts will be given 12 months to obtain and be  
11   trained in the administration of Narcan (naloxone). Schools that do not obtain Narcan or complete the  
12   required training to administer Narcan will be fined by the Kentucky Health Department. If a situation  
13   were to occur where a student or staff member died from an overdose at a school without Narcan, the  
14   school could face legal charges.  
15  
16   Section 3: The Kentucky Department of Health will administer this program and provide training to  
17   school districts.  
18  
19   Section 4: All school districts would be required to have school nurses and administrators trained in  
20   administering Narcan (naloxone). Currently the Clinton Foundation is providing Narcan to schools that  
21   apply, free of charge. When the Narcan free trial ends. the school districts will be required to pay for  
22   Narcan, which average \$25 per dose. Schools are not required to apply to the Clinton foundation, only  
23   to obtain and be trained in the administration of Narcan.  
24  
25   Section 5: This bill will take effect January 1st, 2017

1           An act to abolish the Statute of Limitations (SOL) on Sex Crimes in the State of Kentucky

3                           **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
4  
5   Section 1: Currently the state of Kentucky has no SOL on Felony offences regarding sexual abuse.  
6   However, misdemeanor sex abuse of a minor has a SOL of 5 years after the victim turns 18. All other  
7   Misdemeanor level sex abuse has a SOL of 1 year.  
8  
9   Section 2: This bill will eliminate the SOL on all sex crimes in the state of Kentucky. By putting this bill  
10 in effect, all victims will have the time they need to report the crime. Sexual assault doesn't go away  
11 after a certain amount of time, whereas the opportunity to report does.  
12  
13   Section 3: There will be no funding required for this bill.  
14  
15   Section 4: This bill will go into effect immediately after passage.

1 An act to provide training for hotel and transportation employees on the signs of human trafficking

2

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4

5 Section 1: Human trafficking is a modern-day form of slavery in which victims are exploited for the  
6 purpose of commercial sex, labor, or a combination of both. This can be accomplished by means of  
7 force, fraud, or coercion. From December of 2007 to February of 2015, there have been 1,437 cases  
8 of trafficking in hotels and motels alone. Just this year, up to June 30, 2016, there have been 42  
9 human trafficking cases reported in Kentucky. Although that is roughly 2/3 of what was reported last  
10 year, it is 127% of what was reported in 2012.

11

12 Section 2: This act would require all hotel staff on all levels and all transportation officials in charge of  
13 driving public transport vehicles in the state of Kentucky to be trained on what human trafficking is and  
14 the signs of human trafficking. The managers of the hotels and the management staff in charge of  
15 public transportation would hold a session once a year (and upon hiring, as part of regular training)  
16 showing videos from <http://www.rescueandrestoreky.org/>, a website which includes five training videos  
17 sponsored by Kentucky government officials working with "Rescue and Restore KY" to train officials on  
18 the signs of human trafficking. After the staff has completed the training, they should know a general  
19 overview of knowledge on trafficking, trauma linked with trafficking, laws in Kentucky already in place  
20 about trafficking, services offered, and the exploitation that surrounds human trafficking victims.

21

22 Section 3: This act would require all hotel and transportation officials in the state of Kentucky to  
23 participate in annual sessions to train them on the signs of human trafficking. One who chooses not to  
24 comply with the request shall be put on the corresponding step of corrective action related to the  
25 violation of the training per company policy. Progressive discipline will ensue up to termination if the  
26 employee does not comply with the policy. As for the entirety of the corporation complying, a  
27 government official would routinely follow up with the program status. If a corporation fails to comply,  
28 a fine of \$2,000,000 will be charged.


29

30 Section 4: This bill would have no cost due to its online accessibility. All resources would be available  
31 through the funding of Rescue and Restore KY.


32

33 Section 5: This bill, if passed, will go into effect in January of 2018 in the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

- 1 An act to combat rising unemployment through expanded job training in rapidly growing job sectors.  
2
- 3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
4
- 5 Section 1: Noting the recent job loss in certain sects of the Kentucky workforce, particularly the  
6 widespread lay-offs in coal and railway related industries, actions must be taken to combat the damage  
7 done to the regional economies as a consequence of the aforementioned job loss.  
8
- 9 Section 2: This bill proposes a simple solution to this problem by providing tax credits to industries  
10 that provide free job training in the following focus career sects:  
11
- 12 1) Transportation and Material Moving Occupations  
13 2) Healthcare Practitioners and Technical Occupations  
14 3) Office and Administrative Support  
15
- 16 Section 3: The industries listed above are predicted to have the highest gross increase in job  
17 availability in Kentucky over the course of next ten years, thereby securing this bill's efficiency and  
18 guaranteeing a higher rate of job security for those previously unemployed.  
19
- 20 Section 4: Job training would be provided by the individual companies that enact the workforce  
21 reductions. Each company/corporation would be responsible for providing as well as funding job  
22 training to workers from certified trainers/training institutions. Job training must be completed in one  
23 of the the three sects mentioned previously.  
24
- 25 Section 5: In exchange for the provision of job training, each business/corporation in participation will  
26 receive tax credits as partial/full compensation for their compliance with this bill.  
27
- 28 Section 6: A committee will be established comprised of members of the Kentucky Labor Cabinet to  
29 annually evaluate this law. The committee has power to shift the focus careers, set the value of tax  
30 credits given, and to certify job trainers. The committee will meet following each fiscal year to evaluate  
31 the effectiveness and efficiency of the law.

1           An act to require mandatory first aid, CPR, medical, and defibrillator training to all school faculty.  
2

3                           **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
4

5   Section 1: Many teachers do not have training and how to perform first aid, CPR, or how to use a  
6   defibrillator. Often they do not know where proper medical supplies are located in the school. Teachers  
7   are also often unaware of special medical issues facing our students and how to handle these  
8   conditions in the classroom or in emergency situations. This bill would require mandatory first aid, CPR,  
9   medical, and defibrillator training to be completed by all school faculty.  
10

11   Section 2: Every faculty member will be required to attend an initial training on first aid, CPR, and how  
12   to use a defibrillator. After this initial training, additional refresher courses will be required every two  
13   years.  
14


15   Section 3: As part of this training, every teacher will receive training about medical conditions facing  
16   students attending their school, such as seizure disorder, diabetes, severe allergies, etc. Teachers will  
17   receive basic training on how these conditions may impact student performance, as well as how to  
18   identify danger signs for medical emergencies and what intervention is needed until emergency  
19   personnel can arrive.  
20

21   Section 4: In addition to these trainings, each classroom and public area must be equipped with an  
22   emergency care handbook and basic supplies in an easily accessible location. Online resources will also  
23   be provided to all faculty for reference materials.  
24

25   Section 5: It is suggested that this training would take place during the required professional  
26   development day.  
27

28   Section 6: Teachers will be required to be trained five days before the first day of school. If a student  
29   enrolls during the school year with a significant medical condition, training for teachers concerning this  
30   medical condition must be completed within 10 days of the students enrollment.  
31

32   Section 7: This law will go into effect for the 2017-2018 school year.

3                   **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

5 Section 1: This bill will provide that the manufacturing, sale, distribution and transportation of  
6 intoxicating liquors is lawful within the entire geographic area of each and every county in the  
7 Commonwealth of Kentucky.  
8


9 Section 2: This bill addresses the desire to see that all counties within the Commonwealth of Kentucky  
10 have the same opportunity to benefit from the substantial economic and social benefits derived from  
11 the sale of alcohol.  
12

13 Section 3: Once approved would make alcohol regulations the same for all 120 counties in Kentucky.  
14

15 Section 4: Alcohol sales would be regulated by the Kentucky Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control,  
16 the state agency that currently oversees the permit application process that businesses must go  
17 through in order to sell or manufacture alcohol in the Commonwealth.  
18

19 Section 5: Allowing alcohol sales in previously dry counties would result in new jobs and additional  
20 revenue for those cities and counties. This new source of revenue would be used to strengthen county  
21 infrastructures, fund education, provide public assistance, health care and maintain our correctional  
22 facilities.

24 Section 6: This bill will go into effect on January 1, 2017.

An act to establish bio-abortion

**Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

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Section 1: Whereas across Kentucky, in place of abortion clinics, there will be the exchange of fetuses from the mother to a growth chamber and/or incubator in hospital facilities. Fetus must be already assigned guardians at exchange. This process would lead to approximately over 3,000 lives continuing each year.


Section 2: The research would likely cost approximately \$10 million, and construction of approximately 2,000 growth chambers would cost likely \$2.5 million.

Section 3: In order to proceed, alternatives to having an abortion must be provided to the mother. Exchanging growth chambers for an abortion will allow for expecting mothers to have the right to their bodies, but not compromise the right of the unborn child.

Section 4: Growth chambers would be distributed among all Kentucky hospitals receiving federal funds. Using the research conducted at the VECTOR research center in Koltsovo, Russia related to the bioengineering of an infant, research could take five years. Without cooperation, research could take 10 to 15 years. Implementation of this law will be after research and construction of the bio-abortion facilities, and also could take up to two years after that, giving the approximate date: December 2028.

Section 5: Adoption, on average, costs approximately \$40,000, and likely 3,000 fetuses being exchanged, income would be over \$100 million a year. Money from this income would be used for research faculty, facility costs, and also paying off the cost of research for the growth chambers. Based upon the potential revenue generate, this bill would not put an unnecessary burden upon Kentucky taxpayers.

1                   An act to prohibit tobacco use in public schools in the state of Kentucky.

2  
3                   **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**


4  
5   Section 1: This act proposes that all public schools in Kentucky be 100% tobacco free. In 2011, the  
6   percentage of youth in grades 9–12 who smoke cigarettes was 24.1% in our state. The range across  
7   44 states was 5.9% to 24.1%. We ranked 44th among 44 states. In 2013, Kentucky had the highest  
8   age-adjusted lung cancer incident rates in both men and women. The percentage of youth who used  
9   smokeless tobacco was 16.9% in 2011. The range across 40 states was 3.5% to 16.9%. We ranked  
10   40th among 40 states. The percentage of youth who smoked cigars was 17.5% in 2011. The range  
11   across 37 states was 5.0% to 18.3%. Kentucky ranked 35th among 37 states. The percentage of  
12   youth who currently use tobacco (i.e., cigarettes, smokeless tobacco, and/or cigars) is 31.9%. The  
13   range across 36 states was 7.8% to 31.9%. Kentucky ranked 36th among 36 states. Studies show that  
14   youth spend approximately 1/3 time in school environments. Tobacco free school polices can reduce  
15   youth smoking by 30%. This bill won't solve tobacco addiction, but it can help people think twice about  
16   picking a tobacco product.

17  
18   Section 2: This act encompasses entire school properties (includes vehicles on school grounds), before  
19   and after school events/activities, and any other school sponsored trips or activities, 24 hours, 7 days  
20   a week, and 365 days a year. An administrative figure(s) will enforce this policy


21  
22   Section 3: This bill would affect all students, staff, and visitors at all times. School administrators and  
23   resource officers, when applicable, would enforce this bill throughout the school day and at  
24   extracurricular events.

25  
26   Section 4: Schools would be required to update their policies to incorporate this change, detailing  
27   specific procedures for handling offenses. School site-based decision making councils would be  
28   responsible for revising school policies to include consequences for violation of this act.

29  
30   Section 5: This act, upon passage, would go into effect in the 2017-2018 school year.

14 Section 4: Failure to abide by this proposal, if enacted, will result in the following penalties:

16 Second offense: The physician who ordered the mammogram will receive a one-week suspension.

11 Section 2: Kentucky defines an English as a Second Language Student as any individual between the  
12 age of 3 and 21 whose difficulties in speaking, reading, writing, or understanding the English language  
13 may be sufficient to deny the individual the ability to meet the State's proficient level of achievement  
14 on State assessments defined in the state's Annual Measurable Achievement Objectives (AMAO's)


15  
16 Section 3: Kentucky has the ability fund services for students who have learning disadvantages limited  
17 to core content subjects, and should be expected schools to have services for students who are limited  
18 due to their ability to write, speak, read, and understand the English language of equal quality.

19  
20 Section 4: The State of Kentucky require school districts to provide one ESL instructor for every 40 ESL

1 An act to Encourage Drum and Bugle Corps to Perform within the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

2  
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5 Section 1; Drum and Bugle Corps (aka Drum corps and licensed under "Drum Corps International") are  
6 traveling musical marching bands consisting of brass instruments, percussion, synthesizers, and color guard.  
7 Groups perform worldwide. Participants around the world prepare all year to be accepted into these elite  
8 groups. Once accepted, they spend summer performing their show, culminating at the International Finals  
9 competition held in Indianapolis, Indiana, every August. All participants must be between the ages of 16-21.  
10 All costs are paid by the members and through ongoing fundraising. Drum Corps experience enhances  
11 physical abilities, athletic skills, musicianship and teamwork skills. The events at which they perform bring  
12 together many creative art communities and generate significant revenue.


13  
14 Section 2; All colleges with stadiums with the capacity to accommodate at least 20,000 spectators are to  
15 submit a request to host a drum and bugle corp event in an effort to bring this musical sporting event to the  
16 state. These events will be carefully coordinated with local school and community officials. A 5% tax will be  
17 levied on all profits. All remaining profits will be available for the host university's discretion.

18  
19 Section 3; All schools (high schools, home schools, and community colleges) that have marching band  
20 programs will be asked to inform students of the opportunities afforded by participating in a Drum and Bugle  
21 corp and encourage volunteer participation at the event.

22  
23 Section 4; The average ticket price for these events ranges between 35.00 to 60.00 dollars with an average  
24 attendance of 14,000. Disregarding the substantial impact on tourism, the event would generate +/-  
25 \$500,000 dollars in profits, thus yielding a tax revenue of approximately \$25,000 for the purpose of  
26 scholarships and educational resources with an emphasis on music and the arts for at-risk kids.

27  
28 Section 5; There more than 15+ million relatives of current Drum and Bugle Corp members, and 25+ million  
29 alumni. Six of Kentucky's seven bordering states host these events. Many Drums Corps groups pass through  
30 Kentucky on their way to other exhibitions. Kentucky has a golden opportunity to capitalize on these  
31 statistics.

32  
33 Section 6; The tax revenue collected shall be be divided 45-45-10 with 45% devoted to music and arts  
34 education funding in at-risk areas, 45% devoted to financial aid for Kentucky students who are accepted  
35 into Drum Corps groups but lack the means to the pay their entrance fees. And the remaining 10% to the  
36 general budget for Kentucky.

3                   **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
4

5 Section 1: A "biofuel" is defined as a type of energy derived from renewable plant and animal material  
6 that can replace the fuels necessary to create pure gasoline and biodiesel. Unlike fossil fuels, biofuels  
7 can be easily produced from raw agricultural materials. The cheap cost, yet advantageous quality, of  
8 biofuels serves as a substantial basis for success in the agricultural realm of Kentucky. This bill will  
9 require the Kentucky Department of Agriculture to build, establish, and maintain a biofuel plant within  
10 the Commonwealth.  
11

12 Section 2: Currently, the Commonwealth of Kentucky's vast agricultural landscape is not being utilized  
13 to its full benefit for the citizens within the Commonwealth. Establishing a biofuel plant in the  
14 Commonwealth of Kentucky will:  
15 1. Rejuvenate and expand the economic growth of biofuels into neighboring states,  
16 2. Lessen the state's regional dependency on foreign fuels,  
17 3. Lessen the cost of fuel prices,  
18 4. Create autonomy for all Kentucky citizens by providing an annual royalty check for biofuel payouts.  
19

20 Section 3: The biofuel plant will be named the "Kentucky Natural Energy Station" and will be established  
21 in Frankfort, Kentucky due to the city's rich landscaping and crop production. The Kentucky  
22 Department of Agriculture will maintain the 9-acre, 2.1 billion dollar plant.  
23

24 Section 4: Upon passage of the act, the "Kentucky Natural Energy Station" will begin its construction in  
25 the summer of 2017, and will open to the public in the fall of 2019.

3                   **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
4


5 Section 1: Amend KRS 336.130 by enacting a Subsection 5 to prohibit employers from forcing new  
6 employees, as a condition of their employment, to join a labor organization against their wishes; pay  
7 dues to be a member of said labor organization in any way, shape, or form; or be required to pay a  
8 charity or third party an equivalent amount as would standard have to be paid to the labor  
9 organization to become a member.

10  
11 Section 2: Amend KRS 336.180 to state KRS 336.130 as an instance in which the definition of "labor  
12 organization" set forth by KRS 336.180 is applied and upheld.

13  
14 Section 3: Amend KRS 336.990 to include within a new Subsection 3 a Clause (a) that will ensure that  
15 any employer who is found in violation of Subsection 5 of KRS 336.130 will be subject to the penal  
16 code which coincides with a Class A misdemeanor, including any fines and sentencing; a Clause (b)  
17 which will give any employee the right to file a grievance in a court of law against their employer if  
18 these rights have been infringed; and a Clause (c) that ensures the right of any employee who, having  
19 been forced to pay dues to a said labor organization, can lawfully seek restitution from their employer.

20  
21 Section 4: A new section within KRS 336 shall be enacted that will explicitly state that the provisions  
22 set forth in Subsection 5 of KRS 336.130 will not apply to employers or employees who are covered  
23 under the Federal Railway Labor Act; federal employers or employees and those on exclusive federal  
24 enclaves; employers and employees where it would conflict with federal law; or employer/employee  
25 labor organization agreements entered into prior to the date of enactment of this law.

27 Section 5: This law will go into effect on January 1, 2018.

1 An act to Allow Sex Offenders the Option of Libido Suppression to Reduce the Risk of Recidivism.  
2

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
4

5 Section 1: Libido suppression is the administration of testosterone-reducing medications in order to  
6 reduce or diminish sex drive. This bill will pose no additional cost, and payment plans will be calculated  
7 dependent on income and sentence duration. These plans will slowly transfer the responsibility of the  
8 payment to the sex offender once they have reached financial stability.  
9

10 Section 2: To be eligible for libido suppression sex offenders must meet the following qualifications:  
11

- 12 • Be over 21 years of Age
- 13 • Have shown good behavior while incarcerated, as determined by correctional officers
- 14 • Be a first time offender of a victim aged 12 or younger OR commit more than one offense.
- 15 • Have the possibility of parole
- 16 • In order to be granted treatment, the offender: - Must fit the above qualifications
- 17 • Request treatment in writing
- 18 • Undergo a psychological evaluation performed by a mental health professional with experience  
19 treating sex offenders.
- 20 • Be referred to a physician and psychiatrist within their community
- 21 • If at any time the offender decides to not undergo libido suppression before treatment has been  
22 administered, the option of this treatment will be revoked, and they will be required to serve  
23 their full sentence as originally imposed.

24 Section 3: Monitoring of offenders would be performed by their parole or probation officer. Such an  
25 officer would oversee the administration of a monthly blood test to ensure testosterone levels are  
26 within an acceptable range, as determined by their physician. If noncompliant, the offender will be  
27 subjected to additional prison time without parole and/or a fine. Noncompliance includes the use of any  
28 drug or testosterone enhancer to counter the effects of the antiandrogens, as well as failure to  
29 undergo treatment.  
30

31 Section 4: Libido suppression entails the use of testosterone-reducing medications. Medications used  
32 will be subject for review each year by the Department of Corrections. Treatment will need to be re-  
33 administered every 3-6 months. Because testosterone-reducing medications pose the threat of  
34 osteoporosis an anti-osteoporosis drug will also be administered.  
35

36 Section 5: This bill will go into effect one year after its passage.

An act to Reform and Regulate Prescription Drug Pricing


**Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

Section 1: We propose a law prohibiting pharmaceutical companies from charging American insurers from paying more than 10% above the average cost other countries pay for the same drug, effectively lowering prescription drug prices and ensuring that Americans no longer pay disproportionate amounts for the same drugs which members of other developed countries enjoy at increasingly lowered costs. Furthermore, we must allow Medicare to negotiate drug prices directly with drug manufacturer, allow individuals and pharmacists to import lower-cost drugs from qualified pharmacies in Canada, and prohibit anti-competitive "pay-for-delay" deals. This forces pharma to provide fair prices for sick Americans, who currently pay disproportionate amounts compared to average international drug prices.

Section 2: We must calculate the average price for a specific drug among other developed nations, and prohibit drug manufacturers from charging Americans more than 10% above the average international price for the same drug in question. Failing to comply with this requirement, as well as failing to enter into cost negotiations with Medicare, and entering "pay-for-delay" deals with generic pharmaceutical companies, will face the same consequences of violators of other anti-trust laws established for every other industry. Violators can be prosecuted by the Department of Justice and can face up to 10 years in prison and fines of up to \$100 million for corporations, as well as \$1 million for an individual.

Section 3: Other than the cost of research and development, the cost of manufacturing drugs is relatively insignificant. Currently, Americans are essentially paying the entirety of the cost of the research and development stage, leading to the outrageously high costs in question. By forcing pharmaceutical companies to lower prices, revenues will be reduced, but only to the levels typical of every other American industry currently under regulation. Pharmaceutical companies will easily remain able to pay for effective research and development while still enjoying substantial profits.

Section 4: We will give pharmaceutical companies 18 months to prepare for and comply with the regulations proposed before enforcing the penalties in question. Pharmaceutical companies will have time to lower prices, end "pay-for-delay" agreements, and to negotiate with Medicare on prices of existing drugs to reach a mutually beneficial outcome based on the projected break-even price and benefit of the drug based on costs.

2  
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5 Section 1: A School Resource Officer will investigate criminal law violations and when appropriate make  
6 arrests. A School Resource Officer's sworn duty is to enforce the law, but doesn't contradict the need  
7 for the SRO to be positive.


8  
9 Section 2: Statistics show 24% of officers reported taking a loaded firearm from a student or another  
10 person on campus. 87% have confiscated knives or other weapons with blades. 67% reported they  
11 prevented a school faculty member from being assaulted by a student or someone on campus. Many  
12 School Resource Officers (around 84%) believe without an officer on campus, most crimes are  
13 unreported to police.

14  
15 Section 3: There are a total of 173 school districts in Kentucky with 1233 public schools. With every  
16 school receiving at least one SRO, this would create many employment opportunities in Kentucky.

18 Section 4: In the history of School Resource Officers, wages are usually the same as the average

4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

6 Section 1: Kentucky Educational Excellence Scholarships (KEES) money are scholarships given to  
7 students in 9th through 12th grade. It has been awarded to high schoolers that have recently  
8 graduated to use towards college tuition in any Kentucky college. Currently, high school seniors cannot  
9 use this money to pay for college or dual credit classes that they take in high school.  
10


11 Section 2: Almost 90% of students in Kentucky earn KEES money for college. This bill would allow for  
12 all high school seniors from public, private, and home schools to use that money towards those dual  
13 credit and college classes.  
14

15 Section 3: This will apply to all high school seniors who choose to take dual credit or college classes.  
16

17 Section 4: This will not cost anything more because KEES money is already funded by the Kentucky  
18 Lottery.  
19

20 Section 5: If a school or college is found guilty of not accepting a high school senior's KEES money:  
21 1. First offense: a fine of \$500  
22 2. Second offense: a fine of \$1000  
23 3. Third offense: a fine of \$2000  
24 If this is habitual, the fine will increase in increments of \$1000 per offense surpassing the third  
25 offense. All fines will be given back to the Kentucky Lottery to be further used as KEES money for  
26 future students.

28 Section 6: This bill will go into effect July 1, 2018, to allow colleges and high schools to arrange a  
29 system of payment of KEES money to be used for college and dual credit classes.

5   Section 1: Section 88 of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Kentucky gives the Governor limited  
6   line-item veto power on appropriation bills.  
7

8   Section 2: This bill will grant the Governor line-item veto rights on all legislation that is submitted to  
9   the Executive Office for signature.

10

11   Section 3: Currently, there is no limitation on the "rider" and/or "pork belly" legislation that can be  
12   added to any bill. Senators and Congressman of the Commonwealth of Kentucky have misused the  
13   limitation of the line-item veto to add superfluous legislation to bills other than appropriation bills.  
14

15   Section 4: This bill will effectively stop the "rider" and "pork belly" legislative practices, which would  
16   save the Commonwealth millions of dollars in misappropriated funds.  
17

18   Section 5: This line-item veto is subject to the same veto override provisions as any full veto currently  
19   and subsequently provided by the laws and Constitution of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.  
20

21   Section 6: This bill will take effect July 1, 2017.

An act to advance renewable energy standards

**Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**


Section 1: This bill will implement a renewable electricity standard (RPS) in the state of Kentucky. An RPS is a regulatory mandate to increase production of energy from renewable sources such as wind, solar, biomass and other alternatives to fossil and nuclear electric generation. All state utilities companies including investor-owned utility, municipal utilities, and cooperative utilities will be required to participate in a 20 year plan by the end of which they will be required by the state to have 10% to 30% of of their produced energy coming from renewable resources depending upon the scale and service regions of the utilities companies. The bill will be implemented over 20 years, making the transition to greener energy smoother for the state. The plan and its requirements proceed as follows:

Section 2: Beginning the 2018 fiscal year, the first standard for the state will be set. This base standard will require: Investor-owned utilities to produce 5% of their power from renewable means, Electric cooperatives serving 100,000 or more meters will be asked to produce 4%, cooperatives serving fewer than 100,000 meters as well as Municipal and utilities serving more than 40,000 customers will be asked for a production of 2%. Utilities companies will be asked to meet this standard by the end of 2020. Continuing with the program, in the coming years these values will be required to double the deadline for these requirements being the end of 2024 with the final years being from 2024 through 2030 demanding from the utility companies an increase of one third to the requirements to reach the desired goal for renewable energy production.

Section 3: The cost to the state associated with this bill would include the hiring and maintenance of a regulatory body headed by the state for the monitoring of utility companies to ensure they were meeting the standard. To fund this the state will allocate five million dollars to the program to pay for the workers monitoring the project with the amount of workers employed in each county depending on both its population and amount of utility companies located in each county. However amendments could be added as well, their purpose being to set aside money for the education of those employed in careers related to fossil and nuclear fuels to assure education and job production in the field of renewable resources in future years.

Section 4: This bill will be enforced by the Kentucky Department of Energy and Environment who will impose citations and sanctions for utility companies that refuse to comply with the RPS: increased taxes, fines and ultimately the either intervention of the state or forcible termination of or suspension of the plant

7 moving out of the park, which leads to a major decrease in the already small Park budget. The State  
8 Parks would charge a small fee of \$3 per person or \$5 per car, however 15 person vans or larger will

11 Section 2: The visitors fee would be a small amount relating to the average annual attendance and the  
12 cost of maintaining the park. It is estimated that \$240 million is needed to maintain the 50 State Parks  
13 over the next 6-year budget cycle that starts in 2016. The park system is a major contributor to the  
14 wealth of Kentucky and their deterioration has a major impact of the state finances as a whole.

3                   **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**


4  
5   Section 1: Schools will be required to teach English and at least one other language from the top ten  
6 languages spoken in the world. They can choose to teach more but two are required.

7  
8   Section 2: Every teacher will be required to learn and teach the basic vocabulary, in English and the  
9 other language chosen, from their subject and will be required to take a class to teach them. Also,  
10 every school will be required to hire at least one teacher that can fluently speak English and one that  
11 can fluently speak the other language chosen.

12  
13   Section 3: The fluent teacher will be hired in place of another teacher and should be able to teach  
14 another subject as to not raise the cost for the school. The money for the teachers' classes will come  
15 from the Limited English Proficiency money given to schools already.

16  
17   Section 4: Any violations will result in the following penalties for the school:  
18 First offense: \$10,000 fine  
19 Second offense: \$20,000 fine  
20 If a third or higher offense occurs: \$30,000 fine  
21 All money collected from the school will go into an account that can only be accessed when the school

6 Section 1: As natural resources become increasingly exhausted, vehicles that receive 12 miles per  
7 gallon (mpg) or less will be prohibited from using Kentucky highways and interstates in order to  
8 provide conservation for natural resources that are essentially irreplaceable.

10 Section 2: Vehicles that do not comply with these regulations will be fined:

- 11 • 1st Offense: \$250 fine
- 12 • 2nd Offense: \$450 fine
- 13 • 3rd Offense: \$750 fine
- 14 • 4th Offense or any following offense will be punished with a \$1,500 fine.

16 Section 3: Dealerships offering vehicles that receive 12 mpg or less will be subject to a \$7,500 fee for  
17 every vehicle the company licenses to sell in Kentucky.

An act to place pregnant drug addicts in a rehab facility.

**Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

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Section 1: This bill offers drug addicted pregnant mothers a plea deal instead of regular jail time. This plea offer will help the mother get her child back. The mother will have to decide if she wants to take this offer on her own, the judge or attorney will have no affect on her decision. Mothers will stay in here for 1 year, no matter how far along they are with their pregnancy. This is so all mothers will have the same amount of time to recover from their drug addiction.

Section 2: One large rehab facility will be built in Pewee Valley, KY.

Section 3: Prenatal care will be offered as well as support groups and time for visitors.

Section 4: Funding for this will come from unused KEES money, additional lottery funds, and donations will be accepted and given to DOC (departments of corrections).

Section 5: After the full year of treatment, mothers will have the choice to go to a group home for recovering drug addicts. This is not a required option, but the mother will get more recovery time, support, and job opportunities.

An act to change the payment system for the disabled.

**Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

Section 1: Employers are allowed to pay the handicapped an amount that is considerably less than what they are allowed to pay the people without a disability, somebody with a mental or physical impairment.


Section 2: In most cases, a disabled person only works about 5-6 hours a week. In those five to six hours, they would be paid the same minimum wage as the people without a disability are paid, which is \$7.25. If the disabled worker works more than the 6 hours, then the employer is allowed to pay the minimum wage for the disabled which will be set at \$5.25 an hour.

Section 3: This bill applies to all of the disabled, on or off disability checks (which are usually \$1,130 a month or \$1,820 if the disabled is blind) because, even though they are receiving money for having a disability, they are still considered handicapped and could then still be paid a lot less than what others would be receiving.

Section 4: If the disabled works for the state, which is 6.2% of the 89.3% who are disabled and employed, then the state will still have to follow these regulations. The change in the amount of money spent on the salary for the disabled will be minuscule seeing as how most of them are already being paid over the minimum wage now.

Section 5: If a business does not accompany these standards, the business must pay a fine of \$500 dollars for the first offense, \$1000 dollars for the second offense, and any more offenses after that will lead to an additional \$1000 dollars added onto the previous fine.

Section 6: This bill will go into effect 30 days after passing.

1                                   An act to stimulate Kentucky’s economy through a renewable portfolio.

2  
3                                   **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5   Section 1: Currently coal is the state’s main source of energy. However, coal is a dying form of energy.  
6   This bill will try to take the burden off the coal industry while simultaneously improving the education,  
7   economy, and environment in Kentucky.


8  
9   Section 2: This bill proposes Kentucky to become a Renewable Portfolio State(RPS). An RPS sets a  
10   specific percentage of clean energy production as a goal by a certain year. As an RPS, Kentucky will  
11   attempt to achieve 20% clean energy production by the year 2030, thus providing the initiation for the  
12   transition from the wilting and polluting industry of coal to the clean future of renewable energy.

13  
14   Section 3: If passed, this bill will reform the job structure mainly in coal dependent regions. As coal  
15   production is gradually phased out, this bill will provide an education grant to the former coal-miners  
16   or any of those interested, which allows them to earn a 2-year associate’s degree in the corresponding  
17   renewable-energy field. This degree will allow former miners and others to work in renewable energy  
18   plants. For those who do not have a high school diploma, there will be funds for a GED preparation  
19   course, which will feed into less skilled support jobs in the power plants or will allow them to continue  
20   on with an associate’s degree.

21  
22   Section 4: Funding for this bill will come from multiple sources. RPS grants and the US Department of  
23   Energy loan guarantee program will provide funds to initiate the program. We will then offer local  
24   power companies an agreement for them to construct and maintain the new, renewable energy plants  
25   in return for a 5-year tax break, the approximate time it should take for this bill to demonstrate  
26   significant effects.

27  
28   Section 5: Theoretically, it costs about \$2 million to construct a 500 kW hydroelectric plant, which  
29   would produce 4,380,000 kW/ year. Kentucky currently consumes 59,200,550 kW per year and  
30   produces 68,705,000 kW / year. We would need four of the previously mentioned power plants to  
31   meet the 20% RPS goal by 2030.

32  
33   Section 6: To help pay off the loans, the excess energy would be sold to neighboring states such as  
34   Virginia, West Virginia, and Tennessee. As Kentucky changes its economic identity with renewable  
35   energy, the state will earn more from taxes as this industry increases. Overtime, as the tax breaks  
36   expire, the state will be able to payback these loans and perhaps fund their own projects in the future.

3                   **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5   Section 1: According to the Kentucky Department of Education, there are currently 655,642 students  
6   enrolled in public schools in Kentucky, and 68.6% of students qualify for the Free or Reduced Lunch  
7   Program.

8  
9   Section 2: Currently Kentucky runs the SFSP (Summer Food Service Program) which operates under the  
10   FNS (Food and Nutrition Service) at the federal level.

11  
12   Section 3: To obtain these meals, currently you must be on the Free or Reduced Lunch Program, but  
13   there also must be a sponsor in your area to offer this food.

14  
15   Section 4: In an effort to ensure that all children in Kentucky are properly fed, we propose the  
16   expansion of the statewide SFSP to include all major holidays and breaks, not just summer.


17  
18   Section 5: We also wish to create provisions that require the state to offere the lunches if there is a  
19   not currently a sponsor in the area until one can be found.

21   Section 6: If a sponsor is not feeding the students, then it is the job of the county Board of Education  
22   to ensure food is being offered.


23  
24   Section 7: Bearing in mind the possibility of bad accessibility, the State DoE will allow counties to  
25   decide how food will be delivered if it needs to be, and failure to ensure that meals are available will  
26   result in the following punishments:

- 27  
28   1. First offense would be a warning to the district.  
29   2. Following a second offense a second warning in which an employee of the DoE is sent to ensure  
30   proper implementation of the program occurs.  
31   3. On the third offense, a punishment of reduced funding to the district the following school year.

32  
33   Section 8: Acknowledging the inability of some counties to afford this based on current budgets, the  
34   DoE will determine the cost according to the Free and Reduced Lunch Program participants in the  
35   county and budgets will be increased accordingly.

3                   **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
4  
5   Section 1: Currently the state does not distinguish between assault and battery. All battery charges  
6   would be considered assault. The new modification will differentiate between the two charges.  
7  
8   Section 2: KRS 508.010 through KRS 508.040 states that assault in the state of Kentucky is when a  
9   person physically injures or attempts to injure another person without legal justification. Assault falls  
10   under 6 sections of chapter 508 in the Kentucky Penal Code.  
11  
12   Section 3: The state of Kentucky must modify chapter 508 in the penal code to resemble the 784  
13   chapter penal code of Florida FS 784.011 –FS 784.045. FS 784.011 states that battery is when a  
14   person who intentionally causes harm or uses a weapon will be guilty of a felony of the second degree.  
15   Currently, FS 784.045 describes assault as an unlawful threat by word or act of violence. They will be  
16   charged with a misdemeanor of the second degree.  
17  
18   Section 4: The funds to train police officers to distinguish between battery and assault will come from  
19   the funds that are already allotted for basic training.  
20  
21   Section 5: The difference of charges between assault and battery will better indicate the indictments of  
22   the severity of the charges brought against the accused.  
23  
24   Section 6: Upon passing legislation, this ruling will be taken into effect on all cases not previously  
25   begun before January 1, 2017.

8 the same time. Those in violation of this will be fined an average of \$2,500 each time this occurs.

10 Section 2: Citizens currently receiving both a pension and an annual salary will follow the phase out  
11 plan below:

- 12 • 1st year he/she will receive 85% of their pension
- 13 • 2nd year he/she will receive 65% of their pension
- 14 • 3rd year he/she will receive 45% of their pension
- 15 • 4th year he/she will receive 20% of their pension

3                   **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

5   Section 1: In 2014, an act relating to sexual abuse and harassment education was introduced in the  
6   state senate. This bill, titled Erin’s Law, required Kentucky schools to provide age-appropriate sexual  
7   abuse education to students in grades K-12. Less than a week after its proposal, the act was sent to  
8   committee where it now ineffectively resides. The opposition of the bill, despite its good intentions,  
9   was primarily due to the controversy over exposing elementary schoolers to such a mature subject  
10   matter.  
11

12   Section 2: However, recognizing that almost fifty percent of Kentucky women, and twenty percent of  
13   Kentucky men will fall victim to sexual violence, it is imperative that young adults are taught to  
14   recognize and report sexual abuse.  
15

16   Section 3: This bill requires Kentucky’s public high schools to implement sexual abuse education in the  
17   health curriculum; providing information on the subject of defining and reporting sexual harassment  
18   and assault.  
19

20   Section 4: The curriculum outline will be set by the state of Kentucky and distributed to school districts  
21   throughout the state. Providing time for the creation of aforementioned curriculum, the bill would go  
22   into effect beginning with the 2018-2019 school year.

1 An act to strengthen and change the FMLA (Family and Medical Leave Act) to a more comprehensive  
2 and pro-family option  
3

4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
5


6 Section 1: Currently in the state of Kentucky, the FMLA laws allow for only 12 weeks of unpaid leave  
7 per year. Under that 12 weeks, also falls vacation days, sick days, and family emergencies. Along with  
8 this time being unpaid, there are also no laws to guarantee that the position and its benefits will be  
9 held for the employee when ready to return to work. The regulations for the FMLA do not fit every  
10 company's or individual person's needs. It has been found that the current FMLA laws only cover 13%  
11 of the U.S. population. In order to meet the requirements, an employee must have worked at the  
12 company for over a year (or 1250 hours of work) and the company must have over 50 workers in a 75  
13 mile radius. For small businesses, it is up to each individual employer.  
14

15 Section 2: In order to achieve a more comprehensive and pro-family option the law will now require  
16 that companies must give six weeks paid leave and an optional additional six weeks unpaid leave with  
17 benefits. This leave will be available to all workers, regardless of how long they have worked at the  
18 company or how many workers the company has. Vacation and sick days will not be included in these  
19 twelve weeks.  
20

21 Section 3: The first months of a child's life is crucial to the foundation of their entire life. It is also a  
22 crucial time for the parents to learn to adequately care for the child and develop a strong relationship.  
23

24 Section 4: The Office of Employee Relations together with the Department of Human Resources  
25 Administration from the Personnel Cabinet of KY will be in charge of enacting this law and  
26 administering services.  
27

28 Section 5: This bill will go into effect January 1, 2018.

4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
5

6 Section 1: Many high school students find it difficult to fulfill the requirement of one Arts and  
7 Humanities credit in order to graduate their school. Though it may not seem like much, many schools  
8 lack significant variety in the classes they offer to gain this credit, with many Arts and Humanities  
9 courses failing to capture many students' interest. However, every high school offers a World Language  
10 class, the most popular being Spanish. These classes contain a lot information on many different  
11 cultures all around the globe. So much, in fact, that it could possibly count as an Arts and Humanities  
12 credit. Classes like Art and Drama lack the popularity of world language classes, and are very niche in  
13 nature. By allowing these classes to count as Arts and Humanities credits, students will be able to fulfill  
14 graduation requirements more easily and allow them more freedom in their class schedule.  
15

16 Section 2: As students, there are few ways to obtain the Arts and Humanities credit, but by enacting  
17 this bill all World Language classes upon passing will count as a one half Arts and Humanities credit.  
18 Each class will count as a half credit because when taking each class, you learn about the culture or  
19 cultures that are connected to that language.  
20

21 Section 3: This bill will create no cost for the state, except if schools decide to add a World Language  
22 class.  
23

24 Section 4: This bill will be enacted legislator endorsement, and then the state bill process. This bill will  
25 change World Language classes to not only count as 1/2 Foreign Language credit for college, but also  
26 1/2 credit for an Arts and Humanities class for high school graduation and will go into effect on July 1,  
27 2017.

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An act to include Student Voice in decisions made by SBDMs and school councils

**Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**


Section 1: Students shall be allowed to serve on Site Based Decision Making Councils (SBDM) or the otherwise governing body of her or his school district. Inclusion of a student as a voting member will increase the validity of decisions made by the council and work to include the perspective of the group they are designated to serve.

Section 2: SBDMs were introduced by the Kentucky Education Reform Act of 1990 in an effort to improve school governance in the commonwealth. Currently, SBDMs consist of three teachers, two parents, and at least one administrative faculty member. Additionally, if a district has 8% or more of their students identifying as a minority (e.g. Asian, African American, etc), at least one member of the SBDM must be of that minority.


Section 3: This bill will permit each public school district SBDM to have one or more current student member. SBDMs will not be required to remove a current member to make room for a student, instead a student may be considered to fill a vacant spot on the council. In the same way, districts will not be required to have a student member, however they will not be allowed to restrict a student from running to fill a vacant spot. Provided that the student receives sufficient votes, she or he shall fill the vacant spot on the council.

Section 4: The student must be at the level of Middle School or higher, must have at least 2 teacher and/or counselor recommendations, and must pass a grade check before being considered.

Section 5: This bill will go into effect immediately after passage herein that it does not mandate a policy change, merely an allowance for students to run.

5 Section 1: ILFN (Infrasound-low frequency noise) is noise less than 20 hertz, usually inaudible to  
6 humans. ILFN is perceptible to humans through the other senses besides hearing. Wind  
7 turbines create IFLN.  
8  
9 Section 2: The IFLN produced by wind turbines affects brain activity and can cause  
10 large amounts of stress on the body. Thus, the location of wind turbines must be at least 30 miles  
11 away from schools or areas with large populations.  
12  
13 Section 3: To eliminate as much of the frequency as possible, lattice absorbent walls will be placed  
14 around wind turbines.  
15  
16 Section 4: The cost of the movement of current turbines will be placed on the companies who put  
17 the turbines in place; however, there will be no tax forced upon the companies for the  
18 project. After the current turbines have been moved, there will be no cost for the inaction of this bill.

1 An act to require products containing pseudoephedrine, ephedrine, and phenylpropanolamine to be  
2 classified as prescription-only drugs.  
3


4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
5

6 Section 1: Many routine drugs used to treat colds contain "pseudoephedrine," "ephedrine," and  
7 "phenylpropanolamine," which are decongestants found in accessible medicines like Claritin D and  
8 Sudafed. These are the only consistent chemicals found in methamphetamine that can be regulated. By  
9 requiring all drugs containing pseudoephedrine, phenylpropanolamine, and ephedrine to be classified as  
10 prescription-only drugs, the production of methamphetamine will be reduced across the Commonwealth  
11 of Kentucky.  
12

13 Section 2: Currently, the federal government has placed restrictions on the sale of pseudoephedrine  
14 with the Combat Methamphetamine Epidemic Act of 2005 signed into law by George W. Bush later in  
15 2006. The Act classifies pseudoephedrine, phenylpropanolamine, and ephedrine as "behind the counter  
16 drugs", requiring pharmacists to obtain identification and address of the consumer and a record of the  
17 amount and date purchased. Monthly limits are set on these purchases to insure mass amounts are not  
18 being easily released. Kentucky's methamphetamine problem is being addressed by the use of the  
19 MethCheck network NPLeX or the National Precursor Log Exchange. However, NPLeX does not control  
20 "smurfing." These current regulations have not substantially curtailed the production of meth.  
21

22 Section 3: To obtain medicines containing pseudoephedrine, ephedrine, or phenylpropanolamine,  
23 persons must be given an explicit prescription from a practicing physician, to ensure that they have a  
24 valid, medical need for them.  
25

26 Section 4: This bill shall go into effect January 1, 2017.

1 An act to ESTABLISH A CHILD ABUSE REGISTRY

2  
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**


4  
5 Section 1: Kentucky ranks among the top ten worst states for child abuse in the United States, and  
6 number one in child abuse cases that resulted in death. The implementation of this bill allows the public  
7 to be aware of possible threats to children's safety in their area. A free, easily accessible database and  
8 toll free number that allows people to know if a convicted child abuser lives near them would inform  
9 parents and potential employers of possible threats. This would help prevent injury to children by  
10 informing responsible and caring parents, teachers, and citizens of the presence of individuals who are  
11 known threats to the welfare of a child. The stress of hiring babysitters and nannies or the danger of  
12 allowing a child to play outside in a neighbourhood would decrease incredibly, given an easy access to  
13 a database that would help ensure the safety of children across Kentucky.

14  
15 Section 2: Kentucky State Police Department must establish a website to display, registrant  
16 information, and the registrant's conviction, while taking extra precaution to protect victim's  
17 information as this bill pertains to minors. Offenders must register based on select chapters from KRS  
18 600-645, requirements would range from child endangerment to physical and sexual abuse of a minor.  
19 Police departments must provide easy access to the registry for the public. Preventative measures  
20 against harassment to registered offenders by the public. Protection from registrants for police  
21 departments and employees of said departments will be employed as needed. Toll-free number must be  
22 provided in case an individual wishes to learn more about a registrant located in their jurisdiction.  
23 Personal notifications may also be provided by individual departments to citizens located in that  
24 jurisdiction when an offender is registered in their area.

25  
26 Section 3: In the event an employee of a Kentucky Police Department, refuses to adhere to the  
27 implementation of section one the following repercussions will be reprimanded with the following:  
28 a.) First offenses will receive a cautionary citation.  
29 b.) Second offense will be submitted to an unpaid suspension, length depending on  
30 severity of actions.  
31 c.) Third offense will result in termination of employee.

32  
33 Section 4: The addition of a child abuse registry would fall under the pre-existing duties of officers in  
34 Kentucky who already maintain the sexual offense registry. However, additional data space would be  
35 needed to accommodate the added convicted child abusers. The majority of this cost would be covered  
36 by fees paid by registrants each year.

37  
38 Section 5: This law would be effective immediately 90 days after passage.

1 An act to Replace the Practice of Self-Funded Classrooms: A Classroom Funding Initiative(CFI)

2  
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5 Section 1: It was reported in 2014 that Kentucky teachers, on average, spend \$500 of their own  
6 money yearly to purchase classroom supplies, though many teachers' purchases are upwards of  
7 \$1,000. Despite there being practices in place to help alleviate the pain in teachers' pockets, they are  
8 never guaranteed, mainly because these practices vary between school districts. A contributing issue is  
9 the process of tax write-offs for teachers, which allows them to be pardoned of however much money  
10 they spent on their classroom, if and only if it exceeds \$1,500, on their taxes. For the majority of  
11 teachers who do not reach this limit, they are stranded taking responsibility for whatever money they  
12 spent out of their already insufficient salaries for their students. Teachers and students are hurt alike  
13 by self-funding classrooms, where students are unable to receive resources they desperately need for  
14 learning because of a teacher's inability to purchase them with their own funds. Our Classroom Funding  
15 Initiative, or CFI, would work to mend this.

16  
17 Section 2: Our CFI would have tax write-off limits be mandated to have no minimum requirement in  
18 order to claim them; all purchases with proof, such as itemized receipts, shall be included for the  
19 individual teacher's tax write-off up to a maximum of \$1,500 each fiscal year. This means that any  
20 spending for classrooms up to \$1,500 may be used as a tax write-off, where the individual teacher  
21 would be exempt from that amount of money when they pay yearly taxes. This change acts as catalyst  
22 in eliminating the suffering of teachers with the self-funding that directs their focus from students.

23  
24 Section 3: To be successfully enacted, a 2% restaurant sales tax shall be established in order to  
25 compensate for teacher's tax claims that would have contributed to the state.


26  
27 Section 4: Future reductions shall be made in the future if this one is successful. We will gauge the  
28 success of the implementation of this bill through use of a mandatory end-of-year survey for teachers  
29 and the net gain or loss of tax monies from the restaurant tax. The end-of-year survey shall be  
30 mandatory for teachers to be able to submit receipts for tax write-offs, and shall "pilot" for the first  
31 three years of CFI's implementation. The monies from restaurant tax would be weighed against the  
32 "loss" paid in taxes by teachers, and if decided to be equal to original amounts that would have been  
33 paid in taxes, this program would be continued. If not, this program would be discontinued and the  
34 General Assembly would reconvene to reach an alternative solution.

35  
36 Section 6: This law shall take effect the fiscal year after its enactment (2017-2018 school year).

1 An act to create state incentives for the purchase of plug-in hybrid and electric vehicles

2

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4

5 Section 1: Given that many U.S. states have enacted financial incentives and have seen positive results,  
6 the state of Kentucky should create tax incentives and reimbursements that make the use of plug-in  
7 hybrids and electric vehicles more affordable and, thus, encourage the purchase of these vehicles.

8

9 Section 2: This bill will create a one-time income tax deduction for anyone purchasing a new or used  
10 plug-in hybrid or all-electric vehicle. The deduction will be ten percent of the vehicle's purchase price,  
11 with a maximum deduction of \$3,500.

12

13 Section 3: This bill will also create a one-time reimbursement for the purchase (excluding installation  
14 costs) of a home electric-vehicle charger. This reimbursement is only available for new charger  
15 purchases, with a maximum reimbursement of \$300.

16


17 Section 4: This bill will be funded through an increase in Kentucky's taxes on gasoline and diesel fuels.  
18 An additional tax of 2 cents per gallon will be added to Kentucky's current fuel tax (which is a minimum  
19 of 26 cents per gallon and fluctuates depending upon fuel price). Any excess funds gained from this tax  
20 will be allocated as needed into the budget of the Kentucky Department of Transportation.

21

22 Section 5: Based on data obtained from the Federal Highway Administration, this tax will generate  
23 approximately \$43.5 million in funding annually for this incentive program. This will allow up to 11,500  
24 plug-in hybrid or electric car buyers in Kentucky to apply for incentives each year.

25

26 Section 6: Based on data obtained from the Federal Highway Administration, this tax will generate  
27 approximately \$43.5 million in funding annually for this incentive program. This will allow up to 11,500  
28 plug-in hybrid or electric car buyers in Kentucky to apply for incentives each year.

1                                   An act to abolish monetary bail in the Commonwealth of Kentucky  
2

3                                   **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
4

5 Section 1: Under current Kentucky law, an accused person awaiting trial may be released from prison if  
6 they post bail, defined as paying a monetary amount set by a judge on the condition that the money  
7 will be returned to the defendant if they appear in court. In Kentucky, there is a process to determine  
8 the risk of flight or violence of defendants. Judges are encouraged to release lower-risk defendants  
9 without bail and instead utilize pretrial services. If judges do set bail for these defendants, they must  
10 explain why. However, judges often set bail anyway, with little to no explanation. The bail is most often  
11 too high for the defendant to pay it. Therefore, a large portion of the prison population has not been  
12 convicted of a crime; many are simply awaiting trial, having been unable to post bail. This practice is at  
13 odds with the basis of the criminal justice system: that one is innocent until proven guilty. Pre-trial  
14 incarceration leads to defendants losing jobs, housing, and custody of children, exacerbating the  
15 effects of poverty and leading to more crime. In addition, incarceration comes at an expense to the  
16 state.

17


18 Section 2: Monetary bail will be abolished, and, instead, low-to-moderate-risk defendants will be  
19 subject to Pretrial Services as established in the 1976 Bail Bond Reform Act. Pretrial Services consist  
20 of a series of assessments, interviews, and checks that allow the courts to keep in touch with the  
21 defendant before trial. The exact parameters of "low-to-moderate-risk" will be determined by the  
22 Kentucky Court of Justice.

23


24 Section 3: Pretrial services will be paid for by the money saved from the decrease in incarceration rates  
25 resulting from abolishing bail.

26

27 Section 4: This bill will go into effect January 1, 2018.

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1 An act to require all sheriffs in Kentucky to have at least ten years of prior law enforcement experience  
2  
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
4  
5 Section 1: Throughout the state about 90% of sheriff's departments have minute  
6 policing power. This is because it is up to the county and city police to patrol the area. On  
7 average sheriffs will make between \$100,00-110,000 a year. Most sheriff's departments serve  
8 papers or evict people who can not pay for their house anymore, but they can still do traffic  
9 stops and arrest people. Even though they have law enforcement powers, they do not have the  
10 same duties as county or city police. Even some sheriffs have no prior law enforcement  
11 experience. While a small amount of departments do have policing powers, these are rare and for  
12 most instances the sheriff has had previous law enforcement experience and wants to serve the  
13 community and protect the citizens.  
14  
15 Section 2: This act will require sheriffs to have previous law enforcement experience, even  
16 though the department can not police the area. The sheriff must still have enough experience to  
17 direct orders to his deputies.  
18  
19 Section 3: This bill will cost nothing and be enforced by the county clerks.  
20  
21 Section 4: This bill will go into effect on January 1, 2017 if passed.

3                                   **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
4


5   Section 1: This bill would require amending Section 60 of the Kentucky Constitution.  
6

7   Section 2: Section 60 will be amended to include exceptions regarding outlined procedures allowing for  
8 state level initiative and referendum procedure:  
9

10   A. The initiative grants electors the power to propose statutes and amendments to the Constitution  
11 and to either adopt or reject them.  
12   B. The referendum grants electors the power to approve or reject statutes enacted by the  
13 Commonwealth.  
14   C. Petitions for initiative or referendum must be filed to the Attorney General, who will prepare a title  
15 and summary for circulation for signatures.  
16   D. Legislature will mandate the manner of circulation of petitions.  
17   E. The proposed initiative or referendum must focus on one subject.  
18   F. The proposed initiative or referendum must be signed by 5% of electors who voted in the last  
19 gubernatorial election in 30 of 38 Kentucky State Senate districts. The final collection of signatures  
20 must be filed to the Secretary of State within 365 days of its initial filing. Each signature must then be  
21 verified by county clerks in the county the signature was collected in. Unverified signatures are void.  
22   G. If filed and verified 100 days prior to the next general or statewide election, the proposed statute or  
23 amendment will appear on the ballot for electors to vote on in the next statewide election. The  
24 governor may hold special election for the initiative or referendum.  
25   H. Initiative statute/amendment or referendum statute will go into effect the day after election if voted  
26 on in favor by the majority of electors.  
27   I. Legislature reserves the ability to repeal initiative statutes and amendments and to amend initiative  
28 statutes and amendments and referendum statutes. Amendments made by the legislature will appear  
29 on the next statewide election ballot for electors to vote on.  
30   J. If two opposing initiatives are placed on the ballot and both receive majority votes, the one with  
31 more votes in favor will be enacted.  
32


33   Section 3: Current statutes mandating local level initiative and referendum procedure (State Statutes,  
34 Section 83A.120 and Section 65.012) will remain in place.

13 for the state health department upon the first offense, a \$10,000 fine on the second offense, and a  
14 \$25,000 fine on any subsequent offenses.

1 An act to regulate and license the use of medical 3D printers in hospitals

2  
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5 Section 1: This bill will require the Kentucky Board of Medical Licensure to add 3D printing to the list of  
6 practices they regulate. Hospitals that have and use medical 3D printers will have to obtain a license  
7 that must be renewed yearly. This license will ensure that the doctors and hospital staff know how to  
8 correctly use and maintain the devices.

9  
10 Section 2: Any doctors or technicians who operate or maintain the medical 3D printers must have  
11 taken a course or be certified in operating and maintaining 3D printers. The course or certification  
12 must come from an accredited place of higher education.

13  
14 Section 3: Any hospital that utilizes a medical 3D printer for any medical purpose (i.e. printing medicine,  
15 tools, and organs) must have a license to operate it. The license will be issued by the KBML, and the 3D  
16 printing space must be inspected by a member from the KBML on an annual basis, which will constitute  
17 the renewal of the license.

18  
19 Section 4: Offenses will comply with KBML protocol and are as follows:

- 20 • First offense: For the first offense (i.e. a 3D printer is not licensed or an operator is not  
21 certified), the hospital will be fined \$15,000.
- 22 • Subsequent offenses: For any subsequent offenses that occur, the case will be subject to review  
23 and penalties will be levied by the KBML.

24  
25 Section Five: This bill will go into effect on January 1, 2017.

## A Self-Guided Tour of the KENTUCKY STATE CAPITOL



### SECOND FLOOR – JUDICIAL BRANCH

- 13 From the top of the steps on the second floor, observe the view of the nave, or **Main corridor**.  
This spectacular space is over 300 feet long. It is lined with 36 huge, one piece columns made of Vermont granite. Note the colorful art skylights and grand staircase.
- 14 Also from here you can see the murals in the lunettes on either end of the nave. Painted by Gilbert White, the murals depict moments in the early history of Kentucky.
- 15 The one over the East wing is a representation of Daniel Boone's first view of the Bluegrass region, or "beautiful level of Kentucky," in 1769.
- 16 The mural to the West shows Boone and Richard Henderson concluding the Treaty of Watauga in 1775 which allowed the Transylvania Company to purchase much of the land that is Kentucky from the Cherokee Indians.
- 17 Stepping outside of the State Reception Room, a small **chapel, press offices**, and the **office of the Chief Justice** (not open for tours) are on the West end of this floor.
- 18 Perhaps the most elegant room in the Capitol, the state reception room was intended as a place for special events and as the reception area for the governor's office, originally next door. Inspired by grand salons in European palaces, the room was restored in 1995 to its original grandeur. The placement of the mirrors on either end of the room creates the illusion of an infinite view, like that in the Hall of Mirrors of the Palace of Versailles in France.
- 19 Stepping outside of the State Reception Room, a small **chapel, press offices**, and the **office of the Chief Justice** (not open for tours) are on the West end of this floor.



### THIRD FLOOR – LEGISLATIVE FLOOR

- 19 **Senate chamber** (on the West end of the building). You may enter the Senate if the chamber is not in use.  
Raised galleries allow the public to view the Senate's deliberations during legislative sessions. There are desks for thirty-eight senators, who also have individual offices in the Capitol Annex.  
Please proceed to the other end of the third floor - the East end.
- 20 **House of Representatives**. You may enter the House chamber if it is not in use.  
The House of Representatives, like the Senate, also includes spectator galleries and desks for members. However, with 100 members, the size of the House requires some additional features. Votes are recorded electronically and displayed on panels on either side of the Speaker's desk. Each member of the General Assembly has a desktop computer.

**The Legislative Branch of Kentucky State Government:**  
Like most states, Kentucky has a bicameral legislature - that is one with two components. The "lower" and larger body is the House of Representatives; the "upper," smaller body is the Senate. The Speaker of the House presides over that chamber, and the President of the Senate chairs deliberations there. Other legislative officials include the House and Senate majority and minority leaders. Together, the House and Senate are known as the Kentucky General Assembly. The General Assembly meets in regular session for sixty working days in even years, and for thirty working days in odd years. The governor of Kentucky can call Special Sessions to address specific issues. Legislative chambers and offices occupy the third floor of the Capitol.

At times the Capitol may be under repairs to ensure that it remains a proud symbol of Kentucky. Portions of the building may be closed to tours. Please accept our apology for any inconvenience.

### Why is Kentucky called a "Commonwealth"?

In this country, "commonwealth" is another word for "state". The term implies a commitment to the "commonweal," or common good of the people. Several states (Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, and Virginia, in addition to Kentucky) call themselves commonwealths. Since Kentucky was formed from Virginia, our state's founders decided to use the term too.

### Capitol vs. Capital. A capitol is a building used as a headquarters of a government. A capitol houses legislative chambers and may also house courtrooms and government offices. A capital is a city that is the seat of government of a state or nation. This building is a capitol. Frankfort is a capital.
